The Rector writes

During the past month we have welcomed a further 9 young people into communicant membership of our Church before confirmation. As we have been following this practice over the 10 year period since 1984 it is perhaps a good time to review this experiment.

What has been the purpose of the experiment?
The traditional practice of the C of E has been to limit communicant membership to those who have been confirmed or who desire to be confirmed. However, it must be admitted that this has been a purely domestic rule with no Biblical teaching to support it. Indeed 'confirmation' is not even mentioned in the Bible! That being said, however, it is not necessarily a bad rule. Ideally confirmation takes place when a person has reached that level of Christian maturity which enables them to confirm publicly their personal faith and convictions, and to declare their desire to renew their membership of the Christian Church which was initiated by their parents in infancy at baptism. In recent times this has created something of a problem. As Holy Communion has become increasingly the main service on a Sunday (and in many parishes the only service) it has meant that the younger members of the congregation have felt marginalized, being reduced to the level of spectators, not being able to receive the sacrament.

One way of overcoming this problem has been to reduce the age at which people can be confirmed - in many cases whilst they are still at primary school. Though obviously there are exceptions, in many cases the child being confirmed has little understanding of the Christian faith, and where they have actually come to faith, there has hardly been time for it to be tested. People confirmed at such an early age have often said to me how they wished they had waited until they had reached a greater level of maturity. Moreover, the bishops too will often confess, at least in private conversation, that it worries them when they are called upon to confirm scores of very young children.

Another way of tackling this problem is the one we have adopted since 1984. After a brief course which concentrates on helping the young person to understand the communion service, we admit him/her into communicant membership. I wouldn't claim that in most cases there is a deep level of understanding, but our hope and prayer is that the young person will be given a sense of worth and belonging to the Christian Family, and that through the partaking of Holy Communion they will have a growing understanding of the Faith and a sense of belonging which will prepare them for Confirmation at a later date.

What have been the results? The haemorrhage of young people from our Church In one sense, very disappointing. organisations and Church life in their early teens has continued. The experiment has done little to arrest this fall out, but then neither does confirmation at an early age. The pressures on young people to conform to the life style and standards of our post-Christian and secular society are very great indeed. Unless they have come to a gen personal faith in Christ it is most unlikely that they will withstand this onslaught. Unless they have come to a genuine That's why they will need every bit of encouragement and support that Christian parents Consequently I want to encourage you to pray for and the Church Family can give them. They are: Karen Greenhalgh, Philip Harrison, Matthew these young communicants by name. Hewitt, Neil Hogarth, Matthew Kilsby, Laura Parker, Erica Smith, Martin Wagner and Lee Whee Idon.

The real 'plus' of the experiment is that it preserves the integrity of 'confirmation' by rescuing it from being the farce which it has become in so many instances. There will be far fewer confirmations, but I guess that more of them will be meaningful.

A small group is preparing for the next Confirmation service which will be held in the early part of next year, and anyone wishing to join this group should get in contact with me.

In the corresponding period last year the amount given was £2772. On <u>Sermons</u> <u>Day</u> June 19th a further donation of£50.00 was received in addition to the £945.76 given in church.

Lent Appeal At a recent meeting of the Church Council it was finally decided to divide the proceeds of this year's Lent Appeal in 3 ways. As is our usual practice 50% (£222) has ben sent to the <u>Church Missionary Society</u> for its general work overseas. 25% (£111) has been given to <u>Scripture Union</u>. In recognition of the continuing ministry of Helen Franklin, who has maintained contact with our Church school since the Childrens' Mission last year by coming to take the school assembly at least once per term and 25% (£111) has also been donated to the <u>Church Army's Portman House Trust</u> which seeks to provide short term accommodation for, and support to, homeless women in our capital city.

The Bolton Christian Bookshop has moved from
St George's Road to a far better site opposite the main
Post Office in Deansgate. The premises are a vast
improvement and there is now a good display of Bibles,
Christian Literature, cassettes and videos. Pat Boulton
is a voluntary worker at the shop and Joyce Sutcliffe is
our Bookstall manager. Both are willing to obtain things for you and by using
them the church gains a 10% discount.
