

THE RECTOR WRITES...



31st August.1991.

I was recently most encouraged to read an article in one of the free papers entitled "Speaking out on Family Life". It was written by Tom Sackville M.P. who represents one of the two parliamentary constituencies within our extensive parish. written to tell him so.

Thoughtful people, and I hope that includes all Church members who read this monthly newsletter, cannot help but be concerned about family matters and moral issues. There have been some alarming trends in recent years such as the increase in illegitimate births (now 1 in 4), the failure of first marriages (1 in 3) and of second marriages (1 in 2) and the fact that many couples who approach us about marriage nowadays are in fact asking us to legitimise their existing 'common law' relationships which have been going on for years. In addition we have the high incidence of crimes of robbery from homes and the stealing of vehicles to say nothing about the abuse and misuse of drugs.

It would, of course, be completely unfair to place the blame for this decline in family life and morality upon the politicians of any one party. Moreover, the situation will not be cured, and the problems will not be solved by the passing of new and harsher laws. . However, those who frame the laws in parliament do have an important role to play for good laws can at least curb the moral decline, and bad laws will only make the position worse. For this reason I welcome the meeting that has been called within the Bolton West Constituency on Friday September 20th at 8,00 p.m. in Church Road Primary School Halliwell. The purpose of this meeting will be to enable the prospective parliamentary candidates from the 3 main political parties - Tom Sackville M.P. (Conservative) Clifford Morris (Labour) and Barbara Ronson (Liberal Democrat) - to speak for 10 - 15 minutes on subjects such as marriage, sexuality, and the value of life. This will be followed by a question and answer Hopefully, as well as showing the speakers the importance which Christians attach to the protection of family life, the meeting should provide those attending with a clearer idea of where to cast their votes in the General Election which is due within the next 9 months. I am planning to attend and I warmly commend it to you.



I hope I don't need to remind you of the March for Jesus on Saturday 14th September about which I wrote last month. I see this as an important occasion for demonstrating in Bolton that Christianity is not a lost cause. I hope you will join with me in identifying yourself with our fellow Christians from other congregations in the town by joining in the March from Queen's Park, and by taking part in the short Open Air Service in Victoria Square. If it really is impossible for you to take part in the March then do please pray for it that it may be an effective form of Christian witness to the town. In addition-

to praying for the event on Sundays in Church there will be a united gathering for prayer at the Claremont Christian Centre on St. George's Road, Tuesday, September 10th at 7.30 pm.

"Radio Cracker"

Here are 3 disturbing facts:

FACT There are up to 500,000 teenage prostitutes in Brazil. Some as young as 12.

FACT More than 30% of the World's population are young people under the age of 15.

FACT Water is essential to life, yet the water available to about 2 billion of earth's inhabitants is contaminated. It is believed to cause 25 - 30 million deaths a year, about 69% of them being children under 5.

It makes you think doesn't it? But does it make you act? Two Christian organisations with a good track record for action - Oasis Trust and Tear Fund - are tackling these issues but they need our support. To raise money for Third World youth needs they are launching an exciting new project called "Radio Cracker". About 100 towns throughout the U.K. are setting up local radio stations to broadcast for the period November 24 th to December 24th. It will be manned by young people and will have a strong Christian basis. Its aim is twofold:

- i to encourage young people to put their faith into action and to become more aware of Third World issues.
- ii to raise money for young people in the Third World by sponsorship, advertising and donations.

A number of local Churches have taken the lead and there will be a local launch of this project with a concert in St. Peter's Church Halliwell on Saturday September 7th at 7.30 pm. Tickets cost £1.50 and are available from the clergy and Pathfinder and CYFA leaders.

Then on Sunday September 15th at 8.00 pm in the Theatre Church Astley Bridge, there will be a "Talent Shop" where you can come and hear about all the different jobs and see where you can fit in.

Vocation Conferences


