

Now, let's see....have I FORGOTTEN anybody?

Thinking Christians find Christmas quite a problem. We ve to celebrate the coming of the Son of God into our world. We enjoy singing the carols. We appreciate the splendid meals. We look forward to spending Christmas with our families. Yet as Christmas Day approaches, all we seem to see around us are the preparations for a festival of extravagant materialism which millions welcome as a gigantic 'booze up' and 'blow out' without one single thought of Christ - well illustrated in the above cartoon.

There are really two tragedies about Christmas. One is that whilst we feast, millions around the world go hungry and many will starve to death. This is the global tragedy. I will not grow weary of reminding you that it is our Christian responsibility to support the relief agencies in what they are doing to alleviate this tragedy. That is why I want you to support our annual Christmas Appeal which this year will be going to Tear Fund's world wide work amongst refugees in the needy countries around the world the Vietnamese Boat People in Hong Kong, the victims of the internal conflict in Mozambique, the displaced persons on the Thai/Cambodian border, the Afghan refugees in Pakistan. In each of these cases Tear Fund is providing practical assistance, counselling and much needed support in situations of stress and trauma.

Many of us will be quite happy to pay between £20 and £25 for a Christmas meal for 2 persons in a restaurant and give between £1 and £2 as a tip. How about supporting the Christmas Appeal to the level of a Christmas meal rather than as the level of a tip?

The second tragedy is that even here in our own country there are millions of people, children and adults, who will be showered with presents and stuffed with turkey and mince pies, but who will not have the remotest idea of who Jesus is or what Christmas is really all about. This is the local tragedy. The glitter of Christmas they know. The Son of God they do not know.

A child in school assured his teacher that he knew Jesus was born under a star and then added "I wonder what star he was born under? I was born under Leo....."

When a youth leader held a sheet containing the words of a Christian song in front of a youth group one of the lads pointed to the word 'Jesus'on the sheet and said "Eh, you've got a swear word in there!"

I do want to encourage you to pray for those of us in the communicating business - the teachers in our congregation, both day school and Sunday school, the youth leaders, the clergy, the Christian broadcasters. May those to whom we seek to communicate - these who may well know all about horoscopes, but who as yet know very little about the Christ to whom the star of Bethlehem led those wise men long ago - may they come to see Jesus and worship Him this Christmas.

My colleagues and our wives send you our love and best wishes for this Christian festive season.


1. We leave the church uncleaned every fifth week

In October last year, the total amount given was £2488. The increase in the level of giving is only 2.8% which is below the current rate of inflation. The treasurer is encouraging us to increase our level of giving by at least the level of inflation as we review what we give through our church when using the new sets of Christian Giving Envelopes this month.

Every year our Church Council budgets to give away to missions and charities a proportion of the income it receives. The actual amount is 12% of our income plus 33% of the proceeds from the annual Autumn Fayre. This year this "global sum" amounts to £5005. Added to this "global sum" is what is given at the Lent, Harvest and Christmas Appeals plus individual donations to specific causes through the church treasurer. Members of the Mission Support Committee are in the process of sending cheques for the following amounts and in due course the thank you letters which they receive will be displayed on the Church notice board.
