

# The Rector writes

26th March, 1994

As we come to the end of our Lent Home Group programme the session which I personally found most helpful and challenging was when we tried to answer the question "How do we cope when we have to face a crisis?" particular crisis may be a personal problem like the death of a parent or partner, or some shattering revelation about a friend or relative, or the loss of our job. For others, it can be the sudden impact of a major upheaval on our lives such as the flooding or complete destruction of our home in a storm. How will we respond to such events when they hit us, as surely they will in some form or other sooner or later. They can, and they do, completely overwhelm us when they force us back on our reserves of faith and character, and we discover we have so little to fall back on. Christian faith may begin relatively suddenly when we put our trust in living Christ, whose resurrection we are about to celebrate once again. Christian Character, however, is not built overnight. It is the result of living out our faith in our public as well as our private lives. This will involve the discipline of regular worship, the hearing and reading of God's word, constantly thinking about what God's purposes are for us here and now and cultivating the habit of living in the presence of the risen So when a crisis does come, and we call upon these spiritual resources, we will be able to cope with the strength and courage that God

Our national church, the Church of England, is facing a number of crises at the present time. We do have problems over finance, and there are some deep divisions over the ordination of women to the priesthood. I would want to discourage you from being disturbed by the silly talk in the media that our Church of England is in terminal decline, or by that small minority of misguided people who are leaving us because they think we are no longer a true Church. Instead I would want to encourage you to place your confidence in God. I wouldn't want you to be complacent. Whether we like it or not the Church of England is becoming a different Church. It is changing all the time, but the God in whom we trust changes not. He is constant, "the same yesterday, today and forever".

After Easter I plan to convene two groups in which I hope a number of you will be interested. The first is for adults and I call it the "Believing and Belonging Group". It is designed primarily for those who in recent times have attached themselves to one of our congregations, but who feel a little out of place when it comes to Holy Communion. This group aims to help such people feel more at home by assisting them to see what Christians believe and what it means to belong to our Church. It can serve, therefore, as a preparation for Confirmation, though no one is committing themselves to this by coming to the group. In the past others have found it helpful as a refresher course in Christian basics. Sixth formers are also welcome, and if there are sufficient numbers we would have a separate group for them. The initial meeting will be held at the Rectory on Tuesday April 12th at 7.45 pm though a Tuesday will not necessarily be the night when the group decides to meet.

The second group is for younger teenagers who wish to take part in the experiment of being admitted to <u>Communion before Confirmation</u>. It is one of the conditions that only those who are regular worshippers will be admitted to the short course of preparation. The initial meeting for those who are interested will also be held on Tuesday April 12th at the earlier time of 6.45 pm at the Rectory.

Finally, I commend to you our main service of Holy Communion on Easter Day when the leaders and members of our CYFA group will be performing a drama sketch which demonstrates the different ways in which we can react to the Easter story.
