The Parish Office at the Rectory, 234 Wigan Road (61819) is open on Saturdays from 10.00 to 11.00 a.m. to deal with initial enquiries for Baptism and Banns of Marriage.

Last month I referred to the forthcoming "Mission '89" to be conducted in London in June. The Mission will be led by Dr. Billy Graham and his team. When they were last here 4 years ago they spent a week in each of several cities situated strategically in the provinces. This year they will operate from 3 different venues in London - from Earls Court in the West of the capital, from Upton Park, West Ham in the East, and from Crystal Palace in the South. This has been considered vital to overcome the horrendous traffic problems in our capital city. During the Earls Court period (June 26-July 1) over 200 locations throughout the British Isles will be linked up to Earls Court by live satellite transmission. The Albert Hall, Bolton, has been booked for one of these locations. Clearly this mission has the potential of being one of the most momentous of the century in this country.

I can hear some of you saying "This is not my cup of tea. I don't like mass evangelism." I can sympathise with you. I have reservations about it. I didn't come to faith in Christ in this way. However, I want you to know that I am solidly behind it. I am not ashamed to be identified with it. I want to encourage you by my own example and by my leadership to be involved in it too, even though you may be away from home in Bolton Holidays during the week of the transmissions. Here are my reasons:-

- Who can deny that cur country needs the good news of the Christian message today? We need to hear it proclaimed in a meaningful, attractive and relevant way, and we need to be challenged to respond to it. On past occasions Billy Graham has demonstrated how good and gifted he is at doing this, and yet he remains a very humble man. There are literally thousands of men and women today who look back in gratitude to God that it was during a Billy Graham mission that they first responded to Christ. Of course, I am aware that many so called "converts" lapse. Jesus had this sad experience too for one of the twelve men He called and trained to be a disciple actually betrayed Him before committing suicide. I too know how sad it is to look through the pages of our Confirmation register. Many older teenagers and adults who, at the completion of a long Believing and Belonging course, confessed their faith publicly in the Confirmation service in recent years are no longer members of the Church in any meaningful sense. On the positive side it is worth noting that in the aftermath of a Billy Graham mission there is always a marked increase in the number of men and women offering themselves for the ordained munistry.
- (2) All the evidence goes to show that not only do those outside the Church benefit from a Billy Graham mission but church members themselves are often re-vitalised. And isn't this what we need at Deane? A prospective curate spent a weekend with us recently, and at the end of it he asked me this penetrating question, "Why do you think the level of Christian commitment of many of your congregation appears to be so shallow?" To a visitor it looked as though all too many of us saw Christian commitment as little more than just attending church on those Sundays when there was nothing much else to do; it certainly wouldn't involve meeting with one another for fellowship betwee times.

A Billy Graham mission always lays great stress upon preparation and prayer. Some of the preparation takes the form of a series of 4 Christian Life and Witness Classes to be held at St. Lukes, Chorley Old Road on Wednesday evenings April 5, 12, 19, 26 from 8.00 to 9.30 pm. At these classes we will be taught to

- \* understand your faith more clearly
- \* how to apply the Bible to your everyday life
- \* how to share your faith naturally with others
- \* how to help new Christians in their faith
- \* how to answer questions people ask.

I have re-arranged my own diary so that I can attend all 4 classes and I have signed the list in church to indicate this. I am sure you personally and our church corporately would benefit enormously if many of us gave these classes a high priority. How about you coming with me?

<u>Prayer Triplets</u> where 3 people agree to meet regularly to pray together for the <u>Mission have proved to be invaluable</u>. Two such prayer groups have continued to meet regularly since the last mission and I hope that this mission will lead to the formation of more. Listen for information about these during the month.

### SPOTLIGHT ON C.P.A.S.

There are those within our own church who question the wisdom of supporting overseas missions through gifts of money and by sending personnel abroad when the needs of our own country are so great.

The Church Pastoral Aid Society (C.P.A.S. for short) is a "home missionary society". Whilst it doesn't subscribe to the view that we shouldn't support overseas missions it is firmly committed to the view that our own country is a mission field. It is the oldest and largest home mission, primarily concerned to assist the local church to fulfil its missionary role in this country. It has three Priority Areas, each of which will be spotlighted on posters on the pillars in church this month.

