

A Good Harvest.

As we come to autumn once again we have reason to look back on a good summer. We have enjoyed some lovely long sunny spells and we have had rain too so that we have been spared hosepipe restrictions associated with drought conditions. This excellent combination of sunshine and showers has meant that we have a good harvest to celebrate. Certainly this has been our experience for the rectory kitchen garden has produced abundant supplies of fruit and vegetables. In addition to consuming them fresh, we have been able to freeze some for winter and to give away plenty too. Though we have enjoyed a good harvest in this country we simply cannot afford to lose sight of the fact that this has not been everyone's experience. Our T.V. screens show us scenes from other parts of the world where our fellow human beings have been much less fortunate. In some cases it has been due to poor weather conditions, to natural disasters like flooding and hurricanes, to civil war and still other instances to ignorance and bad management.

This year's <u>Tear Fund Harvest Appeal</u> gives us the opportunity to share some of our resources with those less fortunate than ourselves. It focuses our attention upon a project which it is supporting in Cambodia, one of the poorest countries in S.E. Asia. One of the by-products of poverty is malnutrition. We all need a balanced diet, with the right amounts of protein, vitamins and minerals, and if we, and especially our children, don't get this then we don't have the strength to work and grow. In Cambodia Tear Fund are financing a project which is growing fish on fish farms. Fish is nutritious food, high in protein and low in fat leading to a healthier diet. Tear Fund Harvest envelopes and an explanatory leaflet are now available to read and use at our Harvest Thanksgiving services on October 10th. This is not meant to deter people from bringing a traditional harvest gift if you so wish. These will be distributed to the elderly and sick living locally.

Alpha

It is estimated that over one million people all over the world have now completed the Alpha Course during the last six years in Churches, homes, schools, universities and prisons. The course is an opportunity for anyone to explore the Christian Faith in a relaxed, non-threatening setting over a period of three months. It has been one of the very best initiatives in recent times to introduce people to Christianity in an easy-to-understand, down-to-earth and informal way. It can be equally beneficial to those who already see themselves as Christians. At Overdale recently a gentlemen told me after the cremation service I had conducted that he had been persuaded to attend an Alpha Course at Lostock Church. "I didn't think I needed this sort of thing" he said "after all I and my family had been Church members for generations. However, within a couple of weeks I realised just how little I really knew and understood. It even made me question whether or not I was a Christian. I have now completed the course and I now know what I believe and why".

Though many of you have been on an Alpha Course many have not. A new course begins on Thursday evening October 7th and I wish to encourage you, if you are one of those who haven't done the course, to join us on this occasion. Details are contained in an attractive brochure in Church.

Welcome to the Bishop of Bolton, David Gillet and his wife, Val. On Wednesday October 6th our new Bishop will be visiting our deanery. In the morning he will be given a conducted tour of the area. Over lunch he will meet the clergy and their wives. At tea-time he has asked to meet a group of young people between the ages of 15 and 20. In the evening there will be an opportunity for all to meet and welcome them both at Lostock Church Centre. After a short service of worship at 7.45 pm. the Bishop will attempt answer any questions which we wish to put to him and then to mix informally with people.



CHRISTIAN ACTION WITH THE WORLD'S POOR



On Thursday 23rd September there will be 100 days to go to the start of the new millennium. Pray for the activities planned by Jubilee 2000 for that day, to

encourage world leaders not to miss the opportunity for a historic deal on debt that would offer new hope and a new start for millions of the world's poorest people.

WEST AFRICA

Last month saw a spate of kidnapping incidents involving both expatriates and local people. Pray for progress towards genuine peace in Liberia, Sierra Leone and Nigeria that will allow personal security and national development. The extent of the humanitarian disaster in Sierra Leone is only just becoming evident; at the same time, Tearfund partner the Evangelical Fellowship of Sierra Leone has expressed confidence that the peace deal will hold.



The limited ceasefire has been extended for 70 days; at the same time there are signs of rising levels of

malnutrition in some areas of the south. Pray for the Tearfund teams here. Britain has resumed diplomatic relations with Sudan - pray that Peter Hain, the new Minister responsible, will find ways to help bring peace.

HORN OF AFRICA

Serious famine is threatened by the war between Ethiopia and Eritrea, combined with poor rains bringing drought and poor harvests here and in Somalia.

MIDDLE EAST

Pray for the ongoing impact of the Reconciliation Walk, which followed the route of the First Crusade offering an apology to Muslims and Jews on behalf of Christians, and ended in Jerusalem this summer. Senior officials and ordinary people have been touched by the reality of reconciliation behind this symbolic act.

COLOMBIA

Two evangelical pastors were assassinated last month amid fears that the guerrilla forces may be specifically targeting Christians. Pray for wisdom, protection and

courage for those who stand for Christ, and for peace and justice to prevail.

EAST TIMOR

Pray for this troubled land following the referendum on its future. Pray that the Indonesian government will positively work to endorse the result, and that a new era of peace and security might be established.

UZBEKISTAN

Four Christians are unjustly imprisoned for their faith. Pray that the letter-writing campaign might result in their finding justice, and that the authorities will end their state persecution of religious minority groups.

UPDATE

Tearfund International Personnel worker (Tanzania) Annabel Joyce-

lenkins had the bone marrow transplant as planned, but at the time of writing her condition is extremely serious,

being closely managed within the intensive care unit. Pray for Annabel, husband Ciaran, and their two young children Iona and Theodore.


