"Making Room for God this Christmas" is the punch line of this year 's national advertising campaign which we and other local Churches are keying into. We are being invited to make a small donation to enable this co-ordinated campaign to purchase low-cost advertising space and radio time in the hope that by working together across the country a real impact can be made. Using this nationally produced material we shall be distributing details of our own Christmas services throughout the Deane/Daubhill area. What is very important is that we ourselves make room for God this Christmas, otherwise it would be hypocritical to be encouraging others to do what we are failing to do ourselves. Consequently I want to encourage you as you make your detailed plans not to neglect the Spiritual

dimension in your celebrations.

Make room for God this Christmas.

Handrail at the Chancel Steps.

For some time now our Buildings and Fabric Committee have been considering how we might assist the elderly and infirm who experience difficulty in negotiating the chancel steps especially when returning from communion. Some Churches have been able to introduce a handrail. For this to be effective it needs to be firm and substantial, and at the same time removable for weddings and funerals. This can be achieved relatively easily when there is a rood screen separating the chancel from the nave. We don't have this feature and indeed its absence is one of the attractions of our building which is so open and light. The committee has sought professional advice, but the only solution would seem to be that of placing a sidesman by the steps to offer assistance to those who need it. Alas this can be a sensitive issue and some people are offended and hurt when help is offered. We would simply ask that if your need assistance make it clear to the sidesman on duty. There is no need whatsoever to feel embarrassed about it.

#### **Church Lounge Cleaning**

In spite of regular calls for voluntary help in cleaning the Church Lounge of the Memorial Hall (a duty which comes round once in 6 weeks and takes 2 people working together about an hour and a quarter) sufficient people are not coming forward. This is a sad reflection on a congregation of our size. Very reluctantly the committee is having to consider putting the job out to a contract cleaning firm which will inevitably increase the running costs of the hall. If this situation galvanizes at least 3 people into volunteering this month then this step will be avoided. Alternatively if anyone wishes to tender for this work my wife will be prepared to discuss the situation with him/her.

Diocesan Pilgrimage to Iona Saturday May 6 - Saturday May 13th.

This will be led by Colin Scott, Bishop of Hulme. Numbers will be restricted to 44. The cost which includes accommodation in the Abbey and coach travel is £195 adults, £172 for pensioners, £145 for 16-21 years and £132 for 12-16 years. #### The Crusader Stone

Histories of Deane Church record a long stone slab with a cross on it. For centuries it would appear to have been located close to the south wall near to the doorway which once led into the Hulton Chapel. It was thought to mark the resting place of an unknown Crusader.

When several years ago under a Government sponsored job creation scheme a new drainage system was created to carry water from the roof away from the building, this particular stone disappeared probably broken up and used in the building of a retaining wall. Recently a visitor to the churchyard drew Tom Stokes' attention to an old stone which turned out to be the top half of the Crusader stone. It is situated at the NE corner of the Church, embedded near to the "glover's stone". It is thought that this commemorates a Huguenot glovemaker who fled from France during the late 17th century.

"Night of Miracles" is the title of what is described as an exciting modern act of worship and celebration. It is being presented by the Greater Manchester United Christian Singers and supported by Churches Together in Bolton in the Victoria Hall, Knowsley Street on Sunday December 4th at 2.30 pm.

The Ladybridge Patients Group present the **Eccles Borough Band** in concert in Deane Church also on Sunday December 4th at 2.15 pm. Tickets (including the cost of refreshments) are £5.00 and £3.50 for concessions.

#### Preparing for 1995

Available in Church are parish diaries for next year at 75p. Two attractive calendars are also available. The Bolton Hospice calendar with drawings by local artist Brian Barlow retail at £2.50. Another local artist, Theo Vaughan, has produced the Bolton Calendar with limited edition drawings of local churches and scenes from the parishes they serve. These retail at £5.00.

The Big Idea is the name of a project being carried out by Christian students throughout the country. During the present academic year the aim is to distribute to every student in residence in colleges and universities a copy of St. Luke's Gospel. We are asked to pray that these gospels may be distributed with courage and sensitivity; that they may be read, and above all that many students will be drawn to faith in God.


.... The Pastoral Committee are wanting to organise a scheme
