# WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

### **Africa**

HORN OF AFRICA Give thanks for a peace treaty between Ethiopia and Eritrea signed last month, giving hope to people devastated by war and famine. Pray for Tearfund partners, including the Kale Heywet church in Ethiopia and Kale Hiwot church in Eritrea, who help people displaced by conflict and threatened with famine.

**BURUNDI** Peace prospects are slipping away as violent clashes continue to claim more than 100 lives a month. Pray especially for Bishop Bernard Ntahoturi of the Diocese of Matana, a Tearfund partner, and all church leaders who speak out for peace, both here and worldwide.

SUDAN Emergency feeding was resumed for 500 malnourished children in Malualkon recently; indications for 2001 suggest a worsening food security situation, with no harvest until autumn. Pray for Tearfund's Disaster Response Team, and those who fight injustice and oppression, and challenge the forces that fuel war.

**D.R. CONGO** Two years of fierce conflict leave many still trying to escape the fighting, including over 2 million internally displaced people. Pray for the implementation of the Lusaka peace accord and for international co-ordination of relief efforts; also for Tearfund partners, seeking to assist victims of conflict.

### The Middle East

ISRAEL/PALESTINE The

inauguration of a new United States president this month may have massive repercussions on whether conflict continues unabated. Pray for all seeking peace. IRAQ Saddam Hussein continues his battle against sanctions. Pray for the international community as it looks at the implications of these, and for all suffering as a result of resources being used as a weapon of politics.

## Latin America and Europe

PERU Despite President Fujimori's sudden resignation, an interim government consisting of opposition parties has made strong attempts so far to stabilise the country and prepare for new elections in April. Pray for all countries facing elections this year, that democracy would result in stability and positive change.

UNITED KINGDOM At the closing Jubilee 2000 rally, Chancellor Gordon Brown pledged that the UK would no longer benefit from debt payments from 41 of the world's poorest countries. Pray that this year will bring new momentum to the worldwide debt campaign, and further encouragement to those who work for justice.

The recent Christmas Appeal has produced a sum of £465.66 which is being sent to Tear Fund to enable them to support a Community Health Programme in N. India where there are few doctors and clinics. In one village there have been no more deaths of children since volunteer health workers have been trained to teach parents how to take care of their children. In another village a mother, whose mother-in-law had previously advised her son to take another wife because she had lost all her children at birth, has now given birth as a result of the teaching she had received through a Tear Fund sponsored project.

This total is well below last year's figure of £633 largely due to a marked fall in the number of envelopes returned – 66 as compared with 94.
