

# A thought for the world

In all the uncertainties and potential dangers which the world seems to be facing at the moment, there are many who cry out "Where is God?" or "Can there be a God?" You only have to read recent letters to the Bolton Evening News to realise that there are some who blame God for all the troubles in the world, including the current situation. However as Christians we can be encouraged by the sure knowledge that God is there in the midst of all the suffering. We know He was with the Jews in exile in Babylon and with Daniel in the fiery furnace. He was with Jesus in Gethsamene and with St Paul in prison in Rome. Jesus himself knows what it means to suffer. He was born far from the comforts of home in a stable in a strange town. As a baby, he was a refugee when Mary and Joseph had to flee into Egypt. As an adult, he was rejected by many, betrayed by a friend, falsely accused, flogged by soldiers and nailed to a cross where he died the most painful of deaths. We can therefore be certain that God knows all that human suffering entails and that He is at the side of all who are suffering at any time.

# WORLD WATCH Prayer Link

#### The aftermath of terrorism

Those bereaved by the 11 September attack - from 35 countries - still mourn their loss

World leaders wrestle with how to fight a war against terrorism on the basis of law and justice

The threat of military retaliation creates many more Afghan refugees, and turmoil in Pakistan

Millions already facing starvation inside Afghanistan are cut off from outside help

In the West, anti-Muslim and anti-Afghan feelings prompt racist attacks

Aid workers and mission personnel withdraw from some Islamic states, their work suspended

Destabilisation in Central Asia; but a ceasefire in Israel/Palestine offers a glimmer of hope

Expatriates charged with promoting Christianity, and their Afghan workers, are imprisoned in Afghanistan

The reality of global recession and oil price rises threaten further hardship for the world's poorest

A focus on war against terrorism may undermine international efforts to combat poverty

#### Africa

ANGOLA Tens of thousands of people have been displaced in Bie Province where the government is denying UNITA rebel forces access to food from villages under their control.

RWANDA With courts facing a huge backlog of cases following the genocide, the accused are now tried on the hillsides near the towns where the atrocities occurred. Pray that this may produce justice, and also reconciliation.

NIGERIA 500 are believed dead after fighting last month between Christians and Muslims in Jos. Interethnic violence is also reported in the north-eastern state of Taraba with many more lives lost.

ZIMBABWE The land distribution agreement signed in Nigeria recently is under threat with continued violent farm occupations by war veterans. Pray for farmers and farm workers displaced from their homes.

#### Asia

BANGLADESH At least 95 people have been killed and 5,000 injured in political clashes since the caretaker government came to office in mid-July, ahead of the election due on 1 October. Pray that deployed troops can safely administer a free election process.

**INDIA** Flooding in the state of Orissa is beginning to receed; a DfID grant to Tearfund of around £160,000 has been allocated to assist 2,400 needy families with foodand cash-for-work schemes. Pray for the success of this programme in areas still recovering from the 1999 cyclone.

# Latin America

**BOLIVIA** US aid given on the promise of action against coca growth has led to the destruction of 90 per cent of the crop - and unemployment for one in five of the population, creating widespread unrest.

HONDURAS Social problems heightened by Hurricane Mitch have led to violent attacks on Tearfund partners CASM and OCDIH, among others. Security officials have resigned following death threats.
