

The Rector writes

26th May,2001.

I wish to emphasise the importance of something to which I drew the attention of those who attended the Annual Church Meeting recently, namely the <u>Springboard Initiative</u> which is happening in our diocese from June $3^{rd} - 17^{th}$. Springboard is a team of clergy and lay people led by a Christian lawyer, Martin Cavender and appointed by our two Archbishops. They are trained to help the local Church in three key areas:

- To explore what it means to be a missionary Church in the U.K.
- To teach and share with us effective models of evangelism
- To help us make it happen.

There are four Key events during the fortnight:

- The Youth Rally at Champress Hall, Rochdale on Saturday June 9th 7.30-10.30 pm featuring "The Tribe" formerly known as the World Wide Message Tribe.
- The Deanery Training Day for clergy during the day and for Church Councillors at Bolton Parish Church in the evening 7.30-9.30 pm on Monday June 11th.
- The Diocesan Training Day at Salford University on Saturday June 16th. It is called "Mission Impossible?" There is a choice of 15 workshops giving practical ideas for making new disciples. Application forms are available in Church. "Highly recommended".
- The Deanery Festival Service on Sunday evening June 17th at 6.30 pm. when we will be joined by members of other Churches to encourage one another in mission. A member of the Springboard team will be the preacher.

<u>"Celebration Weekend"</u> is on June 24th. I have invited Helen Franklin of Scripture Union to return to speak at the Family/Parade service at 10.30 am This will be followed by a procession of witness led once again by the A.T.C. marching band. There will be an opportunity to meet socially for lunch over a Bring and Share meal in the Memorial Hall. In the evening the service will take the form of a Songs of Praise

Last year many of us were among the 13,000 people who attended the Reebok Stadium for Bolton's Biggest Birthday Party to celebrate the 2,000th birthday of Christ. Many of us enjoyed the singing of the massed choirs of schoolchildren conducted by our own Jane Hampson but came away disappointed that there was little community singing.

The organisers have taken this criticism on board in their planning of a sequel called "More than Gold – Songs of Praise". The occasion has been chosen to coincide with the opening of the new Bolton Arena – a magnificent sports complex adjacent to the Reebok Stadium. The aim of the occasion is to:

- to build on last year's event
- to celebrate the opening of the arena
- to look forward to next year's Commonwealth Games which though centred in Manchester will be making use of the Bolton Arena.

"More than Gold" is an initiative endorsed by all the leaders of the Christian Churches in Greater Manchester to encourage Christians to be involved in the Games. Its patron is the Christian Olympic Gold medallist Jonathan Edwards. It was another Christian Olympic athlete, Kriss Akabusi, who becoming a Christian said "I received a prize worth more than all the glory of winning a gold medal", hence "More than Gold". We are hoping that Kriss Akabusi will be present on July 15th. Watch out for details concerning tickets for this event which will be more limited than last year.

WORLD WATCH Prayer Link Asia

NORTH KOREA As the country begins to open up to the world after years of isolation, the persecution of Christians still continues. The worst winter in 50 years has left acute food shortages; government-run food distribution stocks will only provide 200 grams a day per person until this month's end. Pray for speedy relief.

INDIA As we draw near to the World Wide Day of Prayer for Children at Risk on 2 June, we pray for all children in need, including those affected by earthquakes in Gujarat. Pray for Tearfund partners including Inter Mission, providing parents with shelter materials, so they can rebuild homes while their children are in safe care.

Africa

SENEGAL Fighting by one rebel faction has markedly increased in the southern Casamance region recently, threatening the latest peace accord between the government and MFDC rebels. Pray for Tearfund partner the Association of Evangelical Churches in Senegal, whose development work is restricted by high risks in travelling.

D.R. CONGO Historic tensions between Hema and Lendu communities in the north east have been re-ignited and broadened, including the involvement of Ugandan forces. Pray for 13 Tearfund partners amongst agencies bringing relief to a traumatised country.

SUDAN Although SPLA forces of the south have stood down thousands of child soldiers, conflict continues. The government of Sudan resumed bombing civilians last month. With malnutrition rates rising sharply, pray for fresh resources to strengthen Tearfund's Disaster Response team, and for all Tearfund's partners.

ANGOLA Devastating rains hit the capital Luanda last month; many in the countryside are dead after the worst storms in recent years. Pray that the harvest may be salvaged this month, and for thousands who have lost their homes, already stricken by prolonged civil war.

Central Asia/The Middle East

AFGHANISTAN Reports indicate growing distress and vulnerability as a consequence of the drought, with many people displaced by conflict. Pray for those facing war, freezing weather and food shortages.

ISRAEL/PALESTINE Reprisal attacks are increasing; the situation is deteriorating rapidly, with prospects for progress on peace fading fast. Pray that dialogue may commence, violence and retribution cease.

Latin America

BOLIVIA The indigenous people of Bolivia comprise the majority in this poorest of the Andean countries. Pray for justice for them; many do not even have access to basic services. Last month, a march to protest against privatisation of water provision and inadequate services met with a brutal police response.

EL SALVADOR Relief efforts continue but recovery is slow as the seasonal rains return. Give thanks to our Lord for people like Hilda de Bojórquez and Captain Esteban Calvo Mora, as they continue to lead Tearfund partner initiatives in the relief programme following the January and February earthquakes.

All that has happened so far is that initial steps have been taken to consider replacing the building with something more appropriate for present day needs.

Assuming the project goes ahead it could be at least 3 years before it can happen. A far more encouraging and positive response to this news has come from a couple who have dipped into their life's savings and made an anonymous donation of £10,000 towards what is going to be a very costly scheme. We should be grateful to God for this most generous act.
