The Rector writes

31st December.1993.

As I put pen to paper we are still in the old year; as you read this we will be in the new year. How time flies! But where does it fly to? What does the new year hold for us? Is there any goal and purpose in what happens? Basically in the world's religions there are 2 ways of thinking about time - the circle and the line.

The <u>circle</u> is the view of the Eastern religions, Hinduism and Buddhism, and of many religions of the ancient world too. On this view things go round in circles and everything recurs. Human personalities come back to earth and are re-incarnated either as other human beings, or as animals, unless they obtain release as disembodied spirits. It is not without significance that the symbol of India is the wheel.

In Christianity, Islam and the Jewish Faith, time and history are thought of as a <u>line</u>. The world begins, it develops, it will come to an end. We can see from the Bible how It opens with the creation stories - the world is created and develops. Then we see the growth of a moral consciousness, symbolised in the Adam and Eve story, and the giving of the Law to Moses. Next we have the growth of political institutions and the coming of Kingship with Saul and David. This is followed by the growth of prophecy, as men sent by God, declare His will for the present and His purposes for the future. This period of preparation and development came to a climax as God entered the world in the person of Christ for the salvation of mankind and all creation. As Christ departed physically from this world, so He was replaced spiritually by the Holy Spirit of God, who enabled, and still enables, the Church to do many wonderful things in Christ's name. This is where we are at now, but we look forward to Christ's return in judgement when all Thus in the Christian view of time, history has a things will be subject to Him. All things are moving to a definite goal. beginning and an end.

Which of these two views is the more likely? Is history a series of cycles, or does it have a definite progress? I would suggest that both science and history tend to support the Christian view. The "big bang" theory of creation implies that matter was created at a given period in time. The theory of "evolution" seems to indicate a development from simple and tiny creatures like amoebae to more complex beings like humans. History, also, seems to show change and development, with each age having its own distinctive features and even though there is a pattern of the rise and fall of civilisations, each has its own particular characteristics. Science and history alike seem to support the Christian view that history is moving onwards - that things are leading somewhere, different from this present age.

What practical difference should it make to us if we adopt the Christian view of time? It means that <u>free choice</u> is significant. We will not regard what happens this coming year as being fixed and determined by what happened in a previous existence. Though our heredity and our environment influence us and impose constraints upon us, there still remains the possibility of free choice. Jesus taught that we have the freedom to obey or disobey. The parables about the wise and foolish men who built their houses on the rock and the sand respectively, and of the wise and foolish virgins and their lamps, show that a choice lies before us, and how we respond is vital.

Though we will be beset by conflicting influences in 1994 much will depend upon how we exercise our free will. Will we use it for deepening our commitment to Christ by making a proper time for private prayer? Will we use it for the increase of our commitment to our fellow Christians by a more regular attendance at public worship and fellowship gatherings? Will we use it for renewed acts of service to meet the needs of the Church and the wider community? Will we accept these invitations or reject them? It is for us to decide this coming year.

Finally, Mary joins me in expressing our warmest thanks to the many of you who so kindly sent your Christmas greetings and best wishes for the coming year. Please forgive us if we haven't thanked you personally but we do appreciate those expressions of your love and support.

YES WE REALLY DO!

At present the Church is cleaned every week by one of five teams of volunteers who give one to one and a half hours every 5 weeks. However, each year we lose some. For instance, one lady who is fast approaching her 80th birthday understandably feels that it is time she hung up her feather duster! Some of the teams are getting depleted and replacements are urgently required. When appeals were made in Church last month there was a nil response.

When Mervyn Stockwood was Vicar of the University Church in Cambridge and met with a similar response when calling for volunteers to supply flowers for the Communion Table, he threatened to fly balloons from the High Alter instead! This galvanised the congregation into action. We are not sure that we should apply similar tactics, but clearly if people are not prepared to give of their time in this way then the options seem to be <u>either</u> we resort to employing someone to do it

or we don't clean the Church every 5th week.
