

The Rector writes

26th October, 1996.

"Living Stones" was not only the theme of the recent Praise and Prayer service on October 20th it is also the title given to the forthcoming vocations conference to be held in our diocese on Saturday November 9th. Though it is the vocation of every Christian to serve God and to witness for him, it would seem that He does call some of us to do this as Licensed Readers, Lay Evangelists and Ordained Clergy. Discovering just what and whom God calls to these special vocations rarely comes in a flash - usually it is a process over a period of time. In my own case, soon after I became a Christian in my teenage years I was taught that I should at least consider it as a possible option, however remote, that God might call someone as shy and self- conscious as myself to serve Him in the ordained ministry of our Church. I must confess that though I tried hard to put this thought on the "back burner" throughout my 5 years at University it was not until I was coming to the end of my time in the Royal Navy several years later that I finally yielded.

This conference is open to all who wish to enquire or explore some of the ways in which God calls us into both lay and ordained ministry. After a Keynote speech by the Bishop of Middleton there will be workshops focussing on different aspects and forms of ordained ministry, the Church Army and various lay ministries including the office of Reader. There will be opportunities to ask and to listen, and to meet with others who are actively involved in this exciting journey of exploration. If you are interested in going to this conference - with no strings attached - please have a word with me sooner rather than later.

I especially commend to your prayers **David Dewhurst** who has just begun the third and final year of his training to be a Licensed Reader, and **Dorothy Cox** who, having attended a series of in-depth interviews at a selection conference has been recommended to train to become a Church Army Officer.

Another early lesson that I was taught as a young Christian was the importance of giving to God's work in a regular and systematic way. A guiding text for me has been the one which appears on our Christian Giving Envelopes: "Every Sunday each of you must put aside some money in proportion to what he has earned...." (1 Corinthians Ch.16 v.2)

St. Paul is encouraging us to give **regularly** - every Sunday and not just occasionally:

It was put to me that if the Jews gave a tithe (i.e. 10% of their income) then Christians should at least match that proportion, and in common with other Christians who take the Bible teaching as their guide, throughout my Christian life I have always sought to give this proportion. For many years my wife and I have given 5% to our local Church and 5% to other missions and charities through the excellent facilities of the Charities Act Foundation. Moreover, St. Paul's teaching wasn't directed to some members of the Church at Corinth, but to all members for we are all included in the phrase "each of you must put aside some money".

Without doubt one reason why the main line Christian Churches are in financial difficulties whereas the religious cults are not, is because they have taken this Christian teaching far more seriously than the majority of our members have done. Christian giving is one of the hardest lessons to learn, because our pockets and purses are usually the last part of us to be converted. However, it is far easier to learn this lesson when we are younger and I believe we have a responsibility not to soft-pedal this when teaching our children and young people.

Though our Christian Giving Envelope cannot make us give proportionally it at least has the merit of helping us to give regularly. If you haven't started using them please apply for a new set of envelopes as they are distributed this month. If you already use them I simply ask you to take this opportunity to review what you give so that it is in proportion to the income you receive by way of pocket money, pension, wage or salary.



During this month most of the <u>Secondary Schools</u> are holding their Open Evenings for prospective parents and pupil. Though many of our children go to the local Deane School there are others who prefer to travel across the town to other schools including the two Grant Maintained Church of England Schools - St. James in Farnworth and Canon Slade at Bradshaw. As the recent Channel Four T.V. programme featuring these two schools demonstrated they appear to be popular and there is competition for places. Selection is usually based upon links with a Christian Church. Whereas in the past the Rector has processed the application forms using information supplied by the Sunday School departments this year it will be done by a panel consisting of the Rector, a Churchwarden and the Explorer Leader and/or Youth Co-ordinator. The Canon Slade Open Evening is on Wednesday, November 6th with the Headmaster giving an introductory talk at 5.30pm repeated at 6.30pm and 7.30pm.

We promise that the outcomes will be analysed very carefully and that they will be acted on so we really do need answers and comments that reflect as precisely as possible your feelings and opinions.

The success of the Questionnaire also depends on having as many returns as possible. When you have completed yours, please bring it back to church and put it in the box provided. Alternatively, if it's more convenient, post it through the letter box of the Rectory but PLEASE, PLEASE make sure that you return it by Sunday 1 December at the latest.
