This year Holy Week falls within the first week of April, and its going to be a little different this time. To begin with it marks the completion of our Church Alpha course. Since January 90 of us have been meeting weekly. In common with literally thousands of others across the country we have been following a course of basic Christian teaching pioneered by Holy Trinity Church, Brompton in London's West End. Though it has to be said that not everyone has found it equally helpful, the majority appear to have found it very helpful indeed. The final sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 2/3 will begin with a buffet meal provided by the course members, and to which they wish to extend an open invitation to everyone, and especially to those who haven't been on an Alpha course yet. After the meal we have invited a few course members to share with us how they have been helped in different ways. Our hope is that this in turn will encourage others to join the next Alpha course starting after Easter, but you can be assured that no pressure will be exerted upon you!

Because of these meals we will not be having our usual Maundy Thursday Agapé meal to commemorate the institution of the Lord's Supper. However, the service on <u>Good Friday</u> morning will be Holy Communion. This is entirely appropriate because when Christ instituted this service it was to provide His followers with a visual aid to focus our attention upon, and to deepen our understanding and appreciation not so much of His birth, life and teaching, but of His sacrificial death on the Cross for us.

In contrast to the quiet solemn service on Good Friday, we have the joyful celebrations on Easter Day. I pray that these different moods will be reflected in our worship on these two important days. I believe it will be by those of us who have appreciated what Christ did for us on the cross, and who know that Christ is risen and alive in our own experience now. If our worship in Church is flat, dull and uninspiring it is well worth while asking ourselves whether there is something lacking about the faith we profess. The fault doesn't always lie with the clergy, the organist and choir!

Because of the Alpha meals this year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting cannot be held in Holy Week; instead it will be on Tuesday April 16th. In addition to receiving reports of the happenings over the past year, we shall be electing our Church wardens and a new Church council. The election this year is perhaps more important than usual because there is a distinct possibility that during the next 12 months they will be concerned with the process of appointing a new Rector of Deane. It is a sad reflection of our church that in the past very few people have shown much interest in the annual elections. A new Electoral Roll has just been created, and everyone on this roll has the privilege of nominating a fellow member or of being nominated to serve on the Council. I do pray that you will give this matter your serious thought and make it a subject for prayer. It is sometimes said that a Church gets the kind of Rector it deserves. I think the same can be said about the Church Council too. If a congregation is largely apathetic about whom it chooses as its leaders it has only got itself to blame if they land up with a "dud" rector and a lifeless council.

I wish to commend to you the Diocesan magazine called CRUX. This is an extremely good monthly publication which contains both items of news and interesting articles on what is happening beyond the boundaries of our parish. Sadly the number of people reading this magazine in recent months has fallen off. I don't wish to reduce the number that we order, but at the same time I don't like to see money and materials being wasted. Though it costs 12p we don't make a charge. Instead we prefer that people make a voluntary contribution towards the cost of producing this newsletter and Crux, for in this way we have found that over the years all expenses have been covered.

Some people have been enquiring as to what has happened to the old hymn books and songbooks which have been replaced by our new hymn book. At the present time they have simply been taken out of circulation. If people would like a copy of the Ancient and Modern Hymn Book or the Deane Church Song Book they are most welcome to help themselves from the boxes near the north door in Church. However, I must point out that because of copyright restrictions the Song Book should not be used in a public gathering. However, you may find as I do that the words of our hymns and songs are very useful in our times of private prayer. We are planning to offer some of the 100 Hymns for To-day to another church which can make good use of them.

CHILDREN OF
EMBU KENYA

On the first of April we will have been supporting the Street Children of Embu with prayers and finance for one full year. We only asked people to commit themselves for one year because you never know how your circumstances may change.

Some people feel the Street Children are now part of their lives at Deane and are now a permanent part of their giving. Apart from the good people of Embu we are the only other people who support these children. The money we send has done so much good and I believe may have even saved lives. The number of children who use the project is growing. The 2 workshops are well on the way to being completed which in itself is excellent. The workshops would have been build even if we hadn't sent money, but without our money they would be at least 2 years away from completion. About 40 children go to the church offices for lunch every Tuesday and Friday. The children are doing well at school and more children are coming to the Lord and being saved.


