# The Rector writes

Traditionally "Deane Sermons" has been observed over the weekend preceding the start of Bolton holidays. Because the holiday season now appears to extend over the summer months people no longer confine their holidays to the Bolton fortnight and therefore to all intents and purposes Bolton holidays are a thing of the past. It was in the light of this that several years ago our Church Council decided to observe "Deane Sermons" over the final weekend in June. In this millennium year we are having to make an exception and for two reasons. Firstly, the girls' organisations are engaged in a special millennium celebration over the final weekend Secondly, Pentecost Weekend, June 10-11th is being celebrated away from Bolton. throughout the world in many ways. For example, Marches for Jesus will be held on the Saturday when it is hoped literally millions of Christians will be marching in witness on that day. On the Sunday they and we will be celebrating the birthday of the Church. It seemed right, therefore, to celebrate "Deane Sermons" over this particular weekend. The programme has been planned so that there should be something for all tastes. It begins on the Friday It continues on the Saturday with the evening with a Ouiz Night and Cheese and Wine. March for Jesus at noon, and a youth disco from 8.00 to 10.30 pm. It comes to a climax on the Sunday with services at 8.00 am Communion, 10.30 am Family/Parade service followed by a Procession of Witness leading to a Bring and Share lunch in the Memorial Hall and at 6.30 pm Evening Communion.

#### Summer Home Group Programme.

There will be 5 sessions about Christian worship, particularly the sacraments. At the heart of the Christian faith is the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. Easter is the greatest Christian festival. All Christian worship is Easter worship, giving thanks to God through the risen Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit. This course aims to help us understand worship through a deeper understanding of the events around Easter.

There will be 3 groups meeting on Tuesday evenings at 8.pm at the Rectory and at 1 Winton Grove, Ladybridge, and on Wednesday mornings at 10.50 am in the Church Lounge.

# WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

# Asia

**JAPAN** Give thanks that on the day after we asked churches to pray for a breakthrough, Japan announced a new debt relief programme. Pray that as they prepare for the G8 Summit in the midst of a political crisis, the voice of the poor will still be heard.

**PHILIPPINES** Negotiators for Muslim rebels and Philippines officials met last month to try and bring an end to the 28-year conflict in the Southern island of Mindanao. Violence has increased again in recent weeks. Pray for a lasting peace agreement.

# **Europe**

**UNITED KINGDOM** As media hysteria about asylum-seekers continues, pray that churches will continue to be places of compassion and care, and that Christians will stand against prejudice. Pray for Tearfund partners working with refugees.

**HUNGARY** There was widespread flooding last month; Romania and Serbia were also affected. It was hoped that the floods would help to clear the river of the earlier cyanide pollution. Pray for all those who have lost their homes, and for a rapid recovery.

## **Africa**

**SUDAN** Tearfund partner the New Sudan Council of Churches asks us to pray for the Nilotic People to People Conference this month, that it may make a lasting contribution to peace.

**BURUNDI** Nelson Mandela chaired last month's summit seeking a peaceful end to the civil strife which has seen 300,000 killed. Thousands are still living in resettlement camps under terrible conditions. Pray for positive change, and for Tearfund's disaster response team working in this tense situation.

HORN OF AFRICA There are millions facing the threat and reality of famine. War and political instability aggravate the impact of drought, and complicate decision-making about aid. Pray for peace, stability and effective relief as Tearfund's partners respond.

**SOUTHERN AFRICA** Please remember those still displaced by the floods; Tearfund's technical assistance team in Mozambique; pray especially for Christians in Zimbabwe as they react to the ongoing political crisis.

# **Latin America**

**PERU** After last month's election was surrounded by suspicion of fraud, President Fujimori, who has changed the constitution in order to seek a third term, faces a second vote at the end of this month. Pray that there will be a peaceful election and an agreed result.

**BOLIVIA** There was widespread unrest last month as a result of an announcement of a steep rise in water prices in Cochabamba, where a UK-owned water company is involved. Pray for the poorest who are most vulnerable to the impact of privatisation.

#### Bolton's Biggest Birthday Party, Sunday July 2nd 1.30 - 4.30 pm.

To date over 8,500 of the 12,000 tickets available have been sold. In addition there will be a 2,500 strong choir of school children led by our own Jane Hampson. At least 150 people are going from our Church, some going by a coach that we have chartered leaving Church at about 12.30 pm., the rest making their own way to the splendid Reebok stadium. Tickets can still be obtained at the stadium.

This is a major event organised jointly by the local churches, Bolton Metro and the Bolton Evening News. It will be compered by the duo, Cannon and Ball, who make no secret of the fact that they are committed Christians. It is an occasion when we can encourage non-Christian friends to come and enjoy themselves at a price very much lower than the usual goings on at the Reebok.

The Church Council has decided that on this day there will be just one service in Church. It will be a service of Holy Communion at 9.00 am. And it is hoped that those who normally attend the 8.00 am. 10.30 am or 6.30 pm. services will make the effort to attend this service which will then give everyone plenty of time to proceed to the Reebok.
