

The Rector writes

29th May, 1997

This time last year I stuck my neck out by raising questions about the ancient tradition of <u>Deane Sermons</u>. Though some people didn't like it there has been a growing body of opinion who see the need to look at this annual event with a view to revising it to make it more relevant and attractive to a wider number of people. For instance, it is fairly obvious from the continuing decline in numbers that the day has lost much of the appeal that it once had. It certainly fails to 'switch on' children and young people. Moreover, I can't think that the very title 'Deane Sermons' is anything but a 'switch off', and processing behind a marching band (if and when you can afford to hire one) is much less appealing than hitherto. Though this may all sound very negative our Church Council has been concerned to present a positive alternative.

The weekend of June 28/29 has been earmarked as a <u>Celebration Weekend</u> and a varied programme has been planned with the aim of making provision for all age groups. The weekend begins with a <u>FUNDAY</u> to be held in the grounds of our St. Mary's Primary School on the Saturday from 1.00 – 4.00 pm. For this the Social Committee will need lots of volunteers to help with attending stalls, serving drinks and making cakes and biscuits. At the back of Church there is a list for you to indicate what help you can offer. This event aims to cater for the needs of all families and not just those connected with St. Mary's School. Likewise the short **OPEN AIR SERVICE** in the school grounds on the following day at 3.30 pm. will have the same people in mind. This will be preceded by a **PROCESSION OF WITNESS** leaving Junction Road at 2.30 pm. and making its way to the school via parts of the Platt Hill and Sutton Trust estates. We are all invited to follow the Preswich and Radcliffe Band. On the Saturday evening there will be a **DISCO** in the Memorial Hall for the benefit of teenagers, and in the context of this it is hoped that there will be a short challenging talk by someone with experience in this kind of Christian outreach.

The Sunday services in Church will be at the normal times. The preacher at the main morning service of Holy Communion will be Canon Colin Craston who until his retirement from St. Pauls Deansgate, was also an Honorary Chaplain to H.M. the Queen, and who was awarded an honorary doctor's degree by the Archbishop of Canterbury in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the Anglican Church worldwide. I recently heard him remark that now he has more opportunities to sit in the congregation during retirement he has noticed how many people do not know how to make good use of the time before and after they have received communion. I have good reason to believe that he would be able to say the same of us if he was a member of our congregation. Though we are encouraged to make constructive use of these periods by singing appropriate devotional songs and hymns it would appear that many don't do so, preferring instead to speak above the music to tell our neighbours either what bargain we picked up from Sainsburys, or to give our verdict on Wanderers the previous day. If we don't use this time in the communion service in a better way than this then it may be because I have failed to teach or you have failed to learn. Consequently I have asked Canon Craston to address this particular problem in his sermon.

The evening service will take the form of a 'Favourite Hymns of Praise'. You are invited to use one of the forms available in Church to indicate what are your favourite 3 hymns and/or songs. From this a group under Nola Worsfold's leadership will compile the top favourite and construct an order of service based on them. You are also asked to give the reason for your first choice as it is hoped to be able to incorporate this in the service. Though no one will be compelled to say something in the actual service it enhances the occasion when people are willing to do so. Forms should be returned by Sunday June 15th. Although the Celebration Weekend will be a full and busy one the Worship Committee hope that this evening service will be well supported.

At the end of this month Keith Holden is wanting to hand over to a successor his responsibilities as Manager of the Memorial Hall. During his term of office Keith has managed to fund the internal and external decoration of the building and to initiate the replacement of the window frames either with double glazed units or by bricking them up where security has demanded it. In addition a new and more reliable heating system has been installed. Thank you Keith for your good stewardship. We are now urgently looking for someone who is capable of maintaining a diary of regular and occasional bookings, which will receive and bank cash from users of the hall and pay those outgoings authorised by the Buildings and Fabric Committee of which he/she would be a co-opted member. Keith or myself will be very pleased to receive suggestions or answer questions.



SWELLING OUR NUMBERS

No, this does not refer to the choir being drowned out by indiscretionary use of the swell pedal on the organ, but to the observation made by many of you that more singers are needed for both Choir and Music Group – more instrumentalists too, for the latter.

We did notice on one questionnaire that a lady or gentleman -I know not which - remarked that (s)he had been at Deane Church for a number of years and had never been invited to join the Choir. Sir/madam, I crave your forgiveness, and if you would just make yourself known I will personally welcome you with open arms! Please - make it soon.

ANGLICAN CHANT - CONFUSING OR WHAT?

In the recent questionnaire our congregation was asked to complete, we asked if you would like the way we sing psalms and canticles to Anglican Chant explained. Many of you said you would; so in the next two editions of the Deane Church News I shall attempt to explain the inner workings of this time-honoured tradition. For now though, I am going to share a few thoughts with you by way of introduction.

Part of my musical background is having been 'brought up' in a choir where singing psalms and canticles was as much the norm as singing hymns, and this was at every service; a psalm and two canticles morning and evening, except once a month when there was a service of Holy Communion. Thus we had plenty of practice!

From the questionnaire I know some of you feel more comfortable with familiar hymns or modern songs. Why? For one reason, we become 'familiar' through practice; and practice together with perseverance, is at the heart of anything at which we wish to become accomplished. Take, for example, learning to play a musical instrument, learning to drive a car, the art of public speaking; all require practice and perseverance if we are to become competent and confident, and then we can begin to enjoy.

As a young chorister, I too used to find pealm singing tedious, and - to use the modern vernacular - "boring"; but as I became older I began to appreciate the beauty and poetry of the Psalms, (sadly blighted in the ASB Psalter, in my opinion, by some insensitive editing,) and nowadays I can find coming into an empty church and singing/playing through a psalm spiritually uplifting.

So, what is this chanting lark all about? Well, for a start, there is no great mystery about it, and once we have understood and mastered a few basic rules, all we have to do is apply them to the particular psalm or canticle we wish to sing.

It has been suggested in the past that we learn just a few chants for our repertoire, and apply them to any psalm/canticle we wish to sing. Well, this may sound okay in theory, but would we appreciate learning just two dozen or so hymn tunes to sing to all the hymns we use? I doubt it very much. Hymn tunes are written to suit the "mood" of the words: imagine, if you will, singing "Lead us, heavenly Father, lead us" to the tune of "Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven", or vice versa. It is physically workable, both hymns being of the same metre, but totally unsuitable.

So it is with chants. When I select a chant for a particular psalm or canticle, I do so bearing in mind the mood of the words, and since psalms portray various and varying "moods", thus we need a good selection of chants.

Most of us, whether or not we realise it, have a pretty good ear for music, and can pick up a tune quite quickly. Generally, chants are fairly uncomplicated as regards the melody, and thus we should be able to learn even an unfamiliar one after just a few verses.

In the next edition we shall be getting down to the nitty-gritty of finding out how chants work. Don't miss it!

The poetical books of the Old Testament especially take a long time to work through, so much work has still to be done before this monumental task is printed and in the hands of the Wichi people of N. Argentina.
