

School Worship

18th December, 1994.

The law as it stands at present demands that there shall be an act of worship in every school each day, and that it should be broadly Christian! In theory this is absolutely splendid, and most Christians would approve. However, the reality of the situation to-day is that the law is only reflecting an ideal which is not being achieved in practice because it is proving to be unworkable. For instance, in our own town we have county primary schools where up to 95% of the children come from an ethnic background of a Muslem and/or Hindu culture. Then in the secondary school sector many headteachers are finding it extremely difficult to find members of staff who are able and willing to lead an act of school worship. There are many fine Christian teachers in our schools, but they are outnumbered by those who are not practising Christians and never have been. Of those teachers who are Christians not many have the confidence or experience to lead Christian worship. For those who are not Christians an act of Christian worship is as alien and unfamiliar as Hindu or Moslem worship would be, and for them to lead an act of worship would be a sham only reinforcing the view which many teenagers hold namely that Christianity is just not true.

School worship is not only a problem for the teaching profession, it is a problem for their pupils too. We need to face up to the fact that neither school worship on weekdays nor Church worship on Sundays switches them on., Our Pathfinder and CYFA leaders find it increasingly difficult to encourage even those of their members who say they believe to come to Church because I suspect that in many cases they would receive some "stick" from their friends. Moreover, they find it hard to be seen to be joining in and enjoying school worship. So what is to be done?

The Evangelical Alliance, generally regarded as a conservative body, has recently come out with a suggestion that has outraged some of its supporters. It is calling for a change in the law so that schools only be required to provide an act of worship twice a week, and that pupils "opt in" rather than "opt out" as at present. I believe that this position at least has the merits of recognising (i) the realities and difficulties of the present situation more than its critics do and (ii) that ultimately Christian worship has to be freely entered into, for compulsory worship is a contradiction in terms. In practice however, I would hazard a guess that very few teenagers would opt in, for it would require great courage and strong convictions to go against the prevailing stream of the secularism of their peers.

Our own Philip Gore, who is a spokesman for a group of General Synod members, accuses the Evangelical Alliance for "running up the white flag of surrender". He quotes the statistic from a recent survey which showed that 70 percent of parents wanted daily worship for their children. Personally I would treat this figure with a pinch of salt, for only a small fraction of these parents take part in an act of Christian worship regularly on Sundays, and far fewer still on a daily basis. This is the kind of hypocrisy and sham which teenagers rightly see through. I suspect that they are probably the same kind of people who complain bitterly when a congregation reluctantly decides that the time has come for its Church building to be closed. Experience shows that invariably the greatest opposition to closure comes from those who only use the building on rare occasions.

There are those who claim that the answer lies in strengthening our Church schools both in the primary and secondary sector. In theory at least it is part of their ethos to assemble together as a community to worship God. Moreover it is assumed that this was one of the factors which caused parents (and their children?) to choose a Church school. At the risk of putting my head on the chopping block I must confess that I detect the same degree of cynicism and dislike of Christian worship amongst pupils at Church secondary schools as I do from those brought up in the county sector.

So where does this leave us? It leaves us asking ourselves what is worship? Worship literally means "worth-ship", recognising and valuing the worth of something. Christian worship is recognising and valuing the worth of Almighty God, and to do this we need to engage our minds and bodies as well as our spirits. Those of us who have the responsibility of leading Christian worship are not in the entertainment business. Our job is not to keep folk amused. Nor is it about making them bored to bits! It's about taking ourselves and the congregation into an awareness of God and of His greatness, so that we wish voluntarily to fall down as it were before Him in worship. We have a long, long way to go before achieving this, but this I believe must be one of our principle aims this coming year. I suspect that it is not only in school during the week, but in Church on Sundays, that in much of our so called worship we are merely going through the motions.

When our Worship Action Group consulted the congregation earlier in the year the greatest area of dissatisfaction surrounded the monthly family/parade service. At this next month's service the congregation will be invited to answer a questionnaire in which your opinions and suggestions are being sought. I trust that you will give it your serious consideration.

Finally on behalf of Mary and myself I wish to thank all those of you who have so kindly sent us your Christmas Greetings. We offer you our sincere Christian Best Wishes for the New Year.