Priority Area No. 1 - Evangelism, taking the Christian Gospel to our own nation. The society does this through its staff evangelists who are available to lead parish missions and who encourage us in the task of sharing our faith with others. Every summer it provides a series of camps and houseparties for young people where, as part of a good holiday, they are challenged to commit themselves to Christ in faith. Many of our Pathfinders and CYFA members have been helped in this way.

Priority Area No. 2 - Training, equipping Christians to serve God and our fellowman whatever their age, condition and background. It does this through the stimulation of conferences and through the provision of the baptism and marriage preparation courses which we use at Deane, together with teaching material for Pathfinders and CYFA.

Priority Area No. 3 - Workers, supplying the front line by encouraging people to consider the "call" to the ordained ministry, giving them practical advice and guidance. No less important is the support and training which the Society provides for those involved in leading home groups, church worship, children's and youth groups.

As a church we receive a lot of help and encouragement from C.P.A.S. and last year we gave just short of £600 from our Christian Giving programme to C.P.A.S. The Parish Prayer Diary for April will make at least one suggestion per week as to how we can pray for C.P.A.S. Those leading the intercessions in church on Sunday will also include a prayer for this home mission.

#### MISCELLANY

The Missionary Working Fellowship has now established a regular pattern of meetings in the Church Longe on two Monday afternoons per month. #### LETTER FROM KENYA



Mark and Anne Russell-Smith P.O.Nox 18, Kapsabet, Kenya have written their first letter since returning to Kenya in January. Their leave in this country was suddenly disrupted the day after their "deputation visit" to us in November, when Mark's father was killed in a road accident in Kenya. Here are a few extracts from their letter, the full text of which is on the notice board in Church.

"Your support was made visible to us at the time of my father's funeral. I felt your prayers like a wall I was being forced up against, always there, never failing. The Church was packed out for the Memorial Service; black and white seated together, feeling the loss together. All the students from the Bible School had wanted to come, but as it was exam. week the acting Principal said that they would have to be represented instead. Their support and yours through prayers and letters have been a great comfort".

"We managed to squeeze in 10 days with Anne's parents in Norway over Christmas. We did not see the sun at all in this period, but Mark had a white Christmas for the first time in his life. It was a grand family affair with all the traditional Norwegian trimmings on Christmas Eve and a turkey for the English on Christmas Day"

"When we returned to Kenya we were met at the airport in Nairobi by Mark's mother with whom we stayed for a few days before eventually arriving home at Kapsabet to a most warm welcome from staff and students. There was a big party with speeches and cakes and the news that every student had passed his exams."

"Over the next few months selection of new students will be taking place for January 1990. Hopefully a lady teacher from the Church of Ireland will be joining us in April to stand in when one of our staff goes on leave.

FROM OUR INDUSTRIAL MISSIONER . . . . I had the "privilege" of having my last Industrial Mission magazine article partially reprinted in the Bolton Evening News. The paper reproduced large parts of the article accurately, and put across clearly some of the point I had made about Low Pay.

However, the anonymous BEN reporter added his/her own gloss. The two-and-a-half inch deep headline "Bosses who lack morals" set the tone of the piece. The opening paragraph suggested that I had "blasted" tight-fisted bosses. Language which I only use when I am trying to satirise provincial newspapers.

To a certain extent, I have no control over what the BEN does to my article (although it would have been nice if they had actually asked permission to reprint it). I am more concerned about how they used it, and therefore the purpose of publishing a local newspaper.

I recently was looking through a copy of a 1949 edition of the BEN; the contrast was striking. I am not suggesting that we should go back 40 years - that would be a negative move to say the least, but it appears to me that the purpose of the paper in those days was to tell Bolton residents the news. Nowadays, the purpose of most newspapers is to make money. The papers have to create a profit for their owners, and therefore tabloid-style sensationalism and inaccuracies have become common, if not the norm.

The Church regularly includes the media in its prayers - that God might help media management and employees to use their power with responsibility and integrity. We all realise the great influence that they have on people's thinking and actions. Perhaps we ought to add to our prayers the petition that those who work in the newspaper industry might be true to their purpose.

Thank you to all who have contributed to God's work through their regular giving.
