

The Rector writes

30th December, 2000.

After 26 years as your Rector the time has come for me to declare the innings closed. It is no secret that Mary and I have been looking for a house to which to retire for some considerable time. We haven't found this easy, not because we have been looking for a "dream home", but because so few properties in our price range appear to have those features which we believe are desirable. In the end we have decided to go for a new house on the Edges Fold development in Daisy Hill, Westhoughton. Though it is perhaps a little closer to Deane than I would have wanted, it is the type of house which incorporates most of the features for which we have been looking. Because there appears to be no let up in the appalling wet weather conditions of the past 4 months, the builder understandably feels unable at this stage to commit himself to a completion date. However, in my letter to the Bishop of Manchester I have indicated that I ought to be thinking of finishing sometime in the May/June period.

In the meantime I want to make 2 suggestions:

- that you think and pray about the kind of person whom you believe would be God's choice to take His work forward in this parish. Then feed your ideas to the members of the Church Council who, in due course, will be required to provide a parish profile and job description of the person for whom you should be looking.
- recognising that there could be a considerable period when you are without a Rector (the Parish of Horwich and Rivington hasn't had a Rector for 15 months and at the present time there is no one in sight) think and pray that God will show you and all other members of the Church Family at Deane what duties and responsibilities you could be taking on board to share those things which I have been doing but which don't require a priest to do them. In this way the "interregnum" as it is called can be a period of spiritual growth. It need not be a disaster.

Farewell to the A.S.B. and Welcome to Common Worship

The Alternative Service Book comes to the end of its life tomorrow, December 31st. When it came into use in 1980 it was always seen as a book of alternative services to the Book of Common Prayer (1662) with a "shelf life" of 10 years which was subsequently extended by a further 10 years. Its replacement is <u>Common Worship</u> – a book containing both new services and the traditional ones authorised for use in the Church of England.

We shall be using the new services of Holy Communion and Morning and Evening Prayer at 10.30 am and 6.30 pm. You won't find a great deal of difference in these services. The main changes will be in the use of inclusive language, and a much greater variety of alternative material. For the occasional services like Thanksgiving for the Gift of a child, Holy Baptism, Marriage and Funerals we shall be experimenting with our own locally produced service sheets before we decide to make more permanent service cards. In this way it is hoped that the use of our own orders of service will make these services more "user friendly" both for visitors and regulars at Deane Church.

At all services we shall be making use of the Common Worship lectionary – a 3 year cycle of readings which we have normally been using for the past 3 years at 10.30 am and 6.30 pm. Especially for the benefit of those who read the lessons at the 8.00 am. service the readings will now be published in the Deane Church News. Whatever service we attend may I encourage you to read through these passages at home as part of your preparation for worship.

Mary joins me in thanking the many of you who sent us your Christmas greetings. We send you our best wishes for the coming year.

ST Mary's Embu Street Children Fund

As the drought in Kenya continues more problems are arising. Aid from other parts of the World has helped to provide food in the worst hit areas, and this includes Embu. There was no harvest and very little water. The well on Johnson Maringa's shamba is dry and people are having to go further afield to find water. Those with transport and who can afford petrol can drive to other areas like Nairobi to buy food and water. This past year has seen the worst drought for 50 years and who knows how long it will take for things to get back to normal once the rains do finally arrive.

The Embu Street Children Fund is still functioning although it is a struggle to send our gift of £50 each month. God has blessed this fund and as yet we have never missed sending this contribution. The money helps with school fees and the running of the project to improve the quality of life for these children. It is not often that we make an appeal for donations, but the situation caused by the drought is such that we feel we have no choice but to ask for additional gifts.

So we ask you to pray asking God what He would like you to do. If after praying you don't hear God speaking to you then turn to your Bible for He may speak to you through your reading.

All the monies received through this drought appeal will of course go to help the Street Children and to those who help on the Project. Sometimes, I'm sure we think the problem so big that our contribution will make no difference. Just take a look once again at that Cross at the back of our Church. It was made by one of the Street Children who now lives at the St. Stephen's Home. It says "No more are we Street Children".

Finally a short story.

One day Anthony De Mello saw a starving child shivering in the cold. Angrily he looked up and said "God, how can you allow such suffering? Why don't you do something?" There was a long silence and then De Mello heard these words "I did -1 made you" (Matthew Ch.25 v 40)

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

Asia

SRI LANKA Sri Lankan president Chandrika Kumaratunga has expressed willingness to open peace talks with Tamil Tiger rebels after 26 Tamil prisoners were massacred without police protection recently. Pray for democracy and a strengthened Christian community there. INDIA Millions are recovering from heavy floods in Assam, West Bengal, Bihar and Andhra Pradesh; in Bangladesh, 350,000 families, already homeless, were further battered by a cyclone during October. Pray for areas most vulnerable to the impact of global warming.

Africa

HORN OF AFRICA Nearly three million people in Kenya now rely on food aid; long term needs will continue well into next year. Pray for Tearfund's Disaster Response team, now providing supplementary feeding for over 4000 children, and for all Tearfund partners stretched by relief work in this area.

SIERRA LEONE Give thanks for last month's cease-fire deal between the Government and the RUF. Pray that the RUF will finally adhere to this amazing opportunity for progress and disarm as promised. Pray for safety and security for Tearfund's Disaster Response team as they undertake needs assessment up country.

Europe/Central Asia

SERBIA Elections for the parliament take place this month. Pray that the momentum for democratic change remains strong, that Christians might gain greater freedom following the elections. Pray too for Christians working with the neediest people, including Tearfund partners.

AFGHANISTAN The worst drought in 30 years increases the hardship of the severe winter, especially in southern and western areas. With Pakistan, Iran and Tajikistan having now closed their borders to refugees from the north, pray for almost 80,000 people fleeing from fighting, and now at risk from starvation.

Latin America

PERU Tearfund partner Peace and Hope defends those falsely imprisoned during the terrorist years. In a recent burglary, irreplaceable information on legal cases was stolen. Pray for protection on them, and other human rights organisations experiencing similar attacks at present.

ARGENTINA Pray for partner SACDEM, ministering to the mentally ill, bringing hope and good news to women psychiatric prisoners trapped by drugs, occult addiction, crime and depression. They are thirsty for a clear conscience and a fresh start,' says SACDEM.
