

Good Will Sunday and the distribution of the new sets of Christian Giving Envelopes prompts me to write about MONEY. I am, of course, aware of the fact that this will cause at least some of you to turn over the page saightaway! This is probably because you have been "conned" into believing that the Church is always asking for money, and that it is only interested in you for what you can give. I regret to confess that in some cases such criticism is deserved, but in all honesty I don't think that could be fairly said of Deane Church in spite of its many weaknesses. I have always maintained that the local Church as a body has no right to expect its individual members to give if it is not itself setting an example When a Church as an institution is seen only as a "receiver" soaking up money to maintain its buildings and organisation rather than as a "giver", then it is only providing more fuel for the critics amongst us. That is why every year in its budget our Church Council allocates a definite proportion of its income to missions and charities (usually about 15%). Moreover, I don't believe a preacher has any right to encourage the congregation to give to and through the local Church unless he is doing so When I became a Christian I was taught to allocate at least 10% of my income to God's work, and Mary and I do this - about half of our giving goes into our weekly envelope, and the remainder we donate to missions and charities that are close to our heart. I want you to know this not because I'm proud about it, but because I'm not asking you to do what I'm not prepared to do myself.

The Present

It is a very sad fact that many Christian charities and organisations are in To survive they are having to make staff a very poor financial state. redundant and close down areas of work. This is largely because the average level that Christians give is a meagre 1% of income. Where Churches teach and members respond to levels of giving approaching 10% there are no such problems. For example during the ministry of their present Vicar the income from giving at an Anglian Church in South Croyden has increased from £80,000 per annum to £240,000 over 4 years, and that during a period of recession! I want to encourage everyone of you, myself included, to review what you give Here are two suggestions which you may find uncomfortable: to God's work. 1. Ask yourself "What proportion of my income am I giving to and through my Church - is it nearer to 1% or 10%? What should I be giving? 2. Because for different reasons many of us are only in Church about 1 Sunday in 3 the Christian Giving Envelope Scheme, in theory at least, enables us to follow the teaching of Scripture by giving every week. When we return after a period of absence we hand in several envelopes. However, there is no evidence at all from the size of the loose collections that those who do not e the envelopes "make up" for the lest weeks. Therefore, I want such members to ask themselves "Is there any good reason why I don't commit myself to giving regularly using the envelope scheme?" If the answer is "No" then please ask for a set of envelopes.

The Future

It often comes as a great surprise on reading the Bolton Evening News to discover that many of us who are ordinary folk die having accumulated significant financial resources. However, much of it was tied up in property and pensions so that we are "asset rich, but income poor". ourselves unable to give as much as we would like partly because we are anxious to ensure that there is sufficient to pay for long-term nursing care if that should become necessary in our old age. This is where making a will is so important, for it can provide the opportunity of leaving something worthwhile to charity. Whilst obviously we will want to make provision for our family, for clearing debts, for acknowledging with gratitude people who have served us, the Christian should also consider leaving to charities a proportion of their estate. It never ceases to amaze me how generous people are in leaving handsome bequests to animal charities, and at the same time bow reluctant many of us are to do the same for Christian and humanitarian oncerns. I warmly commend the initiative behind "Good Will Sunday" because it gives us the opportunity when death comes to us of tying up loose ends and "putting one's house in order" Rom Jockson
