

First and foremost a great big THANK YOU to everyone who has dropped round to see us, or who sent me a card for my ordination, or who has provided something for our larder even before they met us. We certainly feel we have been made most welcome and we look forward not only to getting to know everyone's name but also to getting to know each one of you as friends too.

Thank you too to everyone who has sent us cards to congratulate us on Christopher's birth. At the last count we had received between 50 and 60 cards with more arriving every day. I'm afraid with so many greetings we are very unlikely to get round to acknowledging them all so I should like to take this opportunity to say 'Thank you very much'.

It has been suggested that I ought to try to describe my first impressions of the Church at Deane, but I am aware that first impressions by their very nature are provisional and need to be revised as further information becomes available. So please tell me if my assessment of the situation is inaccurate and please forgive me if I cause offence.

One of the most encouraging first impressions has been the superb work that seems to be going on in Climbers, Explorers, Pathfinders and CYFA. The two younger groups each have about 40 members and which is about 10 people in each year group. Put another way - about twice as many people per year as those over 30 and in our main Sunday morning worship! So congratulations to the Climbers and Explorers. The Pathfinders group I need to get to know better, but the meeting I went to during the holiday period was well attended by both sexes and everyone joined in the activities together. The OFFA group has been particularly encouraging for me. We have had some most enjoyable evenings together and its members are both committed and very open in their discussion of Christian things. So if you are between 14 and 18 and want to join us for an evening, or you know someone who might like to come along, have a word with either Alan Cheetham or me, or simply turn up on Sunday at 7.45 pm at the Memorial Hall.

However, I have been very disappointed to find people so half-hearted about Christianity. For example, before I came to Deane I had never heard of Christians taking a holiday from Church when they have a holiday from work. On the contrary most of my Christian frients take the opportunity when away from home to go to a different church. Another example is the pitiful attendance at the cnetral fellowship meeting. This is the only midweek meeting that people are asked to attend and I doubt wather I have seen more than 10 different faces. I was frankly amazed. How can people who believe that God loved them enough to send His one and only Son to die for them be so casual in their response to his love?

So it is partly in response to this that I am keen to provide the opportunity for people to meet in home groups to discuss their faith and to get to know one another better. Alison and I have been members of various home groups for the last nine years and it has been through these groups that we have learned most about practical Christianity, and have found the support and encouragement of close Christian friends. We have therefore discussed with Roger how we might best establish some home groups here in Deane, and we plan to start some groups in the New Year. With this in mind we are going to run a training course throughout the autumn to train twelve home group leaders and if you would like to be one of these leaders please give your name to Roger or me. I believe that this is one of the main ways in which God is building His Church in Britain to-day, but you know the local situation much better than me, and so whether you are for or against the idea of home groups I would be very pleased to discuss the idea with you so that as the Body of Christ here in Deane we can move forward together.

JOHN PAXTON our Industrial Missioner who asks "Loyalty - to people or ideas?".

CONTRIBUTIONS FROM . . . . .

Loyalty is an odd concept. It would appear, going by the words of his prayer recorded in John 17 that Christ was intensly loyal to his disciples. Other leaders at times demand, unjustly, loyalty from those weaker than themselves. Many ordinary people have found the charge of disloyalty thrown in their faces when they dare to disagree with their leader, partner, or boss.

Loyalty gets mixed up with patriotism, but it is good that as more people visit other countries and experience different cultures, the traditional rallying cry "Our country right or wrong" is challenged more and more. A Prime Minister expects loyalty from all the members of the Cabinet, and the road to political glory is littered with the hopes of MPs who stepped out of line. Winston Churchill, with characteristic satire, wrote in 1949 "The loyalties which centre upon number one (the Prime Minister) are enormous. If he trips who must be sustained, If he makes mistakes they must be covered. If he sleeps he must not be wantonly disturbed. If he is no good he must be pole-axed."

Loyalty must operate in both directions. Companies expect loyalty from their employees, particularly when times are hard. Trade Union leaders expect solidarity from their members in the face of a dispute. Unfortunately we are seeing occasions when companies do not show loyalty to their staff, by forcing them to compete against each other for jobs. We sometimes see Trade Union officials give up the fight, leaving members confused and angry.

