# The Rector writes

29th November, 1997-

At the end of this month Charlie Moore will have completed his period of ministry with us, his last Sunday being December 28<sup>th</sup>. We will be joined by members of our St. Andrew's congregation for his final evening service after which there will be a presentation to Charlie and Sara in appreciation of their ministry amongst us over the past 4 years. Contributions to this presentation should be placed in a clearly marked envelope and handed to the churchwardens. When they came to Deane they were a childless couple; they will be leaving us with a son, Joseph (2) and a daughter Amana upon whose very recent birth we wish to congratulate them. As I look back over their time with us I wish to pin point 3 things for which I am particularly thankful to God for Charlie and Sara.

- 1. Their generous hospitality. They have frequently used their modest home for entertaining so many of us to a meal. On the whole Boltonians are not particularly good at this, for many of us would only ever consider inviting our very closest friends. I suspect this is why so few of us have been prepared to entertain the African clergymen whom we have sponsored over the years through the 'Study Link' programme. Hospitality is a feature of a healthy Christian Church and we can learn from the example of Charlie and Sara.
- 2. Their genuine concern for individuals, especially those with problems arising from their physical, social or spiritual needs. Their enthusiasm for using the Alpha course to assist people is bearing fruit, for there is now a growing group of younger people, married and single who are beginning to assume leadership roles in our Church.
- 3. Their courageous honesty in being prepared to challenge us personally face to face when it would have been so easy to criticise us behind our backs. Several times I have been on the receiving end of such treatment from Charlie and I guess others have too and it has done us good!

During the 3 months or so before they fly out to Zimbabwe they will be occupied in establishing links with their supporting parishes in the U.K., and in attending preparation courses. Our Church Council has agreed to allow them to continue to occupy the clergy house so that their young family don't have to be uprooted more than is necessary. If all goes to plan there will be a farewell service to them at the end of March.

Our Christmas Services will follow the pattern of previous years with details on the front page of this publication. They will also be contained in a Christmas Card which, in conjunction with our local Churches, we are planning to distribute to every household in this part of Bolton. At Christmastime our Church looks at its very best because a band of dedicated volunteers work hard. You will be very welcome to join the party on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> December from 2.00 pm. Gifts towards the floral decorations should be passed on to Mary.

On Monday evening December  $22^{nd}$  we are planning to sing carols in each of the Old Peoples homes in Deane. These visits are very much appreciated and I hope that there will be a much better turn out this year because for the past 2 years our resources have been very slender. It usually proves to be a most enjoyable evening for the singers as well as the residents.

Last year we initiated the idea of encouraging church members to send a single card to the Church family and to donate the money saved on cards and postage to the Street Children in Embu, Kenya. In this way £58 was raised and I will propose at the Church Council on December 8<sup>th</sup> that we do the same this year.

Finally our thanks must go once again to those who are engaged in producing the Deane Church News on time every month. They are Craig and Una Mochrie who do the typing and stapling, Christine Dean of the Deane School whose reprographic skills ensure good quality and Eric Morgan and more recently David Dewhurst who have been responsible for the monthly prayer diary.

My colleagues and our wives join us in sending you our greetings for Advent and Christmas.



Mexico presents huge inequalities in the distribution of income. An estimated 17.3 million of the total population of 93.7 million live in absolute poverty. The capital Mexico City is one of the largest conurbations

in the world, covering an area of 980 square miles. The majority of the city's 20 million inhabitants live in unsafe and polluted areas what is termed the 'urban stain' — a belt of a dozen surrounding cities in Mexico State. Millions of minimum wage workers commute each day into downtown Mexico City. Each year it is estimated that the metropolitan area's population grows by another seven per cent - each day 2,000 newcomers arrive in the capital to seek

and influences to be agents of Christian transformation.'
