

The Parish Office at the Rectory, 234 Wigan Road (61819) is open on Saturdays from 10.00 to 11.00 a.m. to deal with initial enquiries for Baptism and Banns of Marriage.

For several years now we have waited until the autumn before taking our summer heliday. This year we chose to return to Turkey. Because we didn't start foreign helidays until 3 years ago we have got a lot of catching up to do. Consequently we don't plan to visit the same place twice, at least for some time. However, Turkey is such a massive country that we felt justified in going there again, but of course to a different part - this time to Mediterranean Turkey, north of Cyprus.

Mount Ararat where Noah's Ark Turkey is of course one of the Bible lands. In the early days of Christianity St. Paul came to rest is in Eastern Turkey. and his travelling companions covered vast distances on their 3 missionary journeys establishing Christian Churches at places which are almost household names for readers of the New Testament e.g. Ephesus and Galatia. Though we did enjoy relaxing on the sunny beach and swimming in the warm sea we also spent time looking at some of the ruins of these historic places where St. Paul went on his We also went on an organised tour deep into the heart first missionary journey. of the country to see the fascinating landscape in Cappadocia where the whole area is covered by a thick volcanic ash from a volcano which erupted millions This ash called 'Tuff' is a very soft rock, and out of it underof years ago. ground cities were created by earlier generations of Christians seeking refuge from the Arab armies in the 7th and later centuries.

Though we had an excellent holiday our first reaction on being shown our room when we arrived in the middle of the night was 'What on earth have we come te?' Though the travel brochure described our little hotel as 'select' it was very basic. For example, there were no chairs in the room; no carpets and only a very small single wardrobe. However, it was clean because Moslems (and Turkey is 99% Moslem) place great emphasis upon cleanliness. After a while I chided myself for what I considered to be very basic was in fact palatial as compared with the permanent accommodation in which millions of our fellow human beings live. Moreover, a Christian doctor whom we met confirmed that it was luxurious as compared with what he lived in a number of years ago when serving as a missionary doctor. In the words of that Christian Aid Week slogan of a few years ago we in the prosperous west do need to 'Live more simply so that others may simply live'.

We were strongly advised to purchase bottled water and never to drink from the tap. Again I was reminded how fortunate we were in having water from a tap to wash and from a bottle to drink when so many millions have neither. The only water they have is contaminated and causes continuous illness and premature death. Therelief agencies that we support, Tear Fund and Christian Aid, both place great emphasis on helping the poor and destitute to obtain supplies of good fresh water through the sinking of wells.

When we complain about our 8% inflation rate this is nothing as compared with the 80% inflation experienced in Turkey at the moment. For example a can of Fanta which 2 years ago cost 400 lire is now 1000 or 1500 lire. The entrance fee to historic sites which was 500 lire is now 5000 lire. However, the mind boggles when you go to a country like Peru where the inflation rate is 2000%. A garage or shop will put up its prices 2 or 3 times a day! Elizabeth and Olive Plant were in Peru in August, and have some excellent examples of the depreciating value of Peruvian bank notes.

For the vast majority of us our salaries, wages and pensions are either 'index linked' or actually ahead of the rate of inflation. For this we need to be profoundly grateful. I sincerely hope that as you come to review your level of giving to God's work through our Church (something I always encourage you to do in November each year as the new sets of Christian Giving Envelopes are distributed) you will use the inflation rate as a guide for increasing your giving and not as an excuse for maintaining the 'status quo'. Indeed not to increase our giving means that in real terms we are giving less than a year ago.

If you're like me, then you get very confused when people use initials instead of using full words. I'll give you an e.g. (sorry, example) 'Don't forget to tell R.J. to sort out the next M.U. A.S.A.P.' and 'Did you hear about C.R.? He got 9 G.C.S.E's all at A's and B's, and now he's doing three A's and two S's, all to read P.P. and E at the U of L!'

So, if CYFA is a bit of a mystery to you, then I hope the following will help:

Q1: What DOES CYFA stand for?

CYFA = 'Church Youth Fellowship Association'.

Q2: What do you do?

We meet regularly, usually each week, (but sometimes more often), to meet each other, to share the good news of God's love for each one of us, and to worship Him.

Q3: Where do you meet?

Usually we meet in the Church Lounge, but sometimes in each other's houses, at other Church youth meetings, at concerts, theatres and even in the Church itself'.

Q4: When do you meet?

Most Sunday evenings, after the evening service at 7.45 pm. finishing at about 10.00 pm and other times as announced.

Q5: Who can come?

Anyone aged 14-18 years who would like to come and find out what CYFA is like.

Q6: Why do you have CYFA?

We believe young people are a vital part of the Church, and that they have an important part to play in our Christian fellowship. Without our young people, we are not a complete Church or 'body' of Christians. In CYFA we seek to provide both for the spiritual needs of young people, and for their social needs in a caring Christian context.

Q7: Do you just sit round in a holy huddle and sing hymns?

NO! I can't think of anything more boring (apart from watching Bob's Full House!) Here's a list of some of the things we're involved in right now:

Leading the Sunday Evening CYFA Service
Having a Pizza Social Evening after the CYFA Service
Ten-Pin Bowling Social Evening
Visit to hear Garth Hewitt in Broken Images (Concert)
Chinese Banquet at local chinese restaurant
Visit to the Theatre Church to see mime, acting and music
CYFA Holiday Houseparties every year during summer holidays

Q8: Why have you written this article?

Because we want YOU (if you're a young person) to join our CYFA group. Don't stay at home pretending to do your homework and really watching Howard's Way - it'll rot your mind. Don't make excuses for not coming like it's too cold, too dark or too much trouble. Come to CYFA and find out for yourself if it's all a waste of time, or if it really is worth joining. Come this week - we'll be really glad to see you - whoever you are.


