The Rector writes

The mass media have had a The Royal Family have been very much in the news this week. "field day" first with the good news of the marriage of Princess Anne to Cdr. Tim Lawrence which took place quietly to-day at Balmoral, and then with the very sad news of the legal separation of the Prince and Princess of Wales. I don't wish to comment on either situation since to do so would only be superfluous in view of all that has Instead I want to ask the question "what are the factors that been said and written. make for a good marriage, and what are those which lead to difficulties and breakdown?" Here are three suggestions:

1. Our expectations must be earthed. I suppose that in some cases romance may be like a fairy tale, but marriage is certainly not. During our courtship and engagement there are bound to be differences of opinion and disagreements which may even lead to rows. Now a wedding ceremony is not going to suddenly bring all this to an end as though a magic wand had been waved. Even if it takes place in a beautiful medieval church like our own this is no guarantee of success in marriage. There will still be difficulties so we must not allow ourselves to be taken by surprise when they come. Instead we need to make a determined effort to work at and to work through these problems together. hearted efforts are of little value. One of the questions which I ask couples who come to see me about marriage when one or other of them has had a previous failure in marriage is this "What steps did you and your former partner take to work at your relationship?" I'm not impressed when it is fairly obvious that they had "thrown in the towel" at a very early stage.

2. We must make time for each other. It never ceases to amaze me how couples who spend so much time in each others company before marriage can so easily take one another for granted once "the knot has been It doesn't matter how busy our lives may be; it doesn't matter how different are our interests, we owe it to one another to be with each other not just at the "fag end" of the day, but in "quality time". If we fail to do this then our lives are almost bound to drift apart, and this is when suspicions arise and temptations occur.

Our love for each other must be genuine. There is more to love than sexual attraction and sentimental feeling. important are the ingredients of commitment and trust. When temptations occur (and who doesn't experience them from time to time?) then we need to remind ourselves of the life long commitment we made to our partner on our However long ago that may be, and however tough the going is at present we do need to recall what we promised on that occasion. That's what I mean by commitment.

Then, whilst I never insist on a bride promising to obey her husband I must confess to having an uneasy feeling when sometimes she will dogmatically assert that in no way would she even consider that particular option. The way I look at it is this. man really loves his wife is he likely to ask her to do anything which is not good for her or for their mutual benefit? And if she really loves her husband and knows that he loves her can she not trust him not to take advantage of her in this respect? Genuine love involves a deep trust.

In the foregoing there is nothing original or revolutionary; its all common sense However, even people like the Royal Family, who presumably are blessed with an above average amount of common sense, can fail in their marriages. At the end of the day we need humbly to admit that when common sense fails we require the help of God to enable us to have expectations which are earthed in realism, to ensure that our time with our partner is quality time and that our love is accompanied by commitment and Here's a prayer for our own marriages and those of others: "Heavenly Father, you know that when we make promises to each other in marriage we intend to keep them, and yet so often we fail. You know that small differences of

opinion can so easily become great rifts. We confess that we are often not humble enough to be honest with each other, and soon there is a barrier and we begin to drift Give us your courage to share our failures, our fears, our mistrusts and doubts Renew within us a fresh awareness of love, joy, trust commitment and with each other. forgiveness for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen".

THE ROOF IS FINISHED - THE APPEAL TARGET ACHIEVED

When your Appeal Committee first met in February I must admit none of us expected to achieve our target by the end of the year.

However, the response from the congregation and from friends and well wishers in the parish, together with those who have organised fund raising events has enabled us to reach our target. We have had enthusiasm, and fun, but most important of all we have been able to work together to the glory of God. The above figures show that £6,252 has been promised by those making weekly, monthly or annual gifts and covenants over the next three years and this will enable us to recover a further £3225 in tax over the same period. Because part of the work has not 'attracted' VAT there is a small surplus. This will be used to pay for ongoing maintenance on repairing stonework and stained glass windows and of improving our security. Consequently, we do wish to encourage those who are contributing to the Roof Appeal to continue doing so trough their weekly, monthly and annual gifts. You can rest assured that all such monies with be earmarked for maintaining the building and fabric.

A new roof for Deane Church was planned through the vision and commitment of the late Harry Ridyard, implemented and monitored by Terry Oaks and paid for all those who contributed to the appeal.

1992 was a year when the focus was upon the maintenance of the fabric of our church building, particularly in providing a completely new roof cover in stainless steel. The work has not only been completed ahead of schedule, but paid for as well. I am especially grateful to God for the professional skills of our three churchwardens who humanly speaking, have made this possible.



Stan Wilson and his Roof Appeal Committee have done a splendid job in making our need so widely known that many individuals and groups within the wider community have organised unsolicited efforts on our behalf. Terry Oakes has very quietly and efficiently been monitoring the actual work on the roof in his regular meetings and correspondence with the architect and contractors. Keith Acton assisted by Sid Harris has emphasized the priority of direct giving and their organising of the finances have enabled the bills to be paid on time.

(It's a very poor Christian witness when Churches are dilatory in paying their bills). Of course, the maintenance of a building as old as Deane Church is an ongoing process, and it hasn't ceased because the roof has been renewed. The most recent report from our architect estimates that we should reckon on spending about £5,000 per year over the next 5 years on maintenance.

1993 must be the year when the focus is on mission. We have invited Helen Franklin, a children's evangelist on the staff of Scripture Union to lead a mission to children from April 25 - May 2nd. Though it will be launched in the Family Service in Church on April 25th the main meetings will be held on the following 5 evenings in our St. Mary's Primary School. All children of primary school age will be welcome whatever primary school they attend. I must emphasize that Helen is not coming to do our mission work for us by proxy. She is coming to work alongside us in our outreach to the children in our parish. On the practical level we will require a considerable number of people to assist - some in an upfront capacity with the children, others in matter of fact jobs out of the public gaze... Michael Saunders' committee are drawing up a schedule of job descriptions of what is required and I pray that we will have a good number of helpers.

In September (19th-26th) Tony Porter will lead a varied team of members of his Church at Holy Trinity, Platt (near Manchester City's ground) One of them is the manager of the Souvenir Shop at that other football shrine - Old Trafford. In addition to conducting the services on the two Sundays they hope to be invited into a number of house meetings in midweek and to be able to go into our local secondary school as well as addressing separate meetings for men and women. Tony demands of his team a deep level of commitment and I shall be looking for hospitality (bed & breakfast) for them during this period.

I have invited Tony because he has a direct, no-nonsense approach in his presentation of the Christian message, but he is particularly sensitive to the needs and feelings of the people with whom he comes in contact. As an Oxford hockey blue he is very keen on sport and plays a leading role in the organisation "Christians in Sport". There will be an opportunity to hear him and some members of the team in the special morning service on January 31st.

As maintenance is an ongoing process so is mission; it must continue beyond 1993 into the Decade of Evangelism and beyond into the next century. We prayed about the Church roof, asking God to touch our hearts and pockets to enable us to pay the bills. That prayer has been answered. We must pray about this year of mission both as individuals and with others. On Sundays after the morning service at 11.45 am Joyce Sutcliffe will be leading a short time of prayer in the Choir Vestry for these missions. Do join her if you can.
