

The Parish Office at the Rectory, 234 Wigan Road (51819) is open on Saturdays from 10.00 to 11.00 a.m. to deal with initial enquiries for Baptism and Banns of Marriage.

For the second month in succession we include a nationally produced 'inset' in addition to our local church news. This is the leaflet entitled "Giving in Faith" and it comes from the Church Commissioners. The Commissioners come in for a great deal of criticism - much of it ill-informed and unfair. They are most anxious to improve their public relations and this leaflet is the popular and much abbreviated version of their annual report, a copy of which I am happy to loan to anyone who is interested. Our Standing Committee considered this leaflet to be good value and well worth including with this newsletter.

I had hoped to have been able to let you have at least an interim report from the recent congregational survey/census, but I understand that like the "high street banks" we can blame the delay on the computer. Perhaps it was that bogus return from one of our teenagers with six children that caused the computer to splutter! I guess that when it does eventually produce the results it will confirm/what I have long suspected, namely that at Deane Church we have a relatively large number of people who prefer to remain anonymous visitors rather than committed members. Evidence of this is to be seen by the fact that our <u>Electoral Roll</u>, the official list of church membership, does not contain the names of many of you who are reading this newsletter. Whilst I would never wish to encourage people to treat church membership in a casual way or to regard membership of the Electoral Roll as a mere formality, I do wish regular attenders would apply for membership of the Roll using one of the forms available in church. The Church Council has to revise the Roll each year and the period for doing this is March 19th-April 3rd.

The front cover reveals that you are going to have a change of voice on Sundays this month. Our visiting preacher on March 5th is Canon Bill Andrew, the Communications Director of the Bible Society. For several years now the Bible Society has been making a determined effort to present a much more contemporary image of its important work, and Bill has played a major part in this. We shall be working him hard for in addition to the Sunday services he and his wife Mary will be our principal guests at the Saturday Night at Eight and at a joint C.Y.F.A. meeting at St. Andrews when he will demonstrate some of the Society's latest visual material. Eric Culbertson, the new area secretary for the Bible Churchmen's Missionary Society (B.C.M.S.) will conduct the morning service on March 12th. Eric and his wife Kay are temporarily living in our staff house until B.C.M.S. are able to purchase a house for them locally. Towards the end of the month we welcome back to Deane the Revid. John and Hellen Njaroge, our E.F.A.C. Bursars who will be returning to Kenya this summer on completion of their theology degree courses at Bristol. In addition to sharing in the Sunday services at Deane and St. Andrews they will be very happy to meet you personally in your own homes. There is a hospitality list in church so do please make use of it by inviting them for a meal. I can assure you that you will find it a rewarding experience.

When the Anglican bishops met at the Lambeth Conference last summer they called upon our Church to regard the final decade of this century as a "DECADE OF EVANGELISM". The African bishops in particular were very concerned that in this country we spend so much time on maintenance of building and so little time on mission to people. In the Church of England we are better at talking about evangelism than we are doing it. Though the Diocesan Synod will be considering our response to this call from the bishops, our own local Mission and Unity Committee have really "taken the bit between their teeth by taking three initiatives in evangelism. First, they are operating two pilot schemes this month using a programme entitled "Good News down the Street" in which two small teams of three lay people visit the home of someone who has expressed an interest in the Christian Faith. Using St. Luke's Gospel they share with their hosts what they have discovered to be true in their own lives. Second, they have encouraged our Church Council to support the Livelink Satellite Relay from the Billy Graham Mission '39 in London to our own Albert Hall during the first week of Bolton Holidays, June 26th-July 1. In preparation for this there will be a short series of four "Christian Life and Witness" classes on Wednesday evenings in April at St. Luke's Halliwell. Do try to keep these dates free. Third, they have invited a specialist in evangelism to guide us as to when we should have a parish mission and what form it should take.

I'm very conscious that during my ministry here evangelism hasn't had the high priority which it deserves and so I particularly welcome these developments.

Canon Bill Andrew, the Communications Director of the Bible Society is visiting our parish for the weekend March 4/5. Here is some information about the Society to which we made a donation last year of £260.

Over 64,000 people join the Christian Church every day but, particularly in developing countries, many cannot afford a Bible. Added to this are translation difficulties; although some books of the Bible have been printed in 1,884 different languages (only 303 have the complete Bible), there are around 6,000 major languages in the world. Consequently, some 4,000 languages still need to be tackled if Christians are to have access to the message of the Scriptures. This is the challenge facing Bible Society today.

The Society, an inter-church charity is working to make the Bible available to all people in a language they can understand and at a price they can afford. With the prayers and help of its many supporters, and in co-operation with other Bible Societies world-wide, it is identifying needs, funding translation and revision projects, and publishing and distributing Scriptures.

Bible Society is the largest Bible publisher in the United Kingdom, distributing Bibles and Testaments in 15 English versions and Scriptures in more than 150 other languages. The Good News Bible first published in Britain in 1976 by Bible Society and Collins, is the most popular Bible in the United Kingdom today. It enjoys wide acceptance throughout the English speaking world, and also in countries where English is the second language.

The Society ships some two million Bibles abroad each year and, in 1987, contributed just over £3 million to the United Bible Societies, the body which co-ordinates the work of over a hundred Bible Societies world-wide. Bible Societies are currently engaged in over 570 new translation projects, as well as publishing and distributing millions of Scriptures.

FAMILIES TOGETHER aims to provide a rewarding experience to children with a handicap, their families and those offering to share their own home.

Bringing up any child is time consuming and tiring, most parents welcome some time to themselves to go shopping or for an evening out or a holiday. Caring for a child with a physical or mental handicap may leave parents with even less time for each other or for other children in the family. That is where FAMILIES TOGETHER comes in . . . HOW DOES IT WORK? The scheme matches families in Bolton who have a child with a handicap with a link family who will share the care of the child throughout the year. At first a child is likely to stay for an hour or so, as the child and the families get to know each other the stays may increase to overnight or holidays.

How much time is shared will depend on the child's and his or her family's needs. It may be one day a week or several weekends or blocks of one or two weeks. The times will be arranged between the families. We will be very careful to match families, to find people who get on well together.

Most families are expected to use their link families for the equivalent of 35 days a year. This is seen as an important service and an allowance is offered to link families, together with practical support.

Those wishing to act as link families may be families, couples or single people with common sense, patience and commitment — a sense of


humour might help too. There are no special qualifications needed to be a link family. The important thing is to have an interest in getting to know a child with special needs and his or her family.
