

I have been most encouraged that a good number of peoplehave been reading Archbishop George Carey's little book "The Church in the Market Place" which I commended last month. Though it is an exciting story of how a relatively small congregation tackled some enormou problems under his leadership, and in the process grew from strength to strength, it is by no means a success story from beginning to end. They had their full quota of setbacks and disappointments on the way. For the most part their divisions were between those members who were complacent and wanted things to remain just as they were, and those who were the visionaries having caught a vision of what they believed God wanted for their Church in Durham as we approach the end of the millenium.

In our Lent programme of mid week home groups we have been encouraged to dream dreams and to get a vision of what God would like our Church in Deane to be like at the end of this decade. At our annual meeting earlier this week I shared with those present just one aspect of the vision I have, and because one of those present has encouraged me to share it with the wider audience whe read this newsletter I propose to repeat something I said on that occasion. I would love to see a greater unity amongst Church members in three areas which at present are areas of conflict. misunderstanding and disunity.

In making a blea for unity in the realm of music I do not mean that we should all have the same likes and dislikes; that could only lead to a drab uniformity. Instead it means that I will not insist that everyone else must have the same tastes as myself and that I will be sensitive to the preferences of others. It is a very painful expression of our disunity when some of us deliberately absent ourselves from Church on those occasions when some of the hymns and songs are accompanied by the Music Group rather than the organ. Equally sad is when people suggest that if an item isn't in the Deane Church Song Book it can't be worth singing! If our worship is to be worthy of God and emotionally and intellectually satisfying to ourselves we need a balanced combination of the new and the ol

The second area where I would love to see a deeper unity is in a recognition of the importance of worship and fellowship. Whereas some of us find the informality and intimacy of a house group more helpful than public worship, there are others who feel more secure in the structured and more formal Sunday worship than we imagine we would feel in a midweek fellowship group. The simple fact is that they are not alternatives from which we pick and choose. We need them both for they compliment each other by supplying what Cur Christian lives are impoverished without worship and fellowship. the other lacks.

The third area of conflict is when we place the practical and spiritual in watertight compartments. Some of us are very practical and get things done, whilst others are content to talk and pray. Others of us are concerned when the Church Council appears to spend most of its time discussing practical and material things and gives little time and space for a discussion on things spiritual. Once again it is wrong to see these as opposites. The one should be the outworking of the other. The Christian attitude to finance is a good illustration of this. All would agree that money is an intensely practical matter, but the problems which many individual Christians and Churches have with money are not financial but spiritual. If we really were obedient to what the Bible teaches about Christian giving by giving regularly, sacrificially and in direct proportion to our income then our financial problems would disappear overnight.

During the past five weeks the average attendance of different adults of 17+ years of age has been 217. In order to meet our obligations and commitments both inside and outside the parish we need a weekly income in excess of £800. As a matter of rough justice it means that on average each one of those 217 adults should contribute about £4 per week each week. Clearly some will and do give considerably more, but equally clearly many give considerably If we give less than the average is it because we are numbered amongst those whose income is less than average, or is it because what we give to God has a lower priority than it ought to have? This is an intensely spiritual and practical question which all Church members ought to be asking themselves.

I conclude by drawing your attention to two important events in April. In the context of the evening Communion Service on April 14th we shall commission those who were elected to serve on the Church Council at the annual meeting. They are:



Nellie Woodward who will give an illustrated talk April 2 on her visit to India.




