

The Rector writes

17th May.1998

Two years ago under the banner of "The Way Forward" each parish in the Manchester Diocese was asked to look to the future and to consider ways in which they could go for growth, both numerically and spiritually. To this end we produced an Action Plan which our representatives handed to the Bishop in a great service of celebration and dedication in Manchester Cathedral.

Over the past year the present government have introduced a series of initiatives in education, health care, reducing crime levels and controlling drug addiction. Generally speaking these have received a warm welcome, but every time those in the know have said that in order for these initiatives to be effective the government must be prepared to provide more resources. And you don't have to be a genius to see that any plans which our Church may have for moving forward will need to be resourced.

On Monday June 8th the Bishop of Bolton accompanied by Mr. Alan Phillips from Pennington, Leigh will come to an extraordinary parish meeting entitled "Resourcing the Church". Though all members of the Church Council are expected to attend it is an open meeting and it is hoped that there will be a good attendance from all sections of our Church life. The meeting will unashamedly be concerned with ways in which we can fund both the financial and human resources necessary for growth. The meeting will be in 3 parts each lasting 30 minutes. In part 1 we will be sharing with the visitors our hopes and fears, our encouragements and frustrations. In part 2 the Visitors, the Bishop and Alan Phillips, will present a challenging message. In part 3 the Visitors will conduct a dialogue with us on how we can best work together to achieve the targets of the Action Plan.

After a break of a couple of months the summer <u>Home Group</u> programme begins on Tuesday and Wednesday June 9th and 10th. There are 4 sessions at fortnightly intervals when we shall be looking at the 4 chapters in the small Old Testament book of Ruth. The story begins as a small Jewish family are driven by famine in their homeland as refugees to a neighbouring country. Here they experience bereavement, not once but 3 times in quick succession. This is hardly the setting for a story of love and romance, but as the book unfolds we read one of the great love stories of the Bible. Please use the lists on the Church Notice Board to indicate which Home Group you wish to join.

Following last year's experiment the <u>Deane Sermons/Celebration Weekend</u> will again seek to provide something for all age groups on the final weekend in June.

It begins with a Tea Dance on Friday June 26th in the early evening rather than a Saturday afternoon. On Saturday afternoon it seeks to cater for young families with a Fun Day in the grounds of St. Mary's Primary School. On Saturday evening there will be a Disco for the teenagers. On Sunday the visiting speakers are Stephan Beach, the Vicar of Wingates at the Family Communion in the morning and Christopher Bracegridle at the Open Air Family Service in the school grounds in the afternoon following the Procession of Witness led for the first time by the A.T.C. band. This leaves Junction Road at 2.30 pm and makes its way to the school for 3.15 pm.

In the evening I have invited a Christian group called "freedom" to lead our worship. The group consists of Scott Fellows, a songwriter, singer and instrumentalist. He is accompanied by Dorike Ali, a Nigerian lady who has sung at the Free Trade Hall. Over the years they have played in pubs, clubs theatres, Churches and at the Greenbelt festival. They aim to provide something for all tastes.

Zimbabwe may be a "Third World" country, but it is not all that far behind with modern methods of communication. Several people have already heard from them by "E Mail". Their news is that Sara and Joseph appear to have fully recovered from the illness which delayed their departure from the U.K. by several days. Though their temporary accommodation in the capital city Harare (where they are doing a crash course on language) is spacious, Sara is missing such household aids as an automatic washing machine and a vacuum cleaner. Whilst his parents are at language school Joseph is in a nursery where the children are expected to sleep at least part of the day. He is refusing to do so for he believes night is for sleeping, daytime is for staying awake!

Bob Lunt – our missionary link with the Church in N. Argentina. His next visit to S. America is when he flies from Gatwick on June 23rd, returning on August 18th. "I am now working intensively on the Old Testament books of Ezekiel, Job, Leviticus, Daniel and the final 31 Psalms. My fellow translator, Isidro, is recovering from T.B. and should be fit enough to help with some of this work and also to provide me with a list of suggested improvements to our New Testament translation. Hopefully the whole Bible will be ready in a couple of years time.

Margaret is enjoying the responsibility of being the Minister in Charge of the daughter Church of St. Michael in the parish of Rayleigh, Essex, and our two daughters are both engaged in external examinations this year".

AFRICA

CHAD

There have been increased reports of violence in southern Chad and six human rights associations have been suspended. Many people have fled from the countryside to the towns to avoid the fighting and killings. Pray for those affected and that civil war will not break out.

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

There has been a sudden and serious outbreak of cholera in Tchomia and the Boga region close to the Ugandan border. Tearfund has been able to provide such needed financial support, but the number of cases continues to rise. Pray that the disease ceases to spread and that medical supplies do not run out.

SIERRA LEONE

Continue to remember those affected by the war and to pray for Tearfund's partner EFSL (Evangelical Fellowship of Sierra Leone) and other NGOs (Non-Governmental Organisations) seeking to re-start work in the provinces. As President Kabbah continues to re-establish his government, pray that it would know wisdom for the way ahead.

BURUNDI

Pray that there would be reconciliation between Hutu and Tutsi and wisdom for the government of this country. Pray for Tearfund partners helping orphans and widows and seeking to foster reconciliation. Pray, too, for the Tearfund Disaster Response Team there, and pray that its three month registration would become permanent.

ASIA

NORTH KOREA

The state news agency has said that the country could run out of food very soon, despite food rationing. Pray that food aid would reach those in need.

INDONESIA

The World Bank has warned that \$3 billion in emergency food and medical aid will be needed over the next year for supplies to millions affected by drought and the economic crisis. Pray that the necessary aid reaches those affected.

EUROPE/MIDDLE EAST

Continue to pray for the process of bringing lasting peace within Northern Ireland.



LATINAMERICA

HONDURAS

A Tearfund partner has reported an outbreak of cholera in the eastern region of Mosquitia in northern Honduras, near the border with Nicaragua. Pray that this does not spread throughout the area and that the existing very poor health facilities are able to combat it.

BRAZIL

Fires continue to destroy large areas of forest in the northern Amazon. Pray for the welfare of those affected, particularly the Yanomami Indians, and for those attempting to put out the fires.
