

# The Rector writes

26th September, 1992

For many of us the recent mammoth Auction was an experience we will not easily forget. By raising about £3,200 it provided a welcome boost to our Roof Appeal which now stands in excess of £56,000. However, when we have long forgotten how much was actually raised there will be other more important things which will stand out in our memories. I list a few of them. There was the publicity. This was so good that you really had to be going about with your eyes shut if you didn't know that Deane Church was having an auction! It became a topic of conversation.

There was the team work. Lots of people were involved. Lots of people were kept busy for long hours. Lots of people gave of their time and energy freely, and they actually enjoyed doing so!

There was the marathon performance by the auctioneer, Sam Lancaster, from our St. Andrews Congregation. He kept things going for 4 hours and without his professionalism we might have still been there at breakfast the following morning!



Then there was the value which people attached to things. And what surprises there were! Things which in my opinion were worthless fetched £20 or £30 and their purchasers were thrilled that they had got a bargain! But then there were other items which in my opinion were of real quality, which went for a mere "song".

Jesus once told a short parable (see Matthew Ch.13 v 45-46) about a man who was prepared to pay almost anything for that which he considered to be of great value - in his case a pearl. What are the things which you consider to be of greatest value? Are they spiritual or material? A simple test would be to ask yourself "On what do you spend much of your time, money and energy?"



Our Diocesan Bishop, Stanley Booth-Clibborn retires at the end of the month having served four Diocese of Manchester with distinction for the past 13 years. Because he has sought to relate his Christian faith to political issues those who have disagreed with him have often written him off quite unfairly. I have always found him to be a most caring, spiritually minded pastor, and I thank God for him. There is a farewell and presentation to him and his wife Anne at the Manchester Free Trade Hall on Tuesday October 6th at 7.30 pm. I have a few tickets for this important occasion and they are available from me on a "first come first served" basis.

I also wish to commend to you the visit of Clive Calver on Friday October 9th at Bolton School Boys' Division. He will be launching the year of mission entitled "There is Hope" to which we as a Church are committed. Clive Calver was an unmarried father when he became a Christian, and he has subsequently become a very powerful debater and defender of the Faith as well as a challenging speaker.

Our Harvest Appeal this year focuses on Nepal where recent political changes have provided the Christian Church with a new freedom to grow and to minister to people in practical ways in the rural communities. In addition to the information sheet which will be distributed at the Church services on the two previous Sundays (September 27th and October 4th) there is also a most informative video (lasting 20 minutes) which is available from me by groups, organisations, and individuals. Let's make the maximum use of it so that our monetary gifts this harvest will come from understanding and praying hearts.

Rowland Goodwin - The Industrial Missioner on "Hours of Work".

Frost's Rule of Labour says, "By working faithfully eight hours a day, a man may eventually get to be boss and work twelve hours a day". I know some men who do this, seven days a week. Japanese culture is very work-orientated, and they say "A woman's work is never done". Are all these long hours good for you?

Virginia Bottomley wants to negotiate an 83 hour week for Junior Hospital Doctors and the Government, having resisted a European Directive on hours, seems to becoming to a compromise. 48 hours is the EC limit, plus 11 consecutive hours of rest a day; 35 consecutive hours of time off in each week; an 8 hour limit on night shifts and 4 weeks paid holiday a year.



What governs the number of hours we work? Ambition? Greed? Need for money? Pressure from the boss? Family pressure? Workaholism? Low hourly rates requiring long hours to earn a decent wage? The system? And what effect do these long hours have?



In my research I've found a close link between long hours and stress. I've come to the conclusion there are social as well as physical and mental costs. I also believe there is more to life than work and that a man, or a woman, who is married to work will have limited energy to put into being married to anything else. Perhaps this explains why so many ministers' children end up rejecting the Church. The Jews, far from being avid deregulators, legislated for leisure time. How far should we?
