

The Rector writes

31st October 1992.

For over 30 years now the Church of England has dithered over the question of whether or not women should be ordained to the priesthood. The time has now come for the final decision to be made at the meeting of the General Synod in London on Wednesday, November 11th. What is certain is that the majority are in favour; what is not certain is whether the majority will be big enough to get the 2/3rd support that is required in all 3 houses (Bishops, Clergy and Laity). Whichever way the vote goes some people will be hurt, and we must seek to help them. A few may find the result intolerable and leave our church to take their allegiance elsewhere. I personally do not feel strongly either way for I recognise that both sides can make a good case. I will accept the decision and work with it, and I suspect that this is how the majority of us will react.

Those who are against the ordination of women to the priesthood claim that this does not mean they are against women's ministry as such. However, they do need to come to terms with the fact that many women will feel undervalued and frustrated if the Synod says "No". Moreover many inside and outside the church would seriously question whether the C of E has the capacity to respond to the demands of contemporary society. In the event of a "No" vote it will be essential that attention be given to a career structure for women in ministry so that able, God-fearing women may fill certain posts. Though this wouldn't satisfy all, at least it would be a sign that our Church, even in saying "No", does value the distinctive gifts of all its members, women as well as men, and desires to use them.

If, on the other hand, there is a "Yes" vote on November 11th there will still be a delay of one or two years before it can actually come into practice. This will give a reasonable length of time for detailed discussion with those who will be hurt by this decision and whose consciences will be disturbed. They too will need to be encouraged to see that there is still a place for them in the life of our church. After all the C of E is a comprehensive church and there is no need for any to feel marginalised because they cannot accept the ministry of women priests.

Our bishops encourage us to use the following prayer that our church may discern God's will.

Guide, O God, the Church of England through this time of decision concerning the ministry of women; grant that convictions strongly held may be voiced and heard with charity; give wisdom to the members of General Synod; and when the decision is made surround with your love those of our brothers and sisters to whom it causes pain. Give to your whole Church the spirit of truth and peace, that celebrating your gifts in each other we may serve you in humility and joy. We ask this for the sake of our great High Priest, your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Finally, it is good to remind ourselves that decisions made by Synods and Church Councils - even the most prayerful ones - may in the end prove to be mistaken! Consequently, whichever way the vote goes there is no place for being triumphant about the result. We need to be especially sensitive to our capacity for getting things wrong and thus recall the need always to be humble and gentle towards each other.

Darkness and Light are recurrent themes at Advent and Christmas and the Christingle can be a helpful visual aid to tell us of God's gifts to the world and the light which He has shed in dark places.

God's grace was so abundant that He began the process of healing which has brought us to the point where we are now looking forward to serving Him at Lostock.

As a result of these last four years both Eleanor and I are stronger, more aware of the depth of the Lord's love for us and more appreciative of the value of the friendship we can have with our brothers and sisters in Christ. Above all else we have discovered that when everything appears black and hopeless it is then that Jesus' presence becomes strongest"

In the corresponding period last year the amount given was £2867 which represents an increase of 8.2% which is above the level of inflation.

In acknowledging our contribution of £475 to the recent Somalia Appeal Tear Fund inform us how they have been allocating grants. £40,000 has been given to assist farmers in the north whose livelihoods have been destroyed; £50,000 has been allocated to the Mission Aviation Fellowship towards the cost of a Cessna aircraft for use by relief workers in remote areas; £65,000 has gone to providing relief supplies to 5,000 refugee families camped along the Kenya/Somalia border.
