THE RECTOR WRITES...



Since the publication of the last issue of this newsletter the mission week for children led by Helen Franklin of the Scripture Union has been and gone. We deliberately chose as our venue the St. Mary's School because its catchment area is one where we have very few Church members and from where even fewer children come to our organisations on Sunday and midweek. Though the mission was open to all primary school children in our parish the majority who attended did come from this particular area. It was most encouraging to see so many of them, and even more encouraging to see them enjoying what for many of them would be their first contact with something organised by the Christian Church. At this stage it would be very hard to say how successful or effective the mission was, but I believe it is a real plus if this initial contact with something associated with the Church was perceived as fun since so many people associate the Church with boredom.

Equally encouraging was the large number of Church members (about 100 altogether) who committed themselves to helping during the week in some capacity or other, and again to see them so obviously enjoying the fun and sharing the enthusiasm of the children. I guess that for a number of us this was a completely new experience. If the faith we profess is not something we can enthuse about, and if it is not something we want to pass on and share with others it is questionable whether such a faith is worth having!

In 3 months time the next phase of our year of mission will be held from September 19-26 when we shall be joined by a team of adults from Holy Trinity Church, Rusholme and their vicar, Tony Porter. They are sufficiently enthusiastic about their faith that they are prepared to give up a week of their holidays in order to share with us their experience of Christ. This they will have opportunities of doing as they stay in our homes for bed and breakfast (we will be looking for hospitality in due course), at home meetings on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and at a Ladies Evening on the Thursday and at a Men's Dinner on the Friday evening. Do please book these dates in your diary now and keep them clear so that you can benefit from this week of mission.



Last year there was a certain amount of interest shown in the possibility of a parish holiday to the Holy Land, but we didn't proceed owing to having a very full Church programme with two missions and a flower festival. I would be interested to discover the degree of support there would be for a comprehensive 11 day tour of the Holy Land, departure from Manchester either on Monday June 27th or Monday October 3rd. The cost would be of the order of It would include scheduled day flights by El Al Israel Airlines from Manchester Airport, accommodation at 3/4 star hotels, full board, the services of a local fully qualified guide, all entrance fees, taxes, insurance and gratuities, excursions in luxury air-conditioned coaches and a copy of the excellent 150 page guide book. The tour includes visits to all the principal New Testament sites in Jerusalem, Bethlehem and the Sea of Galilee. confess to being somewhat hesitant in encouraging people to spend so much on a holiday, but I suspect it will not be too much higher than the total that many people spend on other holidays. Mary and I had the privilege of going on a similar tour out of season at a very much reduced price, and we wouldn't have missed the opportunity of going to the Holy Land. It has been unforgettable. During the past month we have been saddened by the sudden deaths of several Sympathy. of our members:

Olive Williamson of Wigan Road was affectionately known as "Auntie Olive" to the children (and not a few grown-ups too!) who lived near her. Though she and Geoff had no children of their own they loved children and children knew it.

Betty Dootson of Hunger Hill had struggled with poor health for most of her life and yet she reached her "four score" recently. As the Rector pointed out at her funeral Betty was a good example of what St. Paul was referring to in his correspondence with the Christians at Corinth. "Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day" (2 Corinth. Ch. 4 v 16) Physically she was weak and frail, but spiritually she was much stronger as a consequence of her daily Quiet Time with her Lord.

Kathleen Briddon came from Chesterfield to live with her daughter, Chris Barnes, in very recent times. Like Betty she too was very weak and frail in her old age, but when she felt strong enough she would come to Church and to the Mother's Union of which she had been a member for many years.

Ken Allan, who died at the end of April after an illness of several months, will be greatly missed by the parish in general and by St. Andrew's in particular.