Both companies and Trade Unions. need sometimes to be reminded of the often quoted truth that their greatest assets are their people. Keep faith with them.

### LLOYD HODKINSON, the Manager of the Bolton Christian Bookshop

Since it opened in St.Georges Road over 15 years ago, this shop has served the Churches of Bolton and district to an ever increasing degree. It is not a commercial venture however. It is part of the Christian Missionary Society called "Operation Mobilisation". Though I personally receive a wage, the shop can only function if I have the support of voluntary helpers from the local churches. Though experience as a sales assistant isn't essential it could be helpful. If you could give on a regular basis a few hours each week, in the morning, over lunch or in the afternoon, then please call in the shop and talk it over with me. Though the work is voluntary and therefore not paid, we do provide lunch and travelling expenses are re-imbursed.

### PAUL DENBY, the Diocesan Director of Ordinands

POTLIGHT ON

CAREFORCE is an organisation which enables young people to give a year of their lives in useful service in a needy situation where their faith can be put to the test. It exists primarily to serve Churches and Christian organisations in this country by placing the volunteers where practical help is most needed. The range of the work is wide, e.g. clerical; maintenance, outreach, youth work. Whilst most of the work is church based, some volunteers work amongst the disabled and homeless. Nearly all the placements are in some of the toughest and most deprived areas of the United Kingdom.

This month Alison Jackson is going as a Careforce Volunteer to Islington, one of London's most deprived boroughs. She will be attached to All Saints Church, Caledonian Road, about 5 minutes walk from St.Pancras Station. Islington is a mixture of rough, high rise council estates and large Victorian terraced houses, which can now fetch up to £400,000. Alison will be living and working in the Council estates! In fact, she will be living at the King Edward VII pub. Though the church membership is very samll (average attendance on Sundays is about 30 adults) it is growing, and it is making a most imaginative use of its resources. For example, it has sold its rather antiquated church hall which stood on a valuable site, and has bought the pub where Alison will be living. It is being developed into a non-alcoholic pub and community centre as a basis for outreach, and for providing accommodation for staff apstairs.

In a sense, Alison will be creating her own job. She envisages it involving a certain amount of church administration in which she hopes to be able to train lay members to take over when she leaves. Perhaps more importantly, she sees herself doing pastoral work with the women of the church who make up the majority of the congregation. They include single mothers, widows and women whose husbands are not committed Christians and who often resent their wives having anything to do with the Church.

Careforce have written asking us to regard Alison as a "nome missionary" whom we have sent to Islington. To that end they wish to encourage us to commission her, and this we shall do in Family Communion at 10.30am on September 3rd. She will need the support of our prayers too; because part of the toughness of this assignment will be the loneliness that comes from being separated from her friends and peer-group at University..

# SPORLIGHT ON. . . . . THEO CHURCH URBAN FUND

September 17 - .24 is being observed thoughout the country as Church Urban Fund Week. "Light" is the theme of the week, and this will be symbolised by the lighting of candles, both in a central celebratory service to be held in Coventry Cathedral on Friday September 22nd, and at parish churches throughout the country in special services on either September 17th or 24th. Each parish has been supplied with 50 candles, and it is hoped that a million candles will be lit during the week in churches and homes. These candles are small nightlights in red plastic holders, surrounded by white writing - Church Urban Fund. Though they are not for sale, it is suggested that people make a donation of £1 or more for each candle which will be available from September 3rd onwards. They can be lit in the special service which will be held in Family Communion on September 17th at 10.30am.

N.B. As a congregation, we are committed to contributing £2,600 to this fund over the 4 year period 1988-92. We are now in the second year and so far we have sent £751. Because Manchester Diocese has the highest concentration of Victorian Priority Areas outside London, we are already receiving in grants more than we are contributing to the central fund. Six projects within our diocese have been approved, including two in Bolton.

Included in the newletter this month is a nationally produced newspaper inset giving up to date news about the Church Urban Fund and the kind of projects it is aiding.
