

## THE RECTOR WRITES...



24th September, 1991.

Though I personally don't go in much for marches and "demos" I nevertheless found it encouraging to be a part of the recent March for Jesus. God only knows whether as a result of it any non-believers were led to faith. What I do know is that any neutral observer could not help but notice the size of the procession, the demonstration of unity from a diverse range of 50 Churches and the joyfulness of those who were marching. I think that an annual event along those lines is much to be preferred to the individual Church processions on "Sermons Day" which are becoming less and less each year. At least 70 of our members were taking part. What do you think?

Then I found it encouraging at the Family Service last Sunday to see how many of our members are actually involved in the leadership and teaching of the children and young people committed by God to our care. Though I didn't actually count the number, I must confess that I hadn't realized there were so many. Nevertheless, there are still areas where we are weak and understaffed, and we need more helpers who are prepared to give of their time and skills in leading and teaching the young. This is an important and responsible task, and as the commissioning service so rightly reminded, the rest of us have a duty to uphold and support these people by praying regularly for them. The monthly parish prayer diary (do you make use of this?) usually suggests that we do this at least once a month.

I found it encouraging to see that last year our Harvest Appeal raised over £500 for relief work in the Third World, and we were still able to distribute about 150 harvest gifts locally. We have had bumper crops of various fruits and vegetables in our garden this summer, but I'm very conscious that this is not everyone's experience. It certainly isn't the experience in at least 16 countries on the African continent where drought and poor harvests appear to be endemic year after year. This year's Harvest Appeal, about which there is more detailed information on a separate leaflet which is freely available in Church, is on behalf of Tear Fund's long term schemes to overcome these problems by sinking wells, arresting de-forestation and teaching better agricultural techniques. A video about these schemes will be shown at the annual Tear Fund Harvest Lunch after the Family Service on Harvest Sunday.

Finally, I found it encouraging that a good number of our Pathfinder and CYFA members went on venture holidays once again this year. I gladly hand over the rest of this page to a report which 3 of the girls have written.

Ron Morris writes on "The Decade and You"
