

THE RECTOR WRITES...



25th September, 1990.

The first week of October (September 29th-October7th) has been designated as Church Urban Fund (C.U.F.) Week. The newspaper entitled "Sounds of Life" which accompanies this copy of the Deane Church News is an extremely informative production giving us up-to-date news of the many and varied projects in our diocese which are being supported by the C.U.F. I warmly commend its reading to you. Because Manchester Diocese has more parishes in areas of urban priority than any other diocese it is not surprising that we are nett receivers from the C.U.F. As a congregation we are committed to contributing £2,600 over a 4 year period and we are now in the third year (i.e. £650 per year). The treasurer will welcome personal contributions during C.U.F. Week for the more that is specifically given in this week, the less will have to be taken from the money set aside through our Christian Giving Programme for missions and charities.

"The Earth is the Lord's......the Task is ours" is the title of this year's Tear Fund Harvest presentation in connection with our annual Harvest Appeal. In recent years there has been a growing concern over environmental or "green" issues. The Bible makes it abundantly clear that though God has created the earth He has given us the task of being ts stewards, to look after it. Our sinhas been that mankind has exercised a poor stewardship by selfishly exploiting its resources. Though some will still prefer to donate a traditional harvest gift of fruit, vegetables or flowers, it is my hope that the majority of us will make a donation to the Harvest Appeal using one of the special envelopes This year the money will go to Tear Fund who are working closely with the local Church in Honduras seeking to protect the Indians and the environment on which they depend. many other rural communities they are under threat from those who wish to exploit the The video which will be shown at the Tear Fund Harvest situation for quick financial gain. Lunch on Sunday October 14th will demonstrate what is already being done in Honduras. you have not been to one of those before do join us this time from 12 noon to about 1.15 pm. Tickets costing 50p for adults are available at Church. Help with decorating the Church for harvest will be appreciated on the Saturday morning from 9.30 - 11.30 am.

My colleagues and I are most grateful to those of you who have responded to our request in last month's newsletter with ideas and suggestions for the series of addresses on the subject of <u>Prayer</u> which we are planning to give this autumn. Though there will be a single theme for each of the six Sundays there will be a different preacher in the morning from the evening so that the few who attend more than one service will not be given a repeat. The programme is as follows:-

October 21 "Coming to the Father...."

October 28 ".....with praise and thanksgiving"

November 4 "Prayer changes people - ourselves and others"

November 11 "Prayer changes events and situations"

November 18 "Opportunities to pray"

November 25 "Postcript - answering your questions".

When Jesus taught His disciples to pray He introduced them to the model prayer commonly known as the "Lord's Prayer". But what does it really mean? At the 8.00 am service of Holy Communion we shall give a series of short addresses on each of the phrases in this familiar prayer.

Finally, in answer to a request which we received for a suggested prayer for use at the beginning of a Church service the following by Archbishop William Temple (a former Bishop of Manchester) would be hard to improve:

"Father, help me to worship you in spirit and in truth, that my conscience may be quickened by your holiness, my mind nourished by your truth, my imagination purified by your beauty, my heart opened to your love, my will surrendered to your purpose. May all this be gathered up in adoration as I, with my fellow worshippers, ascribe glory praise and honour to you alone, through Jesus Christ our Lord".

CONTRIBUTIONS FROM.....

John Paxton, our Industrial Missioner, on "Live Worship in Times of Trouble"
I recently attended a funeral service and a memorial service for a friend of ours, a young man killed in a car crash. The funeral service was positive, hopeful, and forward-looking. The resurrection was "preached" by and through the worship. The second service was unfortunately sombre and heavy - one person described it afterwards as "glum".

I mention this because it demonstrated to me that the Church as a whole is haphazard in the way it deals with the sadnesses or crises of life - death, unemployment, divorce, poverty, stress at work, serious minfortune. The Church is good at providing care and support, but our worship could be more related to the emotions, needs and future hopes of the people in trouble.

For those churches whose worship follows a set order and form of words week by week, any attempt to link the service beyond the sermon and the intercessions, to a felt need is difficult. The form of service used in Free churches perhaps lends itself more easily to sensitive adjustment.

Most important, however, whatever the structure of the worship, is the atmosphere which is promoted by the minister and congregation together. Not all services need to be bubbling with unrestrained exuberance, but surely our worship should both reflect the situation of the congregation each week, and also influence the worshippers in their thinking and living.

Worship of a living God should be alive. Worship that is alive should relate closely to the lives of the worshippers.


