## The Rector writes

28th November, 1998.

When I came to Deane I introduced you to the EFAC Bursary Scheme which has subsequently been renamed as <u>Study Link</u>. Since then our Church has regularly supported it through our Christian Giving Programme.



The scheme has been in operation for over 30 years now. Its purpose is to enable potential leaders and theological educators from the growing Third World to study at colleges in this country for further qualifications which are not available in their own countries. In addition, it forges personal links between overseas churches and churches and colleges in the UK.

Over the years we, like a number of other parishes and colleges, have provided funding, parish experience, vacation hospitality, academic supervision, prayer and pastoral support, but we have also received and learnt much too.

The strong and growing link that we have with the Embu Street Children Project in Kenya is a direct result of the friendship that began in 1983 when we supported Johnson Maringa. Johnson had a meal with Sheila and Chris Dewhurst-Taylor and Sheila has been out to Kenya on several occasions. Sheila's enthusiasm has galvanised many of us to support this project.

To my knowledge one of these men, <u>Edmond Alieu</u> is now a theological college principal in Nigeria. Two others, <u>William Magambo and Elisha Kyemugambi</u>, are now bishops in neighbouring dioceses in <u>Uganda</u>, and <u>Daniel Zindo</u> has been a bishop in the troubled area of Southern Sudan since 1984. It is about <u>Daniel that I want to inform you now for he was tragically killed in a road accident in Kenya in October.</u>

Daniel was born into a Christian family. Though he had little education, he was identified as a person of special quality and was encouraged to be ordained at the Oak Hall Theological College in London. He was essentially a pastor and no one was more surprised than Daniel when people wanted him to be their bishop soon after his return to Sudan.

The situation in Sudan is one of 32 years of violent conflict between the Arab north and the African south. In 1990 when the fighting between the Sudanese government based in the north and the Sudanese Peoples' Liberation Army based in the south overran his diocese Daniel and 27,000 of his people went into exile in the Central African Republic from where he returned in 1993

His death is a very serious blow to the Church in Sudan because having recently been appointed as the acting Archbishop he was seen as the one person who could, with the help of God, bring together the two halves of the Church in this divided country. His death is an equally serious blow to his own family. His wife, Grace, was murdered a year ago by a battle-crazed soldier who turned out to be their own son-in-law. In addition, Daniel had lost his brother and 4 other family members in recent times. Since there was now no other senior surviving member of his family to care for his own children and the other children he was supporting he decided to move into exile, taking with him 23 dependants of whom only one had completed his education. The others are college students, children at school and others still too young to go to school. An appeal fund has been launched to support this family, and as a Church which supported Daniel in the past we have been approached. Mary and I will be making a personal donation and I hope that our PCC will allocate something from its Christian Giving Programme. If any of you feels sufficiently moved to make an individual contribution please make your cheque out to the "Sudan Church Association" and I will send it with mine.

Finally, at this time of the year I wish once again to thank those who assist with the production of this monthly communication, <u>Craig and Una Mochrie</u> for typing and stapling, <u>David Dewhurst</u> for the prayer diary and to <u>Christine Dean</u>, the head of the Deane School Reprographics unit, whose expertise with modern printing technology is an enormous help saving us a great deal of money had we to go to a commercial printer.

Mary joins me in sending you our best wishes for Advent and the forthcoming festive season of Christmas.



<u>Stay</u> stands for Short Term Accommodation for Young People. It seeks to be a Christian response to the problem faced by teenagers, the majority of them between 16 and 18, who come from situations which have been very stressful for them. Sadly the organisation is struggling to find homes in which to place these young people. Usually the accommodation required is for one or two nights and the longest time would be 3 weeks. The young person has to abide by certain rules such as not being in the house when the householder is not present. Moreover, the host/hostess is only required to provide bed and breakfast and sometimes an evening meal.

It is understandable that we might be fearful of such a young person coming into our home, but experience shows that they are not to be feared. Many of them respond to love, and some express amazement that there are people willing to take them in. 


# PLEASE PRAY FOR DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONTROL OF THE CONTROL

Former Zaire, the size of western Europe, is rich in minerals and could potentially feed a substantial part of Africa.

The corrupt presidency of Mobutu Sese Seko was ended by Laurent Kabila in May 1997 following a rapid military advance from eastern Democratic Republic of Congo. Since then, however, Kabila's government has made no clear move towards increased democracy, nor has it been able to root out corruption. Political parties have been banned, and opponents jailed. Kabila also refused to allow a United Nations team to fully investigate alleged massacres by his and Rwandan forces.

In August this year, another rebellion began in the east of the country, this time against Kabila, originally led by a group of predominantly rebel ethnic Tutsis formerly in the Congolese army. The Banyamulenge rebels had previously supported Kabila but became disenchanted and announced they wanted independence.



Since then the conflict has grown to include neighbouring countries, and all attempts at peace talks have been unsuccessful. Other countries' interest stems from different reasons – Uganda and Rwanda have rebels who use Congo as a safe haven and would hope to replace Kabila with someone who would protect their borders from rebel raids, so they currently support the new rebel movement. For the government, Angola is worried that a rebel victory would allow its own rebel force UNITA to establish safe havens in Congo, and Zimbabwean interest comes from Mugabe's own military ambition and quest for power. Chad and Sudan have also been reported as sending troops to support Kabila's government. Fighting continues.

#### Please pray

For a negotiated settlement for peace between all parties concerned, that the involvement of other nations would represent a positive African solution to African problems, rather than an escalation of the conflict across the region.

For communications: that a direct and regular communication line can be opened up and maintained with Tearfund partners in DR Congo, despite the volatile environment in which they are operating.

For partners, particularly at Nyankunde -CME Hospital/Health Zone and IPASC (Pan African Institute of Community Health) as they respond to health needs and for the protection of vital hospital medicine, equipment and vehicles from theft by the military and rebels.

For church leaders as they advocate on behalf of their communities to the authorities and seek to bring the confidence and hope of the Gospel where fear is prevalent.

For the local population as they live in economic hardship and fear of violence.

An outpouring of God's love, grace, mercy and peace on this nation.
