The Rector writes

28th December 1996.

I am a member of a small group who have been asked to plan a midweek programme for the period of Lent and for the home groups during the rest of the year. When we met recently we considered various options. What particularly impressed us was the fact that several of the nationally produced courses for lent were all focusing on the subject of prayer. This could be a mere coincidence, but we prefer to see it otherwise perhaps providential. Certainly it is our belief that prayer needs to be given a much higher priority this coming year in the life of our church, and it would appear that we are not alone in our thinking.

Praying together ought to be a natural thing to do when Christians meet with one another, but in point of fact many of us find it extremely difficult, even embarrassing. We find it relatively easy to converse with one another, but when it comes to conversing with God (because that's what prayer is) we become strangely tongue-tied. The course we have selected for the middle five weeks of Lent is called "Saints at Prayer", and one of its aims is to teach us how to pray naturally in groups with confidence. As Lent is very early this year it is important that our planning is more or less completed by the end of January. The existing home groups will use this material and in addition a group will meet on Tuesday evenings in the Church Lounge for those who feel more comfortable there than meeting in someone else's home. Because we need to know how much material to prepare it will be most helpful from an administrative point of view if people do not delay in signing on for this Lent course.

Running at the same time as the Lent groups but starting earlier on Wednesday January 15th is our next Alpha Course. This could be described as a "Beginners Guide to Christianity". Though it was pioneered at the "well heeled" parish of Holy Trinity, Brompton in London's fashionable West End it has spread far and wide over the past three years. It is estimated to have reached 380,000 people in 55 countries.

The Alpha course is controversial and it is not without its critics. I personally have certain reservations. However, it would be nothing short of blind prejudice on my part if I did not recognise that within our own congregation there are some members whose whole lives have been profoundly influenced by what they have learnt and experienced on previous Alpha courses. Some of these people are now beginning to take on leadership roles in different aspects of our Church Family life. I find this tremendously encouraging. It is not without significance that though they wouldn't necessarily endorse everything on the Alpha course nevertheless both the Archbishop of Canterbury and Cardinal Hulme, the leader of the Roman Catholic Church in this country, have approved the course and are happy to commend it. That is precisely what I wish to do to those of you who reading this letter have not been on one of our earlier courses. Application forms giving details can be obtained from Charlie Moore or myself.

At a recent meeting of the Church Council it was decided that because our income from direct weekly giving in 1996 had not even kept abreast of the present level of inflation the only way we are able to meet our commitments will be to dip into our reserves. This is not a wise and healthy thing to do and the Church Council asked me to alert the Church membership to this serious state of affairs. Quite apart from the need for everyone of us to review what we give to God's work through our Church there are two things which could lead to a marked improvement in our income. The first is when the many who still do not use the Christian Giving Envelopes begin to do so. When the envelopes are used as they are intended then spasmodic giving becomes regular giving. The second is when the significant number of income tax payers who already use the envelope "covenant" their giving. This considerably enhances the value of your donation without any extra cost to yourself. As I do not have access to who does and who does not take envelopes and covenant their giving I cannot be accused of getting at you personally, but "if the cap fits then please wear it".

Mary joins me as do my colleagues and their wives in thanking you for your Christmas greetings. We send you our prayerful good wishes for this coming year.

FOREVER AND EVER, if I am too anxious about each day's affairs.

AMEN, unless I honestly say, "Cost what it may, this is my prayer".

WHAT EXACTLY IS HAPPENING IN CENTRAL AFRICA?

Quite frankly it's all very confusing! What we do know is that following the mass genocide in Rwanda 2 years ago over 1 million refugees fled to neighbouring Zaire to the west and many thousands to neighbouring Tanzania in the east. Since then they have been living in makeshift camps where, despite the conditions, they have been reasonably well cared for by the international and local communities.

In November an estimated 600,000 refugees were forcefully repatriated to Rwanda. There was an international debate as to what had happened to the rest and just as an emergency force was being assembled it was then assumed that all the refugees had returned. But no one knew for certain. However, Tear Fund's Richard Allen has now returned with photographic evidence (which he passed on to the BBC and they described as "exclusive pictures") to confirm what the aid agencies had been claiming for weeks, that up to 500,000 people are displaced and on the move in this area of dense jungle, caught between the rebel forces of Rwanda and the Zaire government troops.

The concern is that these people are in a physically and politically vulnerable situation. Disaster cannot be far away. Richard Allan's visit to the area was to assess the situation, not only to guide Tear Fund as to how they might best help on the ground, but also to provide the evidence for the international community to take appropriate action.

We need to pray not only for the refugees but also for those responsible for making decisions which could affect both the immediate and long term future of so many people.

Snapshots from Thankyou letters received from some of the Missions and Charities we support through our Christian Giving Programme.

From the Church Mission Society (CMS)

"Sudan, the largest country in Africa, has been in a state of civil war for the past 40 years. However, the Christian Church is growing and there is a great thirst for Christian education. We are supporting Theological Education by Extension (TEE) for this enables people to study without having to travel far in what is a volatile and dangerous area. One of our Mission Partners, Paul Savage, is involved in TEE in Yambis (whose bishop is Daniel Zindo a former EFAC bursar who stayed in our parish over Christmas 1979). Paul writes "What does the future hold for this country when all its young people are denied education and the chance to learn skills which can benefit their communities? Not only denied education but sent off to fight and maybe not return. People are disorientated and shocked. They feel impotent and powerless to question what is being done. Even the Church is muted in its response. We will have to rethink our institutions and what we are doing and how we go forward from here - if indeed we are able!"

From the Church Army
