## THE RECTOR WRITES...



28th April, 1990

The attendance at our recent Annual Parochial Church Meeting was most encouraging. Equally encouraging was the fact that there had to be elections for the new Churchwardens and Church councillors because the number of nominations exceeded the number of places to be filled. Though the voting process prolongs the length of the meeting it is good that Church members have the opportunity of exercising a choice. Moreover I'm sure that the fact, together with the pleasant atmosphere of the meeting under Robin Hazlehurst's chairmanship, were answers to the prayers of those who had prepared for the meeting in a thoughtful and prayerful manner.

I wish to commend to you the new midweek programme of Home Groups and Central Fellowship which meet on alternate weeks between now and the Bolton Holidays. At these groups we shall be considering a selection of the Psalms. Whenever there is a popularity poll or a discussion about the contents of our Sunday worship the psalms appear to come out bottom of the list. I'm sure this has a lot to do with the extreme difficulty which ordinary congregations like our own experience in singing the psalms to traditional When, however, we discover that it is perfectly in order to read them or to sing them in a metrical form, as is the tradition in Scotland, then the psalms increase in popularity. Without many of us realising it, some of our most popular hymns .g. Praise my soul the King of Heaven, The Lord's my Shepherd, I'll not want, O God our help in ages past etc.) are all paraphrases of the psalms. Generations of men and women have discovered what a rich treasury of spirituality they contain and our lives are impoverished if we neglect them. Thus I pray that this short two month programme of considering eight of the psalms will be a spiritually enriching experience. details of the programme are contained in a brochure which is available in Church.

One of this year's confirmation candidates asked me this question "What do people say in their prayers when they return to their seats after receiving communion?" short answer is that I don't know for I don't hear what they pray. I offer my own suggestion and here it is:

> "I thank you Heavenly Father that your Son left us this memorial of His death on my behalf. Grant that as I have received the bread and wine through my lips, so I may also receive His body and blood in my heart by faith with thanksgiving. Cleanse me from my past sins and strengthen me now to follow the example of His most holy life in fellowship with my fellow Christians through Jesus Christ our Lord".

John Paxton, our Industrial Chaplain who writes about "A Young Man's Death Tragedy" The death of any person normally gives rise to feelings of grief, loss and pain, but the death of a young man or woman, particularly if it is sudden, comes as a sharper shock. If that person also happens to be "in the prime of life" and successful in work or socially, then we are brought up short, at least for a while.

If that person is a 40 year old manager in charge of over twenty people, is always cheerful, and enjoys a full leisure life, then questions begin to form. I do not want to explore the answers to the insistent "Why?", although that is important enough, but rather to see what issues arise in our minds about priorities, the pace of life and our own expectations.

The above description is of a real employee in a local company. When he died, the shock felt by his colleagues and staff was understandably deep. But as the days passes, the overwhelming topic of conversation was about the stresses of modern working life, the continual pressure of meeting targets and controlling costs, and the way in which the human body and spirit react to this busy life. People began to ask serious questions about values, and needs, and whether work, as they experience it, was worth all the risk. Health, rest and peace of mind were seen as more important than continual growth, and the emphasis on "achievement" and "efficiency".

These are spiritual matters. True fulfillment is found in ways other than long hours hyperactivity and unreal economic goals. We all need to get the balance right.

For the first time ever last year we broke the £1,000 barrier in the house-to-house collection in that section of our parish for which we as a Church are responsible. #### SPOTLIGHT ON THE MISSION AND UNIT GROUP

Pat Sewell writes :-

"Our group was formed two years ago and is composed of ordinary men and women from our church who were invited to look specifically at 'Local Mission' rather than Overseas Mission. As well as this, we were asked to examine ways of encouraging the links between the churches of all denominations in the locality.

At first, we seemed to lack a clearly defined purpose and consequently we didn't appear to be getting anywhere.

Then we were introduced to a method of evangelism called "Good News Down the Street", and after reading a booklet and listening to the tapes, telling us about the scheme, we met together to discuss our reactions. The result was a positive decision to give the scheme a trial. We thought we would like to share with you what has happened since.

Briefly "Good News Down the Street" works like this. A group composed three members of our Church (either two men and one woman or two women and one man) visit a couple at their home. The invitation to visit results from previous discussions between the couple and the Rector, during which they have expressed an interest in learning more about the Christian faith. The object of the visits is for us to look at St.Luke's Gospel during a simple course of six one hour sessions using notes to guide us and for us to share with together what being a Christian means to us. As we talk about our hopes and fears and our past experience, our sessions soon become a meeting of friends, which we look forward to each succeeding week until, at the end of the six week course, we have <u>all</u> learned a lot more about each other. The couple we have visited know at least three more friends from Church with whom they can relate, and, most important of all, the visitors and the visited have come understand something more about the Gospel of Christ, in an informal In this way, members of the atmosphere in the comfort of their own homes. Church at Deane are able to share "The Good News Down Your Street.
