

### Mission '93 September 19th-26th

The committee appointed to plan the arrangements for this important event in the life of our Church have met the Revd. Tony Porter and some of his team from Holy Trinity Church, Platt in South Manchester who will be joining us for this week of mission at the beginning of the autumn. At the present time it looks as though about two dozen people will be coming and they will include a number of university students from their large evening congregation. As they will not be commuting but living within our parish during the period of the mission we are now looking for offers of accommodation for bed and breakfast and/or a late afternoon tea/early evening meal.

In addition to the Sunday services which the team will be conducting the main events during the week will be :-

- 1. Home Meetings throughout the parish from Monday to Wednesday in the afternoon and evening. These will give us an opportunity to meet the missioners informally in small groups and for these we will be looking for lots of volunteers to act as hosts/hostesses.
- 2. A Ladies Evening with a meal on the Thursday evening.
- 3. A Men's Dinner on the Friday evening.

It is my desire and hope that everyone who regard themselves as members of Deane Church will endeavour to go to at least one of the home meetings in the first half of the week and then to either the Ladies Evening or the Men's Dinner. "Deane Scouts"

This year is the eightieth anniversary of the foundation of the 1st Deane Scout Group, the first scouts being enrolled in 1913. Members of that first troop spent the war years guarding the railway bridge at the bottom of the Clough outside of school hours, the late Teddy Platt, the village wheelwright, being one of them.

For over a third of that time, since the end of the Second World War, I was the Scout Leader, until, near my sixtieth birthday, I finally relinquished my warrant.

There being a very efficient team to carry on, I was determined to keep away, so as not to interfere, but it has saddened me in that for the past three years, the Scout Troup has been non-existent, because of a lack of adult leadership.

Cub Scouts and the newer younger section of Beavers are strong in numbers and leadership, but up to now there has been no future for them in Scouting as far as St. Mary's Deane is concerned.

Please - someone come forward to take on this very worthwhile job, two or three if possible. I am well over age myself to be accepted for a warrant now, but I will be very willing to give assistance with advice and instruction, until potential scouters have received training for self sufficiency. Of course, there may be ex-scouters among our congregation willing to come forward, which would make things easier.

I pray that there will be a response.

"Coal and Christians"

For a few days after the announcement that 31 pits were to be shut, 10 of them forthwith, the whole nation seemed to think economics. The social effect of pit losures was deeply felt by Christians in and outside mining areas. Marches attracted widespread support. The Government back-tracked and announced a review.

Development teams have been tunnelling towards huge thick seams under the North Sea at our son-in-law's pit in Sunderland. Wearmouth Colliery is one of the 31. Investment is now at risk. Thousands of jobs could go in an area of high unemployment and low job prospects. Real people, with wives and families to support, will become yet more numbers in the benefit statistics.



Naturally, we are deeply concerned. What would help most is not Christian compassion or solidarity with victims. We take that as read. Miners, and all those who rely on the coal industry, need a market. The issues are economic as well as human. Christians who concentrate on one without the other are failing in their citizenship.

It seems crazy to stagger on without a long-term energy policy, shipping in cheap coal from abroad, ignoring our own natural resources and building an electric power supply on the uncertain future of gas. Christians must speak up in the search for a more socially acceptable alternative. The future cannot be left solely in the hands of the oney-makers.
