

Jacob is married to Rita who is expecting to be delivered of their third child probably during the time he is with us. Jacob comes from a As a boy he was a good wrestler nicknamed the "Elephant". As a teenager non-Christian background. having thrown an opponent unconscious, he decided that it was time he gave up wrestling and joined a Scripture Union Club instead! It was through this that he became a Christian and his life was transformed. His new nickname became "Father Christmas". He soon became involved in serving Christ in outstation churches and through this experience he felt that God was calling him into the ordained ministry of the Because his archbishop sees him as an outstanding potential leader, Jacob has been Church. recommended to pursue advanced studies to upgrade his skills and knowledge. As these facilities are lacking in Ghana we and several other parishes are supporting him financially through the bursary scheme. Though he will be having bed and breakfast at the Rectory, I hope that there will be no shortage of people prepared to invite him to their homes for a meal mid-day or early evening. There is a hospitality list in Church. Who knows you may be entertaining a future Archbishop of Ghana unawares!



This year's <u>Christmas Appeal</u> will focus on giving support through our prayers and gifts to Tear Fund's ministry to children in need in Haiti. People often say that "Christmas is for children". Well it is, but I would want to emphasize that it is equally for adults too. Throughout the Advent season leading up to Christmas as we light an additional candle on the Advent Ring we shall sing a new hymn entitled "Light a candle in the darkness". It reminds us of God's purpose in coming into our world in the person of the Babe of Bethlehem and of our responsibilities to-day of bringing light into the darkness of children's lives.

Details of our <u>Christmas services</u> are contained on the front page of this newsletter and they are also published on a Christmas card which, in conjunction with some other local churches, we are planning to deliver to every household in the district.

Instead of sending a bag full of cards to fellow church members whom we see regularly, please consider the idea of sending just one card to all the Church Family. This can be brought to Church from Sunday December 8th onwards and placed in a prominent position for all who want to see it. It has the merit of saving time buying and writing cards and that last minute panic of discovering you have left someone off your list who has remembered you! It will also save considerable expense, though the Church Council hopes that the money you save will in fact be donated to a charity, perhaps the Christmas Appeal or some other worthy cause.

And finally a thankyou once again to the members of the small team who are engaged in putting the Deane Church News together each month. EMBU IN KENYA

It's the dry season in Embu at the moment, and it is causing many problems.

The biggest problem being lack of water.

In a recent letter to me Johnson Maringa writes:

"Our eyes keep following black clouds flying overhead and our prayerful hearts demanding showers. You cannot think that this is the same place you visited in July. The heat is unbearable. We go far to get water everyday. How much we need your prayers".

It is hard to keep the street children at the Centre due to the shortages of food and water. They are only surviving by the grace of God. Typhoid is also a problem. There was much typhoid when I last visited Embu and we were told by my American friends to be very careful with the water. Johnson didn't tell us this as he didn't want us to worry, but I believe with the situation at the moment this problem will grow.

Of course there are many other children all over the world suffering as these children are. They are hungry and their bellies are swollen so please keep the children in your prayers as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. Pray that the drought of 1984 won't happen in 1996. If there is any update on the situation - I will let you know!

Mary Jackson who wishes to thank the members of the Church and Hall cleaning teams for their loyal service over the past year. However, new members are now desperately needed to strengthen some of the depleted teams which operate on Friday mornings or evenings. The duty comes round every 5 weeks and it takes about 1 hour. Because of the disappointing response this time last year it was decided to leave the Church uncleaned once every 5 weeks. If there isn't a better response this year we might have to have 2 non-cleaning weeks which would be a very poor reflection on a congregation of our size.
