

The Rector writes

30th November, 1991

It is now a little over 2 months since I suffered my heart attack in Rhodes. I am now making steady progress, doing a daily routine of exercises designed to strengthen the heart. Though I am officially still on sick leave I have been able to do a certain amount of administration at a leisurely pace. I hope that my first public duty will be to officiate at the wedding of our Son, Adrian, and Elizabeth in Bedford on December 14th and thereafter to let the clutch out gently over the Christmas period. I am especially grateful to those who have so willingly stood in for me during my period of convalescence. The support especially of my fellow clergy and lay readers has been such that I have not had to worry or feel guilty at being off work so long.

A period of convalesence has given me an opportunity to reflect, and on reflection I can list a number of positive things that have come out of this experience.

- 1. First and foremost it has given you the opportunity to show your love and concern for Mary and myself at our time of need. Your phone calls, your letters and your cards have been a source of real encouragement and support to us both. Your generosity far exceeded the expectations of our wardens for after Alison's air fare (£250) had been paid there was still over £500 in the 'Kitty'! Since Mary and I do not believe it is right for us to gain financially as a result of my illness we would like you to know what we are doing with your gifts. To begin with we have set aside the first 1/10th to give to medical charities both here and abroad including the hospital in Rhodes. Some is being used to defray the extra expenses incurred, but this is relatively small since most of these were covered by the holiday insurance. Incidentally never again will I resent having to pay t ese premiums which always make a package holiday that much dearer than it appears in the glossy brochures. The Insurers have been excellent. The majority of your gifts is being to pay for improvements at the Rectory e.g. the heating system, the electrics and the telephone.
- 2. My illness has provided Tony Woodward with the incentive to venture to return to active ministry again after his severe breakdown in health. Though it may not have been noticeable to us each new thing he has done has been a hurdle for him. However, with God's help he has surmounted these hurdles successfully. It may be sometime before he is able to return to full time ministry again, but in the meantime he is using his considerable practical skills to earn something to supplement his pension allowance from the Church Commissioners. If you have small jobs about the house for which you cannot get a tradesman to come to do for you then don't hesitate to give Tony a ring (654863) for he may be able to help you.
- 3. It has enabled me to appreciate the importance of hospital ministry. For well over 20 years now I have been a part-time hospital chaplain, but I must confess that at the end of my visiting round I have sometimes wondered whether it has been worthwhile and whether any good has been achieved. One of my more memorable experiences in the Coronary Care Unit of an overseas hospital was to be visited on several occasions by a retired Swedish Lutheran minister who spends 7 months each year as a chaplain on Rhodes. It was a delight for us both to be able to pray together on each of these occasions.
 - 4. Last, but by no means least, I had the opportunity to watch the final stages of the Rugby World Cup on T.V. and to do so with a clear conscience! Through the BBC World Service I was able to follow the earlier stages of the competition whilst still in Greece. I would certainly wish to echo Terry Waite's praise for the BBC World Service. One of the best presents I have received in recent years has been a small short wave radio which enables me to hear the news and the sports results wherever I happen to be on heliday.

Christmas is fast approaching and so Mary joins me in sending you our best wishes for this happy season of the year. Sadly it is not happy for everyone and so I encourage you once again to be generous in your support of our Tear Fund Christmas Appeal for those for whom this Christmas will not be a 'Happy Christmas'.

In the corresponding period last year the amount given was £2394 and this represents a increase in the level of giving of 18%

Over the past year the amount of money given in the weekly collections has come from the following sources:

From occasional services e.g. weddings and funerals	2.6%
From loose collections on Sundays and Wednesdays	16.6%
From planned giving envelopes (220)	80.8%

The average amount given per envelope per week has been £2.35. From this analysis it is plain for all to see that it is through the Planned Giving envelopes that the overwhelming majority of our weekly income comes. Neve theless there are still many who, though they regard themselves as members of Deane Church, choose not to use this scheme. This is a great pity because, human nature being what it is, most of us need a weekly envelope to remind us of our obligation to give to God's work on a weekly basis and not just when we attend Church fortnightly, monthly or whenever. The new set of envelopes for the year December 91 - November 92 come into use this month, and so it is not too late to join the scheme. All you need to do is to sign the list in Church and you will receive your envelopes in time for the next Sunday.

For many years now it has been the policy of our Church to give a definite proportion of our income to missions and charities for it is hypocritical for a Church as a body to encourage its individual members to give if it is not setting an example. Our Church Council has earmarked £6,493 for this purpose in addition to what has already been specifically donated by individuals and organisations. How this 'global sum' is to be shared will be determined by those who attend an 'open meeting' for this purpose on Sunday December 1st at 2.30 pm in the Rectory.



We wish to thank all those who contributed in some way to this year's Harvest Appeal. A total sum of £438 plus £30 from St. Mary's Primary School has been sent to Tear Fund for their long term project for improving the harvests in many countries in the African Continent.


