

The Rector writes

25th October,1997

We have been invited to observe November 2nd as <u>Suffering Church Sunday</u>. It is a day when churches around the world will be remembering fellow Christians in Muslim countries who live under oppression and discrimination because of their faith. It has the support of Archbishops, bishops and other Church leaders in the Muslim world. In several Muslim states Christians can only meet secretly for worship, and in more they are forbidden to share their faith. The rise of militant Islam leaves Christian minorities increasingly vulnerable to violent attacks, and governments less willing to defend them. In these circumstances many Christians are tempted to 'keep their heads down' or even to give up. This is why we need to encourage and support them with our prayers. This can be a two way process for there is much that we can learn from those Christians whose faith has triumphed over tragic circumstances, and who, in the midst of suffering themselves, are eager to reach out to the poor and lost in their own communities.

From other pages in this month's edition of this publication you will notice that there is a certain focus on <u>Kenya</u>. Though not a Muslim country the influence of Islam is considerable. The country faces very important elections this coming month. We have had links with the Church in Kenya over many years through the EFAC Bursary Scheme, one of whose men that we supported has pioneered the Embu Street Children project. In the earlier part of this year our neighbour Simon Tatton-Brown, Rector of Westhoughton, spent a 3 months 'sabbatical leave' observing the Church in Kenya and especially its training of clergy. I have invited him to speak at this month's Prayer Focus on Wednesday November 5th at 8.00 pm. Simon is an extremely thoughtful speaker and I wish to encourage you to hear him even if you don't normally come to Prayer Focus.

Someone else with experience in Kenya is Isobel Booth-Clibborn, the daughter of our late Bishop Stanley of Manchester. Isobel is now the Diocesan Youth Officer and we have invited her to conduct an evening 'workshop' on issues of discipline in children's and youth work. This invitation arose from the resignation of one of our Explorer teachers at St. Andrews who said she was no longer prepared to cope with other peoples unruly and disruptive children on Sunday mornings. If you are having this kind of problem with your own or other peoples children then this workshop is designed for you. Isobel will be helping us to develop positive relationships with children and young people as well as providing discipline. The workshop will be held at St. Andrews on Monday November 24^{th} from 7.30 - 9.30 pm. and places can be booked through Pat Boulton (Tel. 655068).

It is with particular sadness that we record the untimely death of <u>Veronica Jackson</u> so soon after her cancer was diagnosed. Since it opened 15 years ago Veronica has been in charge of our nursery unit at St. Mary's School, and consequently several hundred children have passed through her care before proceeding to their primary education at St. Mary's. Ladybridge and Beaumont Schools. Though she was an active and committed Christian in membership of her local Methodist Church in Breightmet she was also a key leader of our J Team that meets after school on Fridays. By the time Friday afternoon comes most teachers look forward to a weekend of 'non-contact time' with children, but not so Veronica. It was a measure of her Christian commitment that she continued to serve the Lord and the children committed to her care out of school hours. There was a good representation from our Church and School at the most helpful service of remembrance and thanksgiving for her life. We thank God for her life and witness.

In a recent letter to our local representatives, Chris and Sheila Dewhurst-Taylor, Canon Johnson Maringa expresses his sympathy to Harold Lever on the death of his wife, and also his gratitude to the family and friends who donated £150 in lieu of floral tributes. From Elsie's death comes hope of a better life for these children in Kenya. Since this fund was opened in 1995 a total of £2,455 has been sent from St. Mary's. The practical everyday running of this project is now in the hands of Deaconess Jesse since Johnson has moved from Embu to work in the newly created Diocese of Mbeen where he is the Archdeacon. He asks prayers for his future since his name is one those that have been put forward to become the bishop of this new diocese.

The Social Committee having organised another successful Harvest Hoe Down are now planning two more events. This years Christmas Dance will be in the Memorial Hall rather than the Golf Club so that it can have a wider appeal. There will be music to suit young and old alike. It will be held on Saturday evening November 29th. Tickets which include the cost of a buffet meal are now on sale at £6 for adults and £2.50 for children.

The other event is a <u>Pantomime Outing</u> to see Dick Whittington at the Albert Hall on Saturday afternoon, December 27th. Tickets at £4.75 must be ordered by Sunday November 23rd.

To raise funds for the Memorial Hall a <u>Fashion Sale</u> of ladies, gents and children's clothing supplied by Joan Berry of Harwood is to be held on Thursday evening November 27th at 8.15 pm. There will be many high street names at low prices! Tickets at 50p can be obtained from Julie Cooper.

Therefore, as I prepare to undertake these challenging responsibilities in serving God and His Church in this parish, your continued prayers would be much appreciated".

PLEASE PRAY FOR KENYA


'Give thanks to the Lord for he is good! For his mercy endures forever'

Further violence and economic pressure threatens to destabilize Kenya - a country which was once an African success story.

Jomo Kenyatta became the first President of Kenya on its independence in 1963. After his death in 1978,


Vice-President Moi assumed Presidency of the KANU party. The first Jultiparty elections were held in 1992, when Moi was re-elected, but he was widely suspected of ballot rigging. Although Kenya's economic performance since independence has been relatively stable, it remains dependent on aid from countries including the UK. The IMF has recently halted loans because of corruption and lack of reform.

Elections are due at the end of 1997. At the beginning of July, reformists held rallies calling for constitutional change that would do away with the dictatorial laws that Moi has used to keep himself in power. The government retaliated by force and some were killed and many injured.



The church has been growing rapidly in freedom since independence, and the East African Revival of 1938 to 1960 has had a profound effect. The National Council of Churches in Kenya has been outspoken in its calls for more democratic government.

Please pray:



- For Christians in key positions in both the government and opposition parties, that they will know the Lord's strength and wisdom for 'such a time as this.' Esther 4:14.
- For the protection of Tear Fund partners involved in a variety of ways in supporting the poor in their communities, including

- vocational training projects, rural development and famine and drought relief.
- For Daystar University in Nairobi which has nearly 300 foreign students attending courses, many of whom are very worried that they will be arrested at any time. Pray for their safety and that harrassment will stop.
- That the Lord will uphold this country and that he will hold back further violence and suffering.



Tear Fund has many long established partners in Kenya and since January 1996 has approved grants totalling over £550,000.
