

The Rector writes

28th March, 1882

There are still another 13 days to Polling Day! Perish the thought! It is sad that many of us have switched off already, but I must say that the predictable political propaganda, together with the mud-slinging, does get very tedious. However, as Ron Morris points out on another page it is our Christian responsibility to exercise our vote on April 9th.

It is not my job to tell you for whom you should vote. To begin with my own understanding and diagnosis of what are often complex situations will be very Then if I were to encourage you to vote Labour or Conservative that would alienate about 60% of you if the polls are right in their predictions and And if I advised you to vote Liberal if we are a good cross-section of society. Democrat I would have at least 80% of you on my back including Philip Gore: However, what I can say is this - the Bible introduces more than I could stand. us to the God who is passionately concerned about justice, righteousness, peace and harmony in our communities. In the Old Testament we find His prophets boldly condemning the way society was being run, expressing His demand that the plight of the poor, the powerless and the downpressed should be remedied. In the New Testament Mary, the mother of Jesus, speaks of God putting down the mighty, and exalting the humble and meek, of filling the hungry with good things and sending the rich away empty. It seems to me that the question I should be asking myself before I exercise my vote is not "Under which party will I personally be better off?" but "Which party's policies are more closely in harmony with God's concerns as expressed in the Scriptures?" I'm sure of this - equally sincere Christians will answer this question in different ways, but I trust that whichever party wins the election we will all feel able to pray for the government and our country. will need such support, even if they don't acknowledge it.

May I remind you too that if you are a member of our Church Electoral Roll then you have another opportunity to vote at our Annual Church Meeting on Tuesday, April 14th. The nomination list for the election of Churchwardens and Church Councillors is on the Church Notice Board. During the past year we have lost two of our 'elder statesmen'. I wish to encourage you to think and pray for the meeting and about whom we should elect. Do plan to be present that evening.

We welcome once again a young clergyman from overseas as our guest over the Easter period. He is Bamidele Murewa from Nigeria. Though he will be staying at the Rectory I hope you will take the opportunity to sharing your home with him over a meal. The hospitality list is in Church. All these bursars are potential leaders in the African Church. One of our previous bursars is now the Bishop of Southern Sudan - a country devasted by civil war, famine and numberless refugees. Another is the Provost of Nairobi Cathedral in Kenya.

Holy Week and Easter

Details of our services are being circulated once again to every home in the parish in co-operation with other local Christian Churches. On Maundy Thursday Michael Saunders will be introducing us to a Christian Passover Meal which he first experienced at Oxford. It is similar to our familiar Agape meals, but in this instance we complete the meal before we start the Communion service. On the following morning Tony Woodward will be introducing us to a Communion service for Good Friday which he and his congregation at Stockport found very moving and helpful. Then on Easter Day we shall celebrate Christ's resurrection and victory over death. I look forward to seeing you at these special services this year.



Introducing CPAS

CPAS IS A HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY

If we are to play our full part in taking the good news of Jesus to God's needy world it is essential that we do it from a strong home base. Sadly we are a long way from this. Less than ten per cent of the population are to be found in Church on any one Sunday and in the neglected inner city areas and the rural areas of our country this percentage can fall to much less.

CPAS was founded in 1836 to raise money to pay for additional workers for the hard pressed city parishes that were growing at an alarming rate in the Industrial Revolution. Viscount Ashley, who was later to become the great Lord Shaftesbury, was its first President. Then, as now, its aid was offered through the Anglican churches which looked to it for support.

Since those days the type of support the Society is able to bring to local parish Churches has grown in variety and is now grouped in these major divisions. The Evangelism Division has a team of Staff Evangelists available to lead parish missions. It also helps placing and grant-aiding lay Urban Evangelists. The Parish Resources Division is responsible through its three units for training and equipping leaders in the local churches. The Youth and Children's Unit (CYPECS - standing for CYFA. Pathfinders. Explorers. Climbers and Scramblers) helps the leaders of young people's groups, and organises camps and houseparties (Ventures) for young people. The Ministry Among Women Unit looks after the training and resourcing of the leaders of women's groups and families and under fives work. The Adult Training and Resources Unit provides pastoral resources and training for clergy and lay leaders. The Professional Ministry Division offers guidance for those considering full-time professional ministry through its Vocation and Ministry Unit and makes itself responsible for finding vicars for some 500 Churches round the country through its There is a team of CPAS Consultants in various parts of the country acting as the 'human face' of the Society.

The aim of the Society can be summed up in a phrase taken from its original charter "... it would carry the Gospel, by means of the Church, to every man's door." In fulfilling this aim our Parish Reps including you play a very important role. Last year we contributed £850 to CPAS through our Christian Giving Programme. Its work will be the focus of attention at this month's Prayer Focus on Wednesday April 22nd.
