NEW YEAR - NEW HYMN BOOK

For sometime now on the recommendation of the Worship Committee our Church Council has been reviewing the music book which we use in worship. There are two main factors which have prompted this consideration.

- * Firstly, our present hymn book (Ancient and Modern Revised) has been in use since 1950, and though most of our copies have been repaired over the years many of them have now reached the stage of being beyond repair. Clearly we need new hymn books.
- * Secondly, over the period that we have been using this hymn book, and especially during the past couple of decades, there has been an upsurge in the writing of hymns and songs. This is reflected in the fact that we now have several books and song sheets to supplement the main hymn book. Though some of this modern material has enriched our worship it has nevertheless created problems. However clear the instructions given by the worship leader many people, especially visitors, do find it confusing to have to refer to several different books during the same service. Clearly things need to be simplified.

In an ideal world we would go for a music book containing the best of the traditional hymns together with a good selection of the best of the songs which have been written in more recent times. Unfortunately we don't live in an ideal world and so we have not found the perfect book, nor are we ever likely to either. However, the Church Council has decided by an overwhelming vote to replace all our present books with a single volume called "Mission Praise". This contains a very good selection of both traditional and new material. There is a price to pay, of course, for we will lose some good hymns, but we will also gain some very good ones too.

The Church Council is mindful of the fact that unless there has been a considerable improvement in the level of giving since the new sets of Christian Giving Envelopes came into use recently, then our financial situation will be very tight in deed. Consequently, the Council wishes to encourage members of the congregation to 'sponsor' individual books as we have done in the past. For example, you may wish to give a book(s) in memory of a relative or friend, or as a 'thankyou' for your marriage or the birth of a child. It is envisaged that the books will contain an appropriate inscription. Because we have been able to obtain a favourable discount from the Wesley Owen bookshop in town for a large purchase the cost to the sponsor will be £4.00 per congregation copy and £20.00 per full music edition for choir members. We were very encouraged to hear that the members of our St. Andrews congregation have 'sponsored' 61 of their new chairs at £65 per unit, and we are confident that in the course of time the £1,500 outlay on the hymns books will be recovered. So it is over to you! It is hoped that they will come into use on January 28th.

SPRING HARVEST 1996

On the day after Easter Monday this year my wife, Gail our 3 children and I went to Minehead in Somerset for a six day stay at Somer West World (Butlin's Holiday Camp!), for an event called 'Spring Harvest'.

This was our third consecutive visit to Spring Harvest, and we went because we wanted a Christ-centred holiday which could be fun for our children and ourselves, without it being boring or 'stuffy', yet with a clearly Christian emphasis.

Spring Harvest can be really good both for children, parents and those without children who are looking for the chance to be with other Christians in a holiday setting.

The whole week can be fully occupied with seminars, games, quizzes, teach-ins, on a whole range of topics. Or you can just 'pick'n'mix' those bits that you take a fancy to, leaving the rest of your time free to relax, go on a trip, or make use of the extensive leisure facilities available. No-one will pressure you, and you certainly won't find any unpleasant 'hard-sell' types trying to make you attend sessions or take part in activities that don't appeal to you.

It's really quite laid back, yet very well planned and organised. There are professionally trained children's teachers and leaders for toddlers right up; to older teenagers so that parents and other adults can go to their own morning sessions, re-claiming their offspring at lunch-time from fully supervised activities.

There are sessions and seminars planned throughout the afternoons, though we didn't attend any, preferring to go to the swimming pool, fun fair or go out for trips into the beautiful North Devon countryside nearby.

After tea in the evenings, there are optional services, rallies and group activities for all ages, again fully supervised for children and teenagers, from boisterous noisy celebrations in the 'Big Top' (6,000 capacity) to the quieter more reflective gatherings in the 'Beach-Comber'.

To sum it all up, I would say that Spring Harvest is a great way to get away for a few days with other Christians - it fits in well with the Easter holidays - it needn't cost the earth and it could do you all the world of good!

* For the first time the Council had to reduce the donations to these 4 missions by £40 in each case in order to keep within their budget. However, a couple within our congregation have made up the shortfall from their own personal charity giving and so the total amount donated to these missions remains at £950.
