## The Rector writes

26th August, 1995

Here are a few frightening statistics:-

Every six seconds a new crime is committed in this country, and a violent attack every two minutes. Every day almost 500 couples are divorced, 170 babies are born to teenage unmarried mothers and 470 babies are aborted.

Every week 1,000 people leave the Church of England with other churches suffering a similar decline. Although there are 30,000 Christian clergy in Britain, there are 80,000 registered fortune tellers and witches.

Here is a question - how can the Christian Church change things for the better?

It will never even begin to do so until we admit that our country no longer has a right to describe itself as "Christian". The Church has to recognise that it has a mission field on its own doorstep which is just as pagan as any other part of the world. How do we reach non-church goers with the Christian message? This is what the **Decade of Evangelism** is all about, and one of the most significant developments over the past couple of years has been the mushroom growth of what is called the **Alpha Course**. This originated in the London West End Church of Holy Trinity, Brompton. Whereas two years ago there were fewer than 10 courses outside Brompton there are now over 1,200 with dozens more registering every month. We have already had our first pioneer course, and the second is planned for the autumn. It is our hope and prayer that in the period immediately after Christmas and finishing in Holy Week next year many church members will have had the experience of being a member of an Alpha group. If 400 people have been on the courses run by the largest congregation in Bolton (St. Peter, Halliwell) surely we should be aiming for half that number by next Easter.

What are the distinctively attractive features of an Alpha Course?

- It presents on video a simple course in basic Christianity which is attractive both to nonchurchgoers and to those for whom their Christianity has little meaning and relevance to everyday life.
- People are allowed, indeed encouraged, to ask whatever questions they wish in a small group. Nothing is treated as too trivial, threatening or illogical. Questions are to be answered honestly, courteously and thoughtfully. It allows the doubters to express their doubts and the seekers to find the truth. It provides an enjoyable and supportive atmosphere in which to tackle the great questions of life.
- No one is "pestered" if they choose to leave because they have had enough. People are not pushed or forced into making decisions which they are not ready to take.
- There is a social element in the course when members can relax over meals and go away for a day together.
- It is friendship based. There is little advertising and publicity. People who have been helped on an Alpha course encourage their friends and relatives to come. At the end of the day this is far more effective than when I exhort you in the notices to join up. Friends bring friends.

I have noticed a change in the lives and in the depth of commitment of some of those who were members of our first Alpha Course. I pray that will be repeated and snowball on subsequent courses for this could arrest the decline in our congregations and also enable us as a Church to have an impact for good in the community in which God has placed us as His representatives in Deane.



Deane Church is one of those Bolton Churches which has participated in the earlier phases of "There is Hope". Remember Michael and Alison Saunders persuading many of us to display "There is Hope" stickers in our cars? Up till now the emphasis has been upon individual Churches doing there own thing in relation to reaching out with the Christian message in ways which have been most appropriate to them. In our case, for instance, we took part in the Children's Mission led by Helen Franklin of Scripture Union. In addition we invited a team from Holy Trinity Church Platt in South Manchester to join us for a week of mission in the autumn of 1993. In the Children's Mission we were seeking primarily, though by no means exclusively, to convey the Christian message to the children and their families of our St. Mary's Primary School, very few of whom have contact with any Church. In the Adult Mission we were aiming to engage more of the considerable fringe membership of our Church who are content to remain on the touchline, somewhat detached from the life and witness of the congregation.

The next phase of "There is Hope" is being planned for 1996. Then the emphasis will shift from individual Churches working separately to them participating together, cooperating on a town wide basis. There will be two main events.

- 1. Canon Michael Green, the Archbishop of Canterbury's Advisor in Evangelism, will be bringing a large team of Christian students during Lent from Sunday March 24th to Sunday March 31st. The team members will be shared around the participating Churches encouraging us to reach out with the Christian message. There will be a chance to meet Michael Green and his wife, Rosemary, who are coming to Bolton on Thursday September 7th. They will be speaking at a specially convened meeting to be held in St. Peter's Church, Church Road Halliwell in the evening at 7.30 pm. The Church Council and members of the Mission and Pastoral Committee are especially encouraged to attend, but it is an open meeting and all are welcome.
- 2. In the autumn from October 4th-13th there will be a series of evening meetings held in the Victoria Hall, Knowsley Street. It is hoped that Christians who have made a name for themselves in sport or entertainment will be invited to appear and take part in the evening programme.

At its meeting on Monday September 11th the Church Council will have to decide whether or not we should commit our Church to participating in this next phase of "There is Hope".

### CHURCH CLEANING

In order to keep the size of teams at a reasonable level we have reduced the number of teams from five to four, and to ensure that people are not being asked to do their duty more frequently than at present we are proposing to leave the Church uncleaned once every six weeks. Inevitably there will be those who will complain that the pews are dusty or the carpets are dirty. There is one very simple answer to such criticism, and one very simple solution to this problem. If ten complainers and/or others become reliable volunteers then we can increase the number of teams to five once again.
