

It really is time, therefore, for us to revise the Song Book. present it contains items which we never sing, probably because they should have never been included. One of the main features of any Billy Graham Mission is its emphasis on prayer. It is a sad fact that though all Christians believe in prayer we are not all that good at getting down to the practical business of In Mission England 4 years ago we were introduced to the idea of Prayer Triplets. This is an arrangement where 3 Christians come together and meet regularly to pray for individual people. not always easy to understand the mechanics of prayer (that is how it works) but it would seem that a large number ofpeople who have become Christians through these missions are those for whom Christians have been praying. To my knowledge at least 2 of these Prayer Triplets have continued to meet more or less weekly ever since at times to the mutual convenience In the triplet of which I am a member we have of their members. broadened our prayer agenda so that in addition to praying for individuals we pray for our church, the wider church and our nation and their respective needs. Mission '89 provides us with the opportunity to revive interest in Prayer Triplets. To this end I am proposing that we have a meeting on Tuesday May 9th at 8.00 pm in the Church Lounge. wish to invite all who may be interested in joining a Prayer Triplet. At this stage my thinking is that we meet fortnightly together Tuesdays May 9th, 23rd, June 6th 20th and that in the weeks in between the newly formed triplets meet separately at times and places decided upon by their members. There was a reasonable response to the Christian Life and Witness Classes held last month when over 400 from different churches attended the weekly meetings in Halliwell. I pray that there will be a better response to this idea of praying together in triplets for people and for Mission '89.

What about politics?


Christian Aid does not support any political party.


