# The Rector writes

During the past month I have There seems to be a day for almost everything now. been inundated with literature about World Aids Day on November 30th. course a terrible illness, and all who contract it, for whatever cause, deserve If having a special day for Aids will increase our our deepest sympathy. awareness of this scourge then there can be something to be said for it. also aware of other serious medical conditions which do not attract so much I wonder sometimes whether we are in danger of getting things a little out of proportion. For example, each year about 300,000 people in this country suffer a heart attack, 240,000 are diagnosed as having some form of cancer and 100,000 people suffer a stroke. According to the Department of Health figures, there were 1406 new cases of Aids in the last year, admittedly 6% more than in the previous period, but small compared with the heart and cancer figures. Of these new cases of Aids, the vast majority (over 70%) was amongst homosexuals . The next most frequent likely causes were in order of magnitude sex abroad, a In many African countries blood factor (eg for haemophilia) and injected drugs. Aids has reached epidemic proportions and therefore, our Government is right to take seriously the possibility of any future epidemic here.

In addition to the media and poster campaigns and the leaflet distributed to every household some while back it is now compulsory for young people in the 11 - 13 age group to be taught about Aids in the context of the science curriculum. Herein lies a serious problem. If by far the most common means of getting Aids is through homosexual activity or heterosexual activity with "high risk" partners should young people of this tender age be introduced to this kind of detail?

Sex is such a wonderful gift from God that when adults do explain to the next generation the "facts of life" it needs to be done sensitively in the context of moral standards and human love and affection, not as part of a science lesson. Certainly we need to be spared what happens in some Dutch schools where mixed classes of teenagers practice on each other's thumbs the right way to put on condoms.

It's been said before, and it may sound simplistic, but the only way to ensure freedom from Aids is to exercise self discipline in our sexual relationships before marriage and during marriage. Chastity before marriage and faithfulness within marriage may sound 'old hat' to many, but I remain far from unconvinced that the alternatives of our permissive society are any better.

In the aftermath of the historic vote in General Synod on the ordination of women to the priesthood we took a snapshot of opinion by way of a straw vote of those attending Church on a particular Sunday. Because it is one thing to vote in favour of a principle for the Church of England as a whole and another matter when we bring it down to our own parish the question I posed was this "How would you feel about the possibility of one of our present staff being replaced by a woman deacon?" There was a remarkable consistency between our different congregations. The overall figure of those who said they would be open to and welcome the possibility of one of us being succeeded by a woman was 85%

Finally, I wish to express our gratitude to the team of people who help month by month to put this modest production together - to Pat Sewell, Una Mochrie, Mary Jackson, and to Christine Dean of the Deane School Reprographic department. Thank you too to Ron Morris who, without fail produces a monthly contribution even if it is not always published!

### CONTRIBUTIONS FROM......

Ron Morris who argues that "Christmas is what you have in your heart and not in your pocket".

Some of the Christmas festivities and antics bear little resemblance to Christmas. Others try to share the spirit of Christmas by organising food and shelter for the homeless and/or the lonely for whom this becomes the meaning of Christmas.

It is understandable that the Child in the Manger prods our awareness of the homeless, the rejected and the marginalised (to use a modern expression), where such awareness has begun to fall off. The Christ whom we celebrate cries out on their behalf, not just to the Church but to society in general. In the manger at Bethlehem He takes his place with the poorest of the poor, in order that none may feel excluded - but excluded from what? The danger is that we may smother the Child under endless appeals to "give, give, give..." to charities and individuals and even Churches. Christmas is a time of giving, but above all it is the time of God giving to us. If we miss that, then we have missed the whole point, and from this gift none is excluded unless they choose not to accept it.

Therefore, let us remember and proclaim afresh the wonder of the Christmas message that it is for all mankind in all sorts and conditions and without monetary or any other restriction.



One way in which we can proclaim the Christmas message is by joining a Carol singing party visiting the wards in Hulton Hospital and the Old Peoples Homes in our parish. Details will be given in the notices in Church.

Rowland Goodwin, the Industrial Missioner, who asks the pertinent question "Have you passed your sell-by date"?

If you are a judge you can go on working well past 70; even until you drop dead! The popular expectation is that Chairmen of companies (and at the other end of the scale, cleaners) are over 50. A recent survey of Personnel Directors thought that receptionists should be under 35. Watching international money-maketeers at work on TV one realises that most of them must be burnt out by then; could you stand the racket, being shouted at and speaking into half-a-dozen telephones at once?

Many redundant 45 and 50 year-olds feel others have already marked them as past their sell-by date. They often feel at their peak in experience and wisdom.

I think ageism is as bad as sexism and racism. There should be a law against it. I'm not sure I agree, either with having a retirement age. Too many valuable skills are thrown away at 60 and 65. Perhaps it's because I'm approaching my sell-by date that I enjoy TV's "One Foot in the grave" and Waiting for God" so much. How lively, unpredictable, incisive and incredibly funny the main characters are; streets ahead of younger, dull, conformist creatures! Thank goodness there is no ageism in the Bible; God choosing young and inexperienced people to take on great responsibilities, and movingly and creatively working through the elderly. Most of what we know about Abraham happened late in his life. Perhaps, as Browning said, "The best is yet to be; the last of life for which the first was made".

In the corresponding period last year the amount given was £2843. Since a number of people are now giving through a banker's standing order we will begin including this figure so that the above feature gives a more accurate record of regular giving.



This year's HARVEST APPEAL raised a total of £391.20. Though this is less than last year it ought to be borne in mind that if followed closed on the heels of the special appeal for the victims of famine in Somalia which realized £475.

This has now passed the £60,000 work. Amongst recent donations received there was £144 from our Guides Sponsored Silence ("an evening of absolute bliss" says their Captain Carole Baxendale). We are grateful to the Ladybridge Patients Support Group who have sent a cheque for £100, being part of the proceeds of their recent Brass Band Concert in Church.

The contributions made through the Regular Giving Scheme will enable me to
meet all the financial commitments of our church for the current financial
year. In addition, subject to any unforeseen circumstances, I expect to
be able to meet the bills for the replacement of the church roof out of the
funds generated by the Raise the Roof Campaign.

Unfortunately, one must never be complacent and I foresee unavoidable increases in expenditure next year particularly with regard to our Parish Share to the Diocese (which this year stands at £46,500), church insurances (at present £3906) and repairs following the architects recent quinquennial inspection of the church building. All this means that our income will need to rise by more than the present rate of inflation.

As by far the greater part of our regular income comes through the envelope scheme, I wish to encourage -

- 1. those who are not yet in the scheme to join it
- 2. everyone to review their giving, and if at all possible in these difficult economic times to increase their regular contribution to help meet the increased costs which are outside the control of
