

MIKE SAUNDERS WRITES

I hope that over the last month most of you will have noticed display boards at the back of church and so you will have at least heard of "THERE IS HOPE". The idea of THERE IS HOPE is that some 36 churches, in the Bolton area will, in their different ways, encourage people to think about the Christian faith and we will show that we are all working together by using the same logo. The idea is to encourage us to become more mission oriented in this Decade of Evangelism.

But I wonder how many people will have managed to read past the last sentence. If our committee is representative of the Church a lot of us are ill-at-ease about "Mission" and almost panic stricken by the word "Evangelism". Well the good news is that evangelism is not about knocking on doors, and it is not about trying to be like Billy Graham. So don't panic, you are not about to be asked to do something which is impossible!

No, what mission is about is showing God's love in the world, and the ways in which we best show God's love, are the ways which come naturally to us. So please don't turn off when you hear people talking about THERE IS HOPE or mission or even evangelism. But rather think about ways in which you CAN show God's love, ways which aren't embarrassing!

What's more there can be no doubt that the need for God's love in our area is very great. I was horrified to discover that of the 3,300 people who live on the Chip Hill and Sutton estates, only 3 are members of our church. We are far too complacent. We think about the 217 people who come to church on a typical Sunday and we forget about the 12,000 who stay away. Please pray for the Pastoral and Mission and Unity working groups as they consider how best to respond to these needs and please support the activities they arrange by bringing your friends to hear someone share the good News about Jesus. After all that's what the word "evangelism" means, sharing the good news about Jesus.

BEATING

The Diocesan Boundary is approximately 137 miles long, Some of it passes through the Wythenshawe Estate near the airport; some on the wild Pennine and Rossendale Ways; some down the middle of the river Mersey! Each of the

19 deaneries is responsible for walking a section of the boundary on Saturday June 27th. Deane Deanery has been allocated a 9 miles stretch which has been divided into 3 relatively easy sections from Scot Lane End, Blackrod to Lever Park via Little Scotland and Adlington.

The object of the walk is to do something together as a diocese and at the same time to raise through sponsorship the remaining £50,000 that the diocese requires to complete its contribution to the Church Urban Fund. Though as a parish we have already paid our share in full we are still encouraged to participate in the fun day. Sponsorship forms and further details are on the Church notice board.

JOURNEYING ON

Travel, they say, broadens the mind, It certainly has the effect not only of informing, but often of dispelling some of the illusions and even prejudices that previously governed ones' opinion. To see pictures, again whilst helpful and interesting, cannot quite match up to being in a place and catching the feel and atmosphere.

For many people a visit to the Holy Land would be taken with a certain amount of reserve, if not outright cynicism. The overlay of centuries of tradition and the inevitable mix of legend and fact, together with the trappings of modern tourist facilities, can be offputting, but it never quite smothers the deeper feelings that arise when standing and walking in those places that have always been just names in the Bible, or places where our Lord Jesus Christ himself walked and talked.

It is in the journeying together on the Emmans road that hearts are warmed and thing becomes clearer, not in the standing still and looking sad. At the end of this journeying the discovery comes that Christ is there all along. We become very much the poorer for forgetting this.

<u>Scripture</u> Union €

Our speaker at the main services on Sermons Day, June 21st is Mr Andrew Graystone,

the recently appointed Regional Co-ordinator for the Scripture Union's Northern area. We supported Scripture Union through our Christian Giving Programme last year with a donation of £200. We shall support them with our prayers in this month's "Prayer Focus" on June 24th when we shall see a short video "What's God Like?". In addition to producing Bible Reading notes which many of use use, they also publish teaching materials for the leaders of our childrens' and young peoples' organisations. In the North of England S U has over 30 staff members. Some are employed in those who lead School Christian Unions, some are Frontier Youth Trust workers patiently encouraging hard pressed volunteer youth workers and some are engaged in children's and family evangelism. The opportunities which Scripture Union has for sharing and teaching the Christian Faith are many, but often a shortage of resources both in finance and personnel mean that many opportunities cannot be seized.
