## The Rector writes

#### Deane Church News.

28th April, 2001.

As the time for my retirement is fast approaching I am in the process of handing over some of the jobs for which I have been responsible. One of these is the editorial of this monthly publication. We should be most grateful to Elizabeth Plant for being willing to do this at least until my successor is in post. It will be a great help to Elizabeth if you could pass on to her material in good time (i.e. before the penultimate Sunday of each month) for inclusion in future issues.

#### **New Service Arrangements**

By the time August comes no less than 7 out of the 13 congregations in our deanery will be without a Vicar due to retirement and moving to new posts. This will put enormous strains upon the 6 remaining clergy. On the plus side we are fortunate in that this area is one to which a number of clergy retire and we are very dependant upon the help that they can give. Teachers and G.Ps. are facing similar shortages in their professions and there are threats of strike action and pulling out of the N.H.S. I don't think the remaining clergy are likely to resort to such action, but I do think we must avoid making their workload unnecessarily heavy. One way of doing this is by combining our small evening congregation with that at St. Andrew's. Consequently from June onwards in the normal way there will be only one evening service at Deane, on the first Sunday of the month. On the remaining Sundays we will be encouraged to attend the evening service at St. Andrew's. There will be exceptions like Sermons Day, (June 24th), the service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving (November 18th) and the Festival of Lessons and Carols (December 23<sup>rd</sup>). It ought to be possible for those with cars to provide transport for those without. The other way is to discontinue the midweek Wednesday morning service of Holy Communion during the time we are without a Rector. For those who appreciate and value this service there is a warm invitation to join the midweek congregation at St. Andrew's on Thursday mornings at 10.00am. Again it ought not to be beyond us to make transport arrangements if there proves to be a need which can be met in this way. I'm sorry that we are having to make these plans, but it doesn't make sense to seek to provide cover from over-stretched resources. On the positive side it could be a very helpful and encouraging experience to link up with the congregations at St. Andrew's on these occasions.

#### **Alternative Service Books (A.S.B.)**

Since the beginning of the year the ASB became redundant when it was replaced by Common Worship (C.W.). As many of the books were given in memory of relatives and friends and are in good condition the Church Council wishes to make them available for people to take home. Who knows they may become valuable collectors' items in due course! So do please feel free to help yourself. Those which are not claimed by the end of the month will be disposed of for pulp.

## WORLD WATCH Prayer Link Asia

**INDIA** Specialists were brought into Gujarat last month to build model houses capable of withstanding major tremors. Pray for those unprotected from the heatwave, and for continued effectiveness of aid agencies, including Tearfund partners EFICOR, Emmanuel Hospital Association and the Discipleship Centre.

INDONESIA Supporters of embattled Indonesian President Abdurrahman Wahid took to the streets in March, calling for the death of one of his leading critics. Pray for Christians and other minorities in the Moluccas, reliant upon strong, uncorrupted leadership in Indonesia to halt extremist Muslim violence in the islands.

## **Africa**

**BURUNDI** Tearfund partner African Revival Ministries was hosting up to 2,500 internally displaced people in Bujumbura last month as security deteriorated. Pray for all in need; for swift resettlement and rebuilding of homes and for Tearfund's Disaster Response team, seeking a new Director, logistician and nutritionist.

**GUINEA** Many refugees from Sierra Leone and Liberia remain trapped in southern Guinea's Parrot's Beak region, lacking food and shelter and constantly under rebel attack. Pray for their safety, for swift assistance to come.

**ETHIOPIA** Internal conflict, HIV/AIDS and climatic instability remain huge challenges despite continued peace with Eritrea. Pray for Tearfund partners Kale Heywet Church, Meserete Kristos Church and Full Gospel Believers Church, assisting in rebuilding lives.

**SUDAN** The campaign against oil exploration and production fuelling ongoing war is focussed this month on the BP Amoco AGM. Pray that the company will respond positively to the concerns expressed, and that shareholders might put principle before profit.

## Central Asia/Europe

**KAZAKHSTAN** Following government attempts to introduce new laws against Christian evangelism and religious freedom, a Protestant Forum was held last month. Pray this will help officials to understand the issues at stake; that hearts and minds will be changed.

**UNITED KINGDOM** The lives and livelihoods of thousands of people continue to be affected by the foot and mouth crisis. Pray that those affected will know the encouragement of the Lord's presence, finding practical support throughout the community and nation.

## **Latin America**

**COLOMBIA** The whole church is threatened by continued guerrilla violence. Pray for Tearfund partner AIEC and those receiving particular assistance from them at present: displaced pastors and their churches, widows of murdered leaders. Pray for churches still functioning in zones of conflict, preparing to flee at any moment.

**EL SALVADOR** A further £8 million aid package has been agreed by the European Commission to help earthquake survivors. Pray for around 1.5 million people whose lives have been shattered and for Tearfund partners the Salvation Army and Merliot Bible Centre, continuing to make a real impact with their relief efforts.

If we don't get more offers of help then we shall have to amalgamate the teams so that the Church is cleaned fortnightly rather than weekly.
