

THE RECTOR WRITES...



22nd October, 1991

It had been my intention to write an update and sequel to the congregational letter which I sent from my bedside whilst detained in hospital in Rhodes. However, in the event of Major Crook's death yesterday evening what I had planned can be "put on ice" for a month or so. Suffice it to say how grateful Mary and I are for your generosity to us and for your prayers for us during these recent weeks. And what a warm, spontaneous welcome we received both when we returned to our home at a late hour on October 16th and subsequently in Church last Sunday! These expressions of your love have meant a lot to us.

When I was invited nearly 17½ years ago to succeed Kenneth Bishop I made a list as long as my arm is to why I should remain in S.E. London. However, my brother Brandon, persuaded me to come north. "Roger", he said "you really must give this parish your most serious consideration. You will meet a man called Major Crook who is 'the salt of the Lancashire earth' ". A little while later we came on our initial visit leaving the M6 at junction 22. There we were met by this redoubtable Major Crook at an old farm barn near Kenyon. Whenever we pass this rendezvous spot we always trink of Major, and we always will. Many of you have known him for a much longer period than myself and are, therefore, better able to write a tribute to him than I am, but I do want to say that in this relatively short period he has never once failed to live up to my brother's description of him being "the salt of the Lancashire earth".

In addition to his long period of service to Deane Church as a Church Councillor for 58 years, a Churchwarden for 37 years and as the very best Church Treasurer I have ever known he has also served as a school governor at Canon Slade School and at our own St. Mary's C.E. Primary School. As a trustee of several Bolton Charities he has placed his financial expertise at their disposal. However, it is as loyal Christian brother and friend that I shall always wish to remember him. We were able to share each other's confidence in the knowledge that there would be no breach. We didn't always see eye to eye, and when we differed he would invariably take the initiative in seeking to resolve our differences in private so that we could in all honesty present a united front in public. On the few occasions when this was not possible, and we voted in different ways, he was never sulky or angry, nor would he bear any grudge against me and others who differed from him. In a word Major was loyal to the "nth degree".

He was also selfless. This could be seen in his business and Church life. By trade he was a coal merchant, and in its hey day his firm supplied fuel to many of the cotton mills in Bolton and Farnworth. With the demise of solid fuel the time came when the firm was no longer profitable, but he continued trading at a loss for quite some time in order to keep his 2 remaining employees in a job. In every Church where there selflessness was also to be seen in his Church life. in some spiritual life there is a degree of tension between the "traditionalists" It is the extremists in both camps who either cannot or and the "progressives". will not see any point of view other than their own. Major was unashamedly a He much preferred the old prayer book to the new one, and Hymns A & M to the Deane Song Book, but he most emphatically was not an extremist. came to Church to worship God not to celebrate things ancient. Consequently he would not deliberately stay away when the order of service was not what he preferred.

Undoubtedly the secret of his loyalty and selflessness was his Christian faith. His daily devotional time of prayer and Bible reading, and his weekly attendance at Church beginning with the early morning communion service were Major's highest priorities in what has been a very long, busy and active life. I'm sure I'm not alone in thanking God for Major and for every remembrance I have of him.

ALCOHOL From the start, man has embraced alcohol in both grape and grain as a gift from God and a treasure from the earth. But man has also recognised its power to undo His best intentions. Religion, history, literature and art testify to alcohol impact on life and human freedom.

Alcohol, arising spontaneously from the fermentation of fruits and grains, struck ancient man as mysterious, even more mysterious, however, were the changes that overtook him when he drank it. No records exist of the first human who decided to take a drink, yet there are in the oldest recorded religious cults, solid testimonies to the frightening reality of the experience. Alcohol is something powerful, the early church makes clear, a substance with links to both pleasure and pain, good and evil, death and resurrection. Alcoholism is a sin, a purposeful immoral act and separates the sinner from his God and from the brethren in the Christian community. The Church of the late 20th Century has now acknowledged alcoholism as a physical disease – an illness which needs to be taken seriously and sympathetically.

PERU a country where 61% of the population live below the poverty line, where cholera has been rampant this year; where guerilla warfare is terrorising the population with several leading churchmen having been murdered and where Bishop Alan and Vivien Winstanley, whom we met whilst they were home last Christmas, serve the Lord.

How can we help them in a practical way? Recently 2 missionaries have set up a workshop teaching a small group of women to use knitting machines. They are now producing high quality jumpers and cardigans, in a variety of designs, sizes and colours - some plain, some patterned - and are offering them for sale through churches in this country. Made in beautifully soft and warm Alpaca wool these garments are not cheap but are very good value. Six samples can be seen in church on Sundays or by contacting Mary Jackson (61819) or Olive Plant (63730). Further designs can be seen in their catalogue and which can be ordered for you. If you are in need of a woolly for winter, or an idea for a Christmas present, please consider buying one of these, and help the under privileged in Peru at the same time.
