

THE RECTOR WRITES...



24th November, 1990

If this is the first time you have seen this 'Christmas Unwrapped' logo I sincerely hope it wont be your last!

For many people Christmas means nothing more than being the great annual festival for However, many people still believe it has something vaguely to indulging ourselves. do with the Christian religion. For instance, it is estimated that 17 million people will attend a Church this Christmas, which is about 10 million more than on an average So what an opportunity to present the Christian Christmas! Sunday.

Christmas Unwrapped is a national project supported by many of the Christian organisations and societies in this country. It is designed to unwrap the true message of Christmas.

It is about putting Christ back into Christmas. Though it is a national project which will have a high profile in the press, radio and television it is left to local churches to work out how best to carry out these worth-In our case we shall be making use while objectives. of the posters and of the logo on the leaflet announc-In addition ing details of our Christmas services. we shall be using some of suggestions being made to introduce freshness into services which are always in danger of falling into a rut. Let us pray that this

Christmas will be one which many people will be able to look back upon with profound gratitude as being the time when the wrappings and trappings of Christmas were removed

for the first time in their lives to reveal its true meaning.

Once again I make no apologies for commending to you our annual Christmas Appeal for Tear Fund. As we remember the birth of Jesus, who though He was rich yet became poor, we remember those who lack what we take for granted. Tear Fund's special focus this

Christmas is to be the 'Silent Plight' of thousands of famine victims in Angola and others in the front-line states of Southern Africa who are suffering the effects of war and drought.

In Angola alone an estimated 900,000 people are in immediate danger, and up to 2 million are affected by severe hunger. Tear Fund, like other relief agencies, is providing emergency food supplies to those affected. CHRISTIAN CONCERN IN A WORLD OF NEED To draw attention to their plight Tear Fund has produced

a series of three hard hitting posters based on three popular carols. 'O come let us IGNORE them', 'Infant lowly, DYING slowly', 'SILENT PLIGHT, holy night'. hang from the pillars in Church this month and are well worth pondering.

I wish to place on record our gratitude to the team of volunteers who each month give of their time to put together the Deane Church News and the Parish Prayer Diary. I and my colleagues and our wives wish to send our Christmas greeting to all who read this monthly newsletter.

John Paxton, our Industrial Missioner, "I just can't take any more". Pains across the chest, aching jaws or neck muscles, tenseness, dread of going to work - have you experienced any of these in the last day or two? These symptons, along with others, are clear indications that you might be experiencing stress related to your work.

When does ordinary stimulating pressure become destructive stress? At the point when you feel unable to cope with the demands that are expected of you. These demands may come from your company, or your boss, from greed, the false expectations of other people, competition, ambition. Added to other factors like bereavement, worries about children, moving house, or retirement and you have all the ingredients for a stress related illness

Latest Government figures for such illnesses have shown significant increases over the last few years. Working days lost through heart disease rose from 33 million in 1983/4 to 45 million in 1987/8. This represents a staggering cost to British Industry, but also to the nation's economy in terms of health care provision.

Christian teaching provides little realistic help for those suffering from work-related stress. It is too easy to say, "Change your job. Drop out for a while". The concept of "The peace of God" needs to be balanced with the acceptance that many employees are powerless to radically alter their work practices and conditions. To cope with stress is not enough. The causes of stress - in the workplace, in society's over-high expectations - need to be recognised and removed. Can the Church help tocreate a more balanced, human-scale, working environment?

Ron Morris on "We are growing at a price" That is the title of an article in a national newspaper earlier this year. It followed the publication of the annual report of the Central Statistical Office.

Following references in the report to signs of greater prosperity, such as the number of people owning company shares, or microwaves, or taking two or more holidays a year, the article went on to say that this prosperity went hand in hand with rising levels of debt and greater loneliness, with the fact that more people, many of them elderly, live by themselves and that 14% of children live in one parent families. This suggests a price is being paid, notably by children. The Church may take heart from the fact that our marriage rate is the highest in the European Community and that in 1988 57% of all weddings took place in Church. But this should not mask the astonishing fact that in the same year 25% of all babies were born outside marriage.

It is a complex and worrying situation, to which there is no easy answer. Perhaps as a society we shall have to learn from our mistakes, until we come to realise that unless our patterns of behaviour reflect Christian values, we cannot achieve happiness and genuine prosperity.

In the corresponding period last year the amount given was £2123, thus the increase in the level of giving is of the order of 12% and therefore abreast of inflation.

On your behalf our Church Council sets aside a sum of money to give to missions and charities. They don't wait until the end of the year to see what they can afford; instead they have a formula for determining a "global sum" and this they budget to give away early in the year. The formula is made up of two components - 12% of the previous years' income and 33% of the proceeds of the previous year's autumn fayre. This year the global sum amounted to £5760. In addition to this global sum we also send what is given through the special appeals at Lent, Harvest and Christmas, together with donations from individuals and organisations which are received by the treasurer. Cheques are now being sent out by those who attended the meeting on November 6th, when decisions were taken on how the global sum should be sub-divided. In due course, the "thank you" letters will be posted on the Church notice board.
