The Rector Writes


At the risk of appearing repetitive I wish to commend to you once again the "There is Hope" mission in Bolton at the beginning of this coming month. All the meetings are to be held at the Victoria Hall, Knowsley Street starting on October 1st and continuing from October 4th-13th. Their aim is to communicate the Christian message in a non-church environment.



Consequently almost all the meetings will not be like church services with hymns and prayers. They are designed for Christians to take their relatives, friends and neighbours to hear and see the Christian message presented in an attractive but challenging way. Each meeting seeks to appeal to different age groups and interests.

There is something for children, teenagers, men, women as well as for those with a taste for music whether it be classical or a West Indian Gospel Choir. And for good measure Noel Proctor, that most entertaining of Irish preachers will be speaking at the united service on Sunday evening, October 6th when there will be no service in Deane Church.

The final Sunday of the Mission, October 13th, coincides with our **Harvest Thanksgiving** services. In both the Old and New Testament sections of the Bible famines were a recurring experience and of course, they still occur to-day as we are reminded on our T.V.screens.



Sometimes they are caused by natural disasters such as floods, drought or locusts. Sometimes the causes are human as man fights with man in times of war. Famine leads to malnutrition, disease and death caused by shortage of the right kind of food - proteins and vitamins. It is estimated that every night nearly one billion people go to bed hungry. In the face of these uncomfortable facts Christians simply cannot and must not pretend that either these situations do not exist, or that there is nothing we can do about them.

Being content to celebrate our abundant harvest simply by singing traditional Victorian hymns is to be completely out of touch with present day reality. In our main harvest services we shall be using a selection of material produced by Tear Fund showing how our gifts are being used to tackle some of these problems in the so called "Third World". We shall of course be singing some of our well loved harvest hymns and we shall be encouraged to bring traditional harvest gifts, but I wish to encourage you even more strongly to give generously to our annual Harvest Appeal for Tear Fund's ministry to the victims of famine. One of our members, Sylvia Harrison, who is a cook at the Bolton Hospice is offering to bake any number of apple pies and to donate the proceeds of the sale (£1 per pie) to the Harvest Appeal. If you have an abundance of apples on your tree she will be happy to convert them into pies. Gifts of flowers and fruit and help with decorating the Church for Harvest will be appreciated on Saturday morning October 12th from 9.30 onwards, and we will require volunteers to distribute some of the produce locally on the following Monday morning from 10.30 onwards.

The Pastoral Committee have asked me to share with you their desire to improve and strengthen our ministry to those parents who make enquiries about baptism for their children. Their idea is that each family should be offered the friendship and support of an "Honorary Godparent" who would be the link person between the Church family and the natural family of the child until at least he/she becomes old enough to start in the Climbers section of our Sunday School. It is envisaged that it would involve going on an initial home visit with one of the clergy, probably sitting with the family at the Thanksgiving and Baptism services and then visiting the home on birthday and baptism anniversaries. Craig Mochrie would be very interested to hear from any who wish to consider serving in this way.

Though we have donated to this scheme for many years it is several years since we provided hospitality for one of the bursars. This year we are to have as our guest the Rev A, Jacob Ayeebo from Ghana who is studying at Crammer Hall, Durham. He will spend the fortnight before Christmas in our parish. As we already have links with Ghana through the Biney family, we look forward to this additional link with the Church in that country.
