Common Worship

In the May issue of this publication I referred to the new set of Church services which are to be published in the late autumn for use as from January 1st 2001. From that date the A.S.B. will have passed its "use by date" and the only services authorised for use in the C of E will be those in the BCP (1662) and those in Common Worship. As promised, a flier has been inserted in this issue of the Deane Church News so that you are more fully in the picture. The Worship Committee is about to give consideration to which of these new services we should be using at Deane with a view to making recommendations to myself and the PCC who are ultimately responsible for making decisions. Because the standard edition of the new service book will cost £15 each I suspect that many churches will find themselves unable to afford such an outlay, and will prefer to make use of some of the alternatives like separate booklets and/or producing one's own electronic edition. However, I am sure that I will not be the only person wishing to have my own personal copy of the standard edition. There is a pre-publication offer whereby we can order packs of 20 copies of the standard edition of Common Worship for £10 instead of the usual price of £15. The order has to be placed and paid for by July 31st. If you are interested in this offer please place your order using the form in Church. Would this be an acceptable Christmas present?

Marriage in Church after Divorce.

For many years this has been a contentious issue over which our C. of E. has been more or less equally divided. There are those who favour a more liberal policy of allowing such marriagesto take place in Church under certain circumstances and there are those who are anxious about the effect of further relaxing the Church's teaching on the indissolubility of marriage. What is agreed almost unanimously is that if an adulterous relationship caused the break up of the first marriage then this new relationship should be barred from having a second marriage in Church. The new Bishop of Middleton will be coming to Deane on Tuesday July 4th to address the Deanery Synod on this subject with special reference to the guidelines issued in a recent report from the House of Bishops. Members of the congregation are welcome to attend this meeting in the Church Lounge as observers, but they may not participate in the debate or vote.

Gift Aid

One of the most encouraging pieces of information in Phil Ray's excellent report on this year's Christian Aid Week is the fact that about 200 people in our area were willing to indicate that they were taxpayers who wished what they gave in their envelope to be regarded as "Gift Aid". Since their total donations amounted to about £600 this means that Christian Aid will be able to claim something of the order of an additional £200 from the Inland Revenue.

It never ceases to amaze and disappoint our Gift Aid Secretary, Sid Harris, how reluctant and slow some members of our congregation are to make use of this new ever-so-simple method of enhancing what we give to our Church and other Charities. You don't have to indicate how much you plan to give, but it is essential that you give in a way which can be verified to satisfy the Inland Revenue if and when they do a spot check on our accounting system as they are planning to do sometime in July. This means we have to make use either of the envelope scheme or give by bankers' order. Gift Aid Declaration forms are available in Church, and you can rest assured that Sid Harris will keep your confidence.

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Children at Risk

GLOBAL MARCH FOR JESUS As people around the world celebrate Jesus as Lord and think of the needs of children on 10 June, pray that the church will take a lead in working for their protection, nurture and development.

CHILDREN Pray for those who are abandoned, abused and despairing. Pray for Tearfund partners in the Children at Risk programme, that they might bring the love of God and renewed hope as they build on the strengths of thousands of needy children.

Asia

INDIA Millions are threatened by drought and suffering following the devastating heat-wave. Pray for good monsoon rains next month, and remember too those affected in Pakistan and Afghanistan, where there is great concern about the government's ability to provide the necessary help.

SRI LANKA The devastating civil war has reached a new level of crisis, with Tamil Tiger forces threatening significant advances. Pray that there might be a route to genuine peace. Pray for Tearfund partners working for reconciliation and change in the midst of this uncertainty.

Africa

SIERRA LEONE As the UN struggles to restrain the rebels and encourage disarmament, pray for those with power, and Tearfund partners working for peace and justice and relieving suffering.

ZIMBABWE Violence and threats of violence increase as the country awaits elections. Pray that democracy, stability and justice may prevail, and for Christian leaders needing wisdom and courage.

HORN OF AFRICA Rain is due in Ethiopia this month; renewed fighting between Ethiopia and Eritrea threatens further disaster. Pray for peace, pray for good rain, pray that the threat of famine that hangs over millions may be lifted.

UGANDA The tragic mass murders have left many suspicious of the church; pray that the love of Christ will shine through.

Latin America and Europe

PERU Please remember the people and Christian leaders of Peru following the rerun presidential election on 28 May.

SERBIA The peace accord between NATO and the Yugoslav government to end the Kosovo war was signed one year ago. The return of the ethnic Albanian refugees to Kosovo precipitated an equal and opposite

refugee crisis with ethnic 'non-Albanians' fleeing Kosovo.

Pray for these 'non-Albanian' refugees in Serbia and Macedonia, unlikely to return home soon, and receiving very little humanitarian assistance from either the Yugoslav or Macedonian governments or the international community. Please pray for Tearfund, seeking the most appropriate ways to respond.

In the corresponding period last year the total amount given was £3,469.

The treasurer also acknowledges with gratitude a gift of £50 in memory of Alice Newton. Before moving to live with her daughter Doreen in Bradshaw, on the death of her husband, Bill, Alice had been a member of Deane Church for over 50 years. She made many friends in the Mothers' Union and Ladies' Guild.

This year's Lent Appeal raised a total of £476, being the contents of 4 6 boxes. This has been equally divided between Crosslinks in support of Charlie and Sara Moore serving the Lord in Zimbabwe and Christian Aid in connection with their imaginative "Count your Blessings" project which some of us used and found both helpful and challenging.

Christian**ti**Aid

This year's Christian Aid Week house-to-house collection exceeded all expectations with a record total of £2,303.14 compared with last year's figure of £1,910. This increase was achieved with about the same number of collectors. Thankyou to all who donated and to all the brave people who collected from door-to-door. Thankyou also to the "behind the scenes crew" who counted out the envelopes and slips and who helped with opening the envelopes and counting their contents.

The additional bonus this year to Christian Aid is the tax reclaimed from the 200 or so people who completed the "Gift Aid" declaration on the envelope. This will subsequently increase the final total by a further £200.

For those interested in figures the total consisted of £90 in charity vouchers, £147 in cheques, £435 in bank notes, £837 in £1 coins £70 in £2 coins, £600 in silver, £126 in bronze (some weight!). The increase was also reflected in the number of foreign coins, but at least we appear to have flushed out of the system the halfpence coins.

Thankyou everybody once again for this magnificent effort and if next year we can cover the remaining rounds it will even be possible to exceed this year's total.
