The Rector writes

30th September,2000

We will celebrate our <u>Harvest Thanksgiving</u> on the second weekend in October. Our gifts will be distributed in the following ways:

- to the <u>Tear Fund Harvest Appeal</u> which this year focuses upon water. One of the ironies of our planet is, as our T.V. screens so graphically have shown us this week, there can be extensive flooding in India causing 14 million people to become homeless, whereas at the same time parts of Africa are suffering from a drought which has lasted for 4 years. To a very large extent we are spared these extremes, and when we do have floods or drought, they are usually localised and mercifully short-lived. Because both the abundance and the shortage of water can and do cause immense suffering the relief agencies give a high priority to helping to provide clean safe water supplies to poor communities around the world. They do this by drilling wells, protecting springs, building water catchment facilities and gravity feed systems. I hope that the majority of us will feel able and willing to make our harvest thanksgiving donation in the form of a monetary gift in one of the special envelopes. Incidentally, as we discovered in Christian Aid Week in May, when tax payers are prepared to sign their name on the envelope, then their donation will count as "Gift Aid" thus increasing its value by 28p in the £1.
- Some, however, will prefer to donate a more traditional harvest gift of fruit, vegetables, groceries or flowers. Where appropriate these will be distributed to the sick, elderly and housebound in our parish.
- The remainder will be given to a local Christian Charity called "Urban This is an umbrella organisation which seeks to provide short term accommodation for homeless youth (STAY). At the present time 27 people are involved in this project. Then there is the Winter Watch project in which about 160 volunteers seek to provide a meal and overnight accommodation in a building near the town centre. It is to Winter Watch that we will be sending such items as tea-bags, coffee, drinking chocolate, sugar, marmalade, jams, rice puddings, biscuits, crisps, paste spreads, talc and toothbrushes! They are not requesting baked beans and soups because they still have sufficient of these from last year! A fuller list is on the notice board. The third aspect of Urban Outreach is called It is related to the other two projects in that it seeks to assist at a deeper level those contacted initially through them. It seeks to maintain contact with those begging, the homeless, the prostitutes and others whether on the street or in their own accommodation. By supporting them in their present difficulties through friendship and advice and so sharing something of Christ's love for them through action and also through word in sharing the gospel and its relevance.

Christian Resources Exhibition (CRE)

This will be held at the Manchester G Mex Centre, October 26th-28th and it provides us with the opportunity to discover and meet many of those who provide a whole range of resources for use in Church and schools. When I visited the previous one I found it both informative and inspiring and a most enjoyable day out. A copy of the programme is on the notice board and I have sent for a couple of complimentary tickets – first come, first served.

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Asia

INDONESIA Give thanks that President Abdurrahman Wahid publicly repented his government's weakness in halting religious and separatist violence last month. Since his coming to power last year, thousands have died in the Moluccan Islands, Aceh and Sulawesi. Pray for long-term peace and stability.

INDIA More than four million people are homeless after rains in Northern India flooded the Brahmaputra river last month. The states of Assam, West Bengal and Bihar are badly hit; pray for Tearfund partner NEICORD, assisting in flood relief projects; and also for neighbouring affected countries, Bhutan and Bangladesh.

Africa

ANGOLA Over 100,000 children, women and men here have been killed or maimed by landmines. Pray for Landmine Action week from 4-10 September, highlighting that across the world, every hour, people are killed and maimed, even where wars are over.

HORN OF AFRICA Despite a generous response to Tearfund's Disaster Appeal, many vital projects still need funds, with rains having fallen only on limited areas so far. Pray particularly for the driest southern regions, unlikely to enjoy any harvest, and for millions facing starvation if denied long-term aid.

IVORY COAST Military ruler General Guei, who came to power in a coup last December, has promised to restore civilian rule with presidential elections in September, and for parliament in October. Pray this may become a reality.

BURUNDI Nelson Mandela set 28 August as the target date for signing an accord to end the six-year-old conflict in which over 200,000 people have been killed. Though many believe this speed to be impractical, pray that all parties may agree a way forward that creates a basis for real peace.

The Middle East

ISRAEL/PALESTINE Yasser

Arafat's national deadline for declaring an independent Arab state is imminent. As Palestinians and Israelis prepare the ground for a second summit, pray that this may finally bring negotiated peace to the region. IRAN Concern about human rights violations and suppression of free speech in the press continues, despite Iran's recent claims to have a more open, moderate government. Pray that imprisonment without trial and the torture of intellectuals may cease.

Latin America and Europe

HONDURAS Reports claim that the EU has failed to give any of the £175 million package pledged to help survivors of Hurricane Mitch. Pray for the relatives of almost 7,000 people who died, and for determined action to help the homeless and those still affected.

MONTENEGRO With Serbian elections due on 24 September, more foreign arrests in Montenegro recently have fuelled fears of civil war between the Yugoslav Federation and Montenegrin nationalists. Pray too for a bitterly-divided Orthodox church in Montenegro.

The treasurer also acknowledges single donations of £40, £30 £10 and £500.


