The Parish Office at the Rectory, 234 Wigan Road (61819) is open on Saturdays from 10.00 to 11.00 a.m. to deal with initial enquiries for Baptism and Banns of Marriage. Mary and I have just returned from our late summer holiday. We went to the Greek island of Kos, off the Turkish coast. (St. Luke refers to Kos in Acts Ch.2l v. 1 when describing the route of St. Paul's 3rd Missionary Journey. However, it is more famous, as we never cease to be reminded, as being the birth place of the "Father of Medicine", Hippocrates, in the 4th Century B.C.) It was a glorious holiday with hot, but not unbearably hot, sunshine every one of our ten days stay on the island, and it being the end of the season, it wasn't too crowded either. We managed to do plenty of walking, swimming and cycling, and in between we relaxed and read. As a result we have returned refreshed. We are most grateful to those who "kept the show going" in our absence by looking after our home, and conducting the mid-week and Sunday services.

From my observations and reading, there were three things that struck me during my holiday. Firstly, there was the appalling, unsightly pollution of the island with tin cans, plastic containers, glass bottles and all kinds of rubbish. Whilst tourists must be to blame for much of it, the islanders must be responsible for some of it. There was so much that I'm sure it could take the whole of the "off season" to clear it. The Bible teaches us that God has given to mankind the responsibility of being stewards of His creation. Our task is to husband, rather than to exploit, the earth's resources. It is, therefore, a blasphemy against the Creator God to spoil His creation by polluting it. I was very encouraged to see that at all the recent party political conferences these environmental issues were finding a place on their agendas.

Secondly, I was left with an uncomfortable feeling of injustice when I saw the massive building programme that is taking place in Kos, and indeed elsewhere around the Mediterranean. Holiday resorts resembling concrete jungles with modern hotels, swimming pools and apartment blocks are appearing like mushrooms overnight for the benefit of tourists from N. Europe. At the same time, I was being encouraged in the Tear Fund Prayer Diary to pray for the millions who live in the sprawling shanty towns throughout the world, and for the thousands who have nowhere to sliip but on the pavements. It can't be right that where I can stay on holiday is a luxury beyond imagination for the urban poor of the world. This situation is a blasphemy against the Just God.

Thirdly, I was challenged by my reading to see that Evangelism is given a much higher priority in the life of our church. We are so much better at talking about raising money to maintain the fabric of our buildings than we are at engaging in the work of evangelism. Though some of us believe in evangelism, the sad fact is that we have little enthusiasm for it, and even less confidence to share our faith with others and pointing them to Jesus Christ. I am particularly conscious of my own weakness and failings in this respect and I am wondering whether it is not high time for us to be seeking the help of those with evangelistic gifts to come to us to assist us in a period of missions. To ignore the call to evangelise is a blaspheny against the Loving God who gave His only Son to die for us so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. This is good news which we must not keep to ourselves; it must be shared with others.

On my return home there was a mountain of mail to be dealt with. The first letter I opened was a sad one. It was from someone who felt it necessary to hide their identity behind the pseudonym "Regular Worshipper". He/She was complaining about an omission in this monthly newsletter. I will gladly explain to the person the difference between a parish magazine which has a wider circulation to parishioners and a church newsletter which has a limited readership of church members. This monthly publication is most emphatically not a parish magazine. If it was, I wouldn't have written about my holiday impressions, for I think these are more appropriate for sharing with the membership of the church family than being given a wider circulation. I hope "Regular Worshipper" will feel able to talk to me in confidence.

CONTRIBUTIONS FROM .

John Paxton, our Industrial Missioner, who writes about "Sabbath Rest"

The word "Sabbath", I suspect makes many people think that this article is about Sunday Trading, or at least a complaint about how Sunday is being abused. Rather, on this occasion, I want to explore the value of the concept of the sabbath.

Last month, the clergy of the Manchester Diocese spent a few days at Swanwick for their quinquennial conference. The main speaker was Professor Jurgen Moltmann from Tubingen University in West Germany. His lectures included his current thinking about the Christian attitude to environmental questions. Within this oddfext he reminded his audience of the Old Testament teaching about the sabbath, and in particular, how the land used for agriculture should be allowed to lie fallow every seven years. This would allow it to recover, and help the people of Israel remember that the earth belongs to God.

Professor Moltmann developed this theme by suggesting the sabbath concept as a partial solution to high unemployment. He would like us to investigate the feasibility of every employed person taking one year's paid leave every seven years, and then making up the difference by working after the present retirement age.

No doubt many people, both employers and employees, will throw up their hands in horror. I am sure you can think of all the problems, but the advantages of such a scheme are worth reflecting upon. As long as proper training were provided, the sharing of work responsibilities would help the reduction in unemployment. The contribution that "resting" employees could make to their families' communities, or to voluntary agencies, would be considerable. Every employee would benefit from regular refreshment and recreation.

Like all prophets, Moltmann says controversial things, It does not mean they should be ignored!

Stephen and Stella Brook, our Link Missionaries in Portugal. They produce a very good newsletter at regular intervals which many of the congregation receive via Dorothy Cox, who will be happy to supply additional copies to those who want them. Here are a few extracts from their latest letter.

"We are very happy in our new house. It has great potential and when finished it will make an ideal family home and centre for our church work. At present we don't have many neighbours, but new houses are being built all around us on what will eventually become a large housing estate about 3 miles from the centre of the city of Setubal, where our church is situated.

There is a keen Christian couple from our church who live nearby. They are called Joao and Deolinda, and they have been a great help in getting us settled and finding our way about.

Within the Church of the Holy Spirit in Setubal there are tensions, partly because of leading men with strong ideas about what the church should be doing and how. We pray that there may be an increasingly common sense of purpose. The potential for growth is good, — there seem to be a good number of folk on the fringe waiting to be drawn in. Certainly they seem to be expecting great things to happen now that their new pastor and family have arrived — rather daunting!

The children are enjoying having a garden to play in. Because few other families have moved in, they are having to play by themselves - in Portugese, of course. Rachel has been registered at the local primary school, but at the time of writing, we are still looking for a suitable pre-primary for Joanna and Andrew.

WHAT'S ON IN NOVEMBER . . .

In conjunction with other local churches, there will be a series of five weekly Home Meetings this month. With the aid of a booklet in the Scripture Union's Lifebuilder series, we shall be looking at five of the Psalms. The value of these home meetings is considerably enhanced when there is a good cross section of representation from different churches. Let's make sure that our church is not under-represented. Our former curate, <u>Mark Russell-Smith</u>, who together with his Norwegian wife, Anna, is our Link Missionary in Kenya, returns to Deane on Sunday, November 6th. Mark and Anna will be speaking at the main services and also at the CYFA group after the evening service.


